<b><u>HB 2157C – PUBLIC HEARING</u></b>		
011	Rep. Vicki Berger	House District 20. Chair, House General Government Committee. Explains that HB 2157C begins to address protecting the public in the hiring of employees who have access to confidential information and the potential for harm. There are issues of civil liberties. This bill attempts to determine on an agency-by-agency basis who should get a background check.
035	Rep. Kevin Cameron	House District 19. States that an interim work group has been requested to address this issue on a continual basis.
058	Rep. Cameron	Notes that Section 2 outlines the process for state agencies and clarifies that the State Police are the stop gap for fingerprint records.
085	Kevin Neely	Department of Justice, Representing Attorney General Hardy Meyers. States that this bill has gone through a lot of work and is an important bill addressing public safety.
090	Patricia Whitfield	Section Director, Oregon State Police. Submits prepared testimony in support of HB 2157C ( <b>EXHIBIT A</b> ). States that Section 2 streamlines and consolidates the process for non-criminal background checks. Notes that the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) approves HB 2157C.
114	Randy Harnish	Department of Education. Explains that this bill removes the \$42 cap per applicant and allows them to set the fees by administrative rule. Notes that without the bill, their cost for this information is \$16,000 per month.
128	Chair Brown	Announces there are conflict amendments on HB 2157C that will be ready on Friday.
131	Andrea Meyer	Legislative Director, American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) of Oregon. Submits and reads prepared testimony expressing concerns with HB 2157C and providing background information on the use of criminal background checks ( <b>EXHIBIT B</b> ). Reviews Section 2 and the increased number of background checks under HB 2157C.
203	Meyer	Continues to review concerns. Notes that the – C22 amendments address the ACLU’s concerns in Section 71 ( <b>EXHIBIT C</b> ). Expresses concern about the exclusion of the Oregon State Lottery.
238	Chair Brown	Closes the public hearing on HB 2157C and opens the work session on HB 3352B.

307 Tiffany Harris Committee Administrator. Explains the provisions of SB 2461B.  
 313 Phil Miles Chief Deputy County Clerk, Marion County. Representing the Association of County Clerks. Submits prepared testimony in support of HB 2461B (**EXHIBIT D**). Explains there have been instances where the notary has made substantial errors to the document. States the bill is needed to provide education.

343 Sen. Atkinson Asks how often is training done and who administers it.  
 368 Miles Answers once a year and he believes it can be done with existing funds.

380 Chair Brown Notes there is no fiscal impact statement.  
 383 Peter Threlkel Director, Corporation Division, Secretary of State. Explains that training is currently provided on a voluntary basis. Explains the options that are available to meet the requirements of a mandate.

391 Sen. Ringo Speculates that a large corporation would have notaries that have the knowledge of what they are doing.  
 411 Miles Responds that this is not true and describes a recent occurrence where more than half of 75 Satisfaction of Mortgage documents were rejected because the documents were not the originals.

Submits a summary of HB 3238A with the –A18 amendments which removes the language relative to legislative review of rules and waiver of rules (**EXHIBIT F**). Adds that the -A20 amendments remove the emergency clause (**EXHIBIT G**).

070 John DiLorenzo, Jr. Oregonians for Sound Economic Policy. Compares the –A19 and –A20 amendments (**EXHIBIT G**) and explains that the –A20 amendments are preferred to the –A19 because of the deletion of the emergency clause; otherwise they are identical. Reviews the provisions of the amendments.

084 Shawn Miller Liberty Northwest Insurance. Notes that this bill was SB 984 which passed the Senate General Government Committee and the Senate Floor. States for the record they did not get approval on the language from House Leadership.

102	Chair Brown	Asks if the State Accident Insurance Fund Corporation (SAIF) testified in opposition to SB 984.
104	Sen. Shields	Responds there were concerns about the insurance pool portion of SB 984 that is not included in HB 3238A.
108	Sen. Vicki Walker	Senate District 7. States that SAIF Corp. testified on March 3, 2005 regarding the tax status issue in SB 984.
120	Chris Davie	SAIF Corp. Responds that SAIF Corp. testified to the House committee that SB 984 was not necessary because the Department of Consumer and Business Services (DCBS) already have authority for directing the workers' compensation system. Refers to Subsection 2 of the amendments noting that private insurance companies believe it would be a disincentive in the marketplace.
150	Sen. Ringo	Notes that the second paragraph (-A19, Section 11) says "may adopt rules" and asks if this is a problem.
151	Davie	Responds that it leaves the discretion to the director.
154	Sen. Shields	Recalls that Senator Frank Morse raised the issue of why the assigned risk pool was so large. Inquires to understand why the bill was taken apart on the House side.
165	Davie	Responds that this has to do with the way insurance companies' price their business and does not affect the assigned risk program.
182	Sen. Walker	Disagrees. States the bill is aimed at ensuring that everyone has fair rates, fair access to the system, and the application of objective criteria.
191	Davie	Responds that there was language in a previous version of the bill relative to rating criteria that is not in this amendment.
191	Sen. Walker	Recalls that when SB 984 was in the Senate General Government Committee on June 2, 2005 there was no opposition stated at that time. Asks what changed on the House side.
207	Davie	Responds that his recollection is that there was no testimony on the amendments that were ultimately amended into SB 984.
215	Sen. Walker	Notes that Jack Monroe and Cory Streisinger testified. Inquires whether Mr. Campbell is a contract lobbyist for SAIF.
217	Davie	Answers affirmatively.
218	Sen. Walker	Asks is the contract cancelable.
219	Davie	Answers the contract has an expiration date.
232	Sen. Walker	Asks did SAIF Corporation order its contract lobbyist to kill SB 984 on the House side and any amendment on the Senate side.
238	Davie	Answers that SAIF expressed their position to the lobbyist who spoke to members of the House. Notes that he (Mr. Davie) was not present during those discussions.
241	Sen. Walker	States there was an agreement to accept the amendments and now there is not. Asks if the contract lobbyist was involved in this.
243	Davie	Answers he is unaware of agreements that do or do not exist.

018	Robin Freeman	District Attorney's Association states support for SB 640. Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT). Suggests changing the language in the –A18 amendments Section 7(3)(b) deleting “biometric data of the operator” to “the operators identity” <b>(EXHIBIT K)</b> .
037	Chair Brown	Asks for information on Section 12 regarding competitive bidding.
044	Tom McCluellan	Interim Administrator, Driver and Motor Vehicle Services. States there is currently a contract with Digimarc. Section 12 will allow for amending the contract to do the facial recognition and extend the length of the contract.
053	Sen. Shields	Refers to a note from the Service Employees Union that requests the removal of Section 12.
062	Freeman	Explains that there are only two companies that do this work in the United States.
068	Jessica Stevens	Service Employees International Union (SEIU) Local 503. Submits prepared testimony in opposition to Section 12 <b>(EXHIBIT L)</b> . Expresses concern about the implementation of the technology. Suggests an outline of the parameters that determine if contracts need to be changed, addressed, modified or extended and states the process should include public input and accountability.
108	David Fidanque	Executive Director, American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) of Oregon. Submits and reads prepared testimony in opposition to SB 640 <b>(EXHIBIT M)</b> .

243	Fidanque	Expresses the concern is over the potential invasion of privacy by expanding the DMV database that might not be secure.

259	Fidanque	Discusses the insecurity of personal identifiers in a database. Notes recent database compromises of financial institutions and credit bureaus.
285	Sen. Ferrioli	Notes that people will not be asked to provide any information they are not already providing. Comments on the value of having the ability to compare photographic biometric data to prevent the issuance of false identification.
349	Fidanque	Agrees that facial recognition will be a valuable tool. Believes the technology will present more problems than it will solve.
377	Chair Brown	Summarizes Mr. Fidanque's concerns with a comparison of airport searches.
