TAPE 96, A 005	Chair Brown	Calls the meeting to order at 3:30 p.m. Notes the committee is officially in sub-committee. Makes opening remarks. Opens a public hearing on executive appointments.
<b><u>EXECUTIVE APPOINTMENTS – PUBLIC HEARING</u></b>		
<b><u>DIRECTOR, DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE – APPOINTMENT OF ELIZABETH HARCHENKO (EXHIBIT A)</u></b>		
015	Elizabeth Harchenko	(NOTE: The committee is now meeting as a full committee.) Explains her qualifications and interest in appointment to the Department of Revenue.
072	Chair Brown	Mentions tax compliance. Assumes witness is referring to SB 480 (2005).

075	Harchenko	Replies yes. Explains SB 480 (2005) has compliance components in it as well as some policy option packages included in the Department of Revenue's budget.
077	Sen. Ringo	Thanks witness for her work. Makes reference to witness' statement that the way forest land is taxed has been changed. Asks if the amount of revenue received from forest land has been reduced because of those changes.
082	Harchenko	Replies the way the revenue is collected has been shifted. Gives a brief history of tax collection on forest land.
109	Sen. Ringo	Asks if the changes resulted in less revenue.
110	Harchenko	Believes the expectation was that there would be less revenue. Explains in detail.
125	Chair Brown	Recesses the public hearing on executive appointments and opens a public hearing on SB 1074.

255	Daniel Swift	President, Oregon States Police Officers' Association. Submits and reads written testimony in support of SB 1074 <b>(EXHIBIT C)</b> .
315	Sen. Ringo	Thanks witness for his testimony.
316	Sen. Prozanski	Notes for the record there is a change in SB 1074. Explains the bill was originally drafted in another bill and there was a prohibition of receiving any type of revenue for a two-year period. States the prohibition has now been reduced to a one-year prohibition. Provides an explanation.
344	Vice-Chair Ferrioli	Remarks there are other jurisdictions that use revenue from the court system to defray court operations. Provides examples. Asks how this is different.
352	Sen. Prozanski	Discusses a survey done by the League of Oregon Cities (LOC) which gives the percentage of revenue from their traffic enforcement to add to their annual budgets.
380	Judy Volta	Mayor of Coburg. Provides information on attempts of the City of Coburg to take steps to reduce dependence on revenue from the court system. Relates personal story regarding the receipt of speeding tickets. Asks committee to be patient with the City of Coburg. Asks committee to not allow SB 1074 to go forward.

112	Bosley	Replies no. Discusses personal ethics.
116	Sen. Shields	Verifies that witness mentioned that they give warnings, but never write tickets unless the person is going over 80 mph.

119	Sen. Shields	Verifies the speed limit is 65 mph on the section of road that goes through Coburg.

121	Sen. Shields	States that he has only been stopped once in the state of Oregon, and he was only going 77 mph. Points out that the speed limit is 65 mph and they are giving tickets to people going over 80 mph.
128	Sen. Ferrioli	Points out that at the very least the City of Coburg has a public relations problem. Provides examples of other cities that have engaged in aggressive enforcement. Explains that, to some extent, the actions of Coburg reflect on the legislature. Discusses the speed trap on the stretch of freeway. Discusses the percentage of revenue that is received from ticketing. Discusses policy change by the superintendent of the Oregon State Police. Continues discussion of public relations problem.
188	Volta	Clarifies that the city has reduced their reliance to 25 percent.
190	Sen. Ferrioli	Points out other cities are around 15 percent.
191	Volta	Replies they are working toward that direction.
192	Sen. Ferrioli	States he can see that trajectory. Believes the damage to credibility has been done. Commends the City of Coburg for their enforcement of removing dangerous people from the road. Discusses reliance on revenue. Asks if the bill has an emergency clause.
208	Chair Brown	States that if it has an emergency clause it will go into effect July 1.
209	Sen. Ferrioli	Asks what the City of Coburg could do to assure Sen. Prozanski that this practice is going to be stopped before SB 1074 goes into effect.
211	Volta	Comments on date. Points out that the City of Coburg has made changes in the last six months. Believes the City of Coburg would need a year. Wants to see the Senate work with the City of Coburg.
221	Sen. Ferrioli	Asks when the change in administration took place.
222	Volta	Responds. Discusses ideas for other sources of revenue.
238	Sen. Ferrioli	Asks what the witness would suggest that Sen. Prozanski say to the next 200 people that are cited on I-5 within the city limits of Coburg about the speed trap issue.
240	Volta	Asks for clarification.
241	Sen. Ferrioli	Repeats question.
245	Volta	Explains she has not talked personally with Sen. Prozanski, but states several of their staff people have talked with him about how to work with him. Expresses willingness to have a conversation and explains it has not resulted in any fruition.

253	Volta	Reiterates willingness to have a conversation.
255	Chair Brown	Explains this is a new issue for her. Expresses concerns that the legislature passed legislation in 2003 regarding the City of Coburg. Appreciates that the City of Coburg has had a change in administration.
270	Bosley	States that when this first became an issue, it was not uncommon to see a police officer on that stretch of highway every day of the week. Explains changes that have occurred.
283	Sen. Ringo	Remarks on witness' statement.
292	Chair Brown	States it is a sad comment on the funding the legislature gives to the Oregon State Police.
294	Sen. Ringo	Replies yes. Believes SB 1074 is not meant as a personal rebuke, but is intended to address a problem. Asks about the annexation

		that occurred that was mentioned in the Register-Guard editorial.
301	Volta	Asks when that annexation occurred.
311	Sen. Ringo	Explains the annexation.
		Verifies that, before the annexation, the Coburg city limits did not include any stretch of I-5, and after the annexation it did.
315	Volta	Confirms that it crossed I-5.
316	Sen. Ringo	Verifies the annexation did not occur for the purposes of facilitating the speed trap.
317	Volta	Believes it did not. Explains that some people feel that it did.
325	Don Schuessler	Coburg City Council President. Reiterates steps taken by the city of Coburg to reduce dependence upon fines as a revenue source.
		Explains that SB 1074 will hinder the city of Coburg.
368	Sen. Bill Morissette	Senate District 6. Gives background information on the City of Coburg. Testifies regarding SB 1074.

093	Sen. Morissette	States that he did have one conversation with Sen. Prozanski after the previous hearing in the Judiciary Committee. Discusses amendments.
