CORVALLIS--A full truckload of much-needed copper, brass and aluminum was turned in by the young people of this area at a recent scrap matinee held at a local theater under the direction of V.L. Goodnight, vice-chairman of the County Salvage Committee.

CAMP WHITE--"Pass the Grease and Make the Ammunition" has become the password to Victory at this Army post with the announcement that Camp officials are continuing to intensify the collection of the post's inedible or waste fats.

ROSEBURG--With schools, salvage committees and bottlers cooperating, Douglas county's first tin can shipment will be made on or before May 25, says Fred A. Goff, County Salvage Chairman. Many tons of cans already have been collected by school children and now are being stored in warehouses pending loading of the car.

BAKER--A carload of tin cans is expected to be shipped from Baker County on May 1, it is announced by P.T. Fortner, County Salvage Chairman. All schools of the county are cooperating, while block leaders and neighborhood leaders also are being urged to aid in the tin can salvage drive, Fortner reported.

SEASIDE--Seaside's Salvage committee, headed by Chairman E.W. Leppla, recently loaded and shipped a full carload of old tires. Able assistance in the loading was provided by the Seaside Beach Patrol of the Coast Guard.

KLAMATH FALLS--One thousand Klamath Falls kiddies, each bearing a batch of tin cans, bore down on a local theatre April 10 for a special salvage matinee conducted in cooperation with Boy Scout, Girl Scout and Campfire Girl organizations. The matinee produced 5,250 pounds of cans, or better than 2½ tons. Klamath County's salvage committee, headed by Chairman Clarence "Scotty" Lolcoma, assisted in the drive.

HILLSBORO--One carload of tin cans, weighing in excess of 36,000 pounds, was shipped from Washington county last week, reports J.T. Kovaly, County Salvage Chairman. Schools, bottlers and salvage committees cooperated in the successful campaign.

BURNS--Harney County Boy Scouts are lending valuable aid in the collection of tin tins.

ASTORIA--A summary of results for grease, silk stockings and tin cans, salvage of which is particularly being energized by women in this area, shows that Clatsop county has turned in over 12 tons of waste fats, over 980 pounds of silk and nylon stockings and has ready for shipment two and one-half carloads of tin cans. Aften Zundel and Mrs. Charles Miller are chairman and chairwoman, respectively, of the Clatsop County Salvage Committee.

EUGENE--J.J. Kamerman, Lane County Salvage Chairman, announced last week that Lane county's initial tin can collection campaign will be launched in mid-May. Schools, directed by Dr. J.F. Kramer and Laurence Moffitt, city and county school superintendents, respectively, will make the pick-ups and beverage groups also are assisting.

MEDFORD--Medford kids contributed more than 700 pounds of scrap copper, brass and bronze at a special salvage matinee conducted April 10 in cooperation with theatres, salvage committees and the city's daily newspaper. In addition, Medford public school students "cleaned the city" of all tin cans. Schools picked up cans on a contest basis with the winner to be granted a half holiday at a later date, according to E.H. Hedrick, city school superintendent. Initial shipment of tin from Jackson county was made last week when a full carload of cans, weighing 42,000 pounds, was sent to the detinning plant, reports N. H. Zacharisen, county salvage chairman.

PORTLAND--Records of Hamilton F. Corbett, Multnomah County Salvage Chairman, disclose that Portland has shipped 23 carloads of tin cans to South San Francisco since the inception of the tin salvage program. Schools, under the direction of J.W. Edwards, assistant city superintendent, are handling collections in cooperation with beverage companies.

CANYON CITY--Quantities of tin cans, silk hosiery, and rags now are being shipped from certain portions of Grant county, according to Charles Casady, county salvage chairman.

SALEM--Marion and Polk counties again will join forces in mid-May for their second two-county tin can collection campaign of the year. County and city schools, salvage committees and beverage groups are bent on gathering at least two full cars of cans, report C.W. Paulus and Mrs. J.A. Inglis, Marion and Polk county salvage chairmen, respectively. Coordinating Polk county's salvage committee tin can activities with those of the schools is Mrs. Earl Fulgham of Dallas, county chairwoman.

MC MINNVILLE--Another call for salvaged tin cans was issued last week by Yamhill county and unit salvage committees with May 17 set as the last day for receiving such cans at local grocery stores. Miss Victoria Case, county chairwoman, heads up Yamhill county's can campaign in coordination with L.A. Courtemanche, county salvage chairman.
