057	Chair Shields	Asks what portion of the records delivered to Mr. DiLorenzo was pursuant to public records law and what portion was delivered pursuant to the SAIF statute.
072	Brenda Rocklin	Interim President and Chief Executive Officer, SAIF Corporation. Responds that the initial request was in 2000 when it was assumed that SAIF was under the Oregon Public Records Act. Explains that the Marion County Circuit Court concluded that SAIF was subject to 656.702 under which the records were turned over.
089	DiLorenzo	Refers to correspondence from Harland Jones regarding the expense to obtain records under Chapter 192.
091	Rocklin	States that many of the documents that Mr. DiLorenzo received would have been turned over under the Public Records Act. Explains that the advantage to being reconnected to the Public Records Act is that if there is a dispute there is a process that the Attorney General can step in and make a decision.
119	DiLorenzo	States there are three reasons not to reconnect SAIF to the Public Records Act. 1) SAIF is the only state agency that has its own trade secrets 2) the legislature has no budgetary supervision over SAIF and 3) SAIF is the only state agency in Oregon to be in contempt of court.

499 Sen. George Asks if this could this go back to court asking for a definition to be rendered.
