184	Jaindl	Explains the data available, and offers to collect data and submit a report to the committee. States that there are 24 basins that are reviewed biennially.
209	Larry Ojua	Program Manager, Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCD), ODA. Explains his background and the purpose of SWCDs <b>(EXHIBIT A, page 5)</b> .
235	Chair Jenson	Questions funding for SWCD technical assistance and emphasizes the importance of technical assistance.
241	Ojua	Reports ODA can fund only one full time employee (FTE) for technical assistance, and relays that water districts can apply for grants for technical assistance from Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board (OWEB). Continues description of SWCDs.

		Discusses federal Endangered Species Act (ESA) assurances (EXHIBIT A, page 11).
331	Rep. Dingfelder	Questions assurances regarding irrigated crop land (EXHIBIT A, page 11, paragraph 2).
350	Ojua	Responds and continues discussion of SWCD accomplishments (EXHIBIT A, page 6) and discusses the Conservation Security Plan (pages 13-15).
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011	Ojua	Discusses SWCD accomplishments (EXHIBIT A, page 6).
020	Rep. Tomei	Questions definition of conservation easements and conservation enhancement program. Inquires who a third party might be. Requests an explanation of the conservation enhancement program.
022	Ojua	Defines conservation easements and conservation enhancement program and lists who a third party could be. Discusses the conservation enhancement programs.
043	Ojua	Continues discussion of Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) (EXHIBITA, page 7).
065	Rep. Dingfelder	Inquires if ODA establishes goals and benchmarks.
071	Ojua	Describes goals, target miles and acres.
084	Jaindl	Explains that because CREP is an OWEB program, goals are established by OWEB, and ODA assists.
090	Chair Jenson	Offers history of CREP and trends.
154	Rep. Tomei	Asks if trends are typical of other watersheds.
157	Ojua	Believes that these trends are similar to other trends.
183	Gorham	Describes the Confined Animal Feeding Operations (CAFO) (EXHIBIT A, page 7).

210	Chair Jenson	Notes the committee members who were on the committee when the CAFO program was expanded with HB 2156 (2001).
218	Gorham	Continues explanation of CAFO rules and permits.
310	Rep. Dingfelder	Questions whether increase in operations that need coverage is due to expanding EPA regulations. Inquires if there is enforcement when someone refuses to register, and how many inspectors are in ODA.
319	Gorham	Describes outreach to seek operations that require permitting. Explains how ODA handles non-compliance, and relays that there are 6.25 full time inspectors.
375	Rep. Dingfelder	Questions how CAFO programs are funded.
378	Gorham	Explains that very little is funded through fees, but rather by General and Lottery funds.
396	Rep. Barnhart	Questions if CAFO is applicable only to certain species or to any feeding operation.
407	Gorham	Explains the many types of confined animals that CAFO covers.
449	Rep. Barnhart	Asks if the four-month period refers to the time when the CAFO exists, or to the length of time animals are confined. Inquires if swine are regulated.

021	Gorham	Clarifies that the four-month period is the time animals are confined within a year, and confirms that ODA permits hog operations. Explains assistance provided to CAFO operators and offers to provide a copy of summary to committee staff.
075	Jaindl	Introduces the Noxious Weeds and Invasive Species program (EXHIBIT A, page 9).
158	Chair Jenson	Inquires about a recent study relating to silt in Umatilla Basin waters and lack of farmer participation.

162	Jaindl	Responds that he is not familiar with the study.
164	Chair Jenson	Questions if there have been reports from the Independent Multidisciplinary Science Team (IMST).
171	Jaindl	Relays communications with IMST.
220	Chair Jenson	Closes informational hearing by ODA. Opens an informational hearing on the Oregon Plan by the Oregon Department of Forestry (ODF).

110	Rep. Dingfelder	Questions court issued permits and a general permit for restoration.

164	Lorenson	Offers an illustration of preventative measures in other areas.
184	Rep. Brown	Mentions his experience with knotweed in Lincoln County.

244	Rep. Barnhart	Questions ODF authority to eradicate invasive species, and inquires if the legislature could improve their capacity to do so.
254	Lorenson	Replies that ODA has the authority to implement eradication programs, and they have been working with ODF.
276	Jaindl	Reiterates that ODA works with ODF to address issues. States that he cannot answer whether ODF has the authority it needs.
293	Rep. Barnhart	Asks for clarification about increasing flexibility for harvesting plans in Tillamook forests.
307	Lorenson	Discusses different views of frameworks to manage forests.
371	Rep. Barnhart	Expresses appreciation for clear explanations and for ODF's concern with approaching issues scientifically. Questions influence of federal government.
402	Lorenson	Describes three management approaches that are adaptive management experiments.
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003	Lorenson	Continues discussing management approaches. Mentions that federal Bureau of Land Management and United States Forest Services are updating their management plans.
040	Rep. Barnhart	Comments on Oregon's example of good forest management that may affect other states' management practices. Believes there are great opportunities if Oregon manages its forests well.
046	Chair Jenson	Discusses economic benefits to good forest management.
105	Chair Jenson	Closes the informational hearing and adjourns the meeting at 3:04 p.m.
