### **OPENED PUBLIC HEARING HB 2043**

161	Lizbeth Martin-Mahar	Presented background on HB 2043, (Exhibit 3), and revenue impact statement, (Exhibit 4). There will be an amendment, as yet undrafted.
196	Sen. Charlie Ringo	Spoke in favor of HB 2043, citing traffic congestion, associated costs, and health impacts of air pollution. Said reduced auto insurance rates could provide the incentive needed to reduce congestion.
218	Rep. Verger	Did you consider limiting this bill to congested areas?
232	Sen. Ringo	For all areas it makes sense to give incentives to reduce driving. Discussed how insurance rates are based.
245	Rep. Verger	What about areas that don't have a transit option?
255	Sen Ringo	The bill is not intended to push people out of their cars; it is intended to price insurance based on time spent on the roads.
280	Chris Hagerbaumer	Spoke in favor of HB 2043, (Exhibit 4). Described Pay-as-You-Drive, (PAYD) program benefits, consumer options, costs, impacts on the environment, pilot program by Progressive. Will be proposing two amendments.
420	Chair Shetterly	Could you describe what the amendments would look like?
422	Hagerbaumer	The amendments are suggested by a business advisory committee, allowing a company with no tax liability, in the year that the premiums are sold, to roll tax credit forward to year tax liability is incurred, or to sell the credits to a company that does have tax liability.
444	Verger	Did you consider using this in congested areas only?
449	Hagerbaumer	Insurance companies would pilot this in Oregon or the Northwest and it would be offered to interested parties. Did not want to limit program because there was interest in rural areas for the program.
465	Rep. Verger	Explained and asked for comment on the many low income individuals in her district who have to commute in order to find employment, sometimes for an hour and a half.
480	Hagerbaumer	Insurance company to offer PAYD as an option and would be an opportunity

		to save money.
503	Rep. Verger	As a member of the Road User Fee Task Force, asked about privacy issue associated with the technology.

032	Hagerbaumer	Explained that individual might stay in a fixed fee system and not opt into the program.
047	Rep. Scott	How do you see the audit process working and how will it be paid for?
051	Hagerbaumer	Expects a situation with a mechanic, or a Jiffy Lube, to certify odometer readings. It does cost money which is why the bill would provide for sunset in a few years.
061	Rep. Barnhart	How many miles would be a break even point for PAYD, or a flat rate?
068	Hagerbaumer	ODOT estimates the average Oregon driver drives 12,000 per year, anyone who drives less might want to opt into the program. Estimate a third of drivers, might be interested in the PAYD concept.
076	Barnhart	This would appeal to people that drive less than the average?
078	Hagerbaumer	Answered affirmatively.
080	Barnhart	Someone who drives more, would pay more than on a fixed rate plan?
083	Hagerbaumer	The bill does not tell the insurance companies how to operate the program. Feels insurance companies might require fixed payment and provide reward on back end.
088	Chair Shetterly	This bill does not dictate how insurance program is set up?
089	Hagerbaumer	No.
100	Rep. Dingfelder	Spoke in support of HB 2043, (Exhibit 5). Discussed voluntary nature and affects on traffic congestion. Cited recent transportation study on travel time ranking, and congested lane miles showing declines in Portland's ranking. Projects passage of bill would reduce vehicle miles traveled by 5 to 15%, delaying need for highway infrastructure projects.
141	Rep. Verger	How can we justify tax credits on something the insurance companies could do already?
152	Rep. Dingfelder	This is a voluntary program, not requiring insurance companies to make it available.
160	Rep. Dingfelder	Discussed benefits and offsets to the Oregon.
172	Rep. Dingfelder	This is a pilot project, the sunset will enable legislature to review how the program is working.
176	Scott Bricker	Discussed affect of incentives on transportation programs, and benefit PAYD would be to bicyclists and walkers, (Exhibit 6). Also cited health benefits and savings to chronic disease costs.
250		Questions and discussion regarding cycling on the coast, and long distance

commuting.

275	Lynn Lundquist	The Environment Committee and the Transportation Committee of the OBA both endorsed the concept of PAYD. Spoke to issues that arose during the hearing.
306	Lundquist	<ul> <li>Privacy issues can be avoided by driving to see the agent annually.</li> <li>Principle of the bill, a person driving less, should pay less.</li> <li>It's a pilot project, should not subsidize the insurance industry except for start-up.</li> </ul>
328	Gevurtz	Spoke in support of HB 2043, (Exhibit 7), citing Oregon Interfaith Global Warming Campaign and moral obligation to be ethical consumers and stewards of the planet.
413	Rep. Verger	This is an excellent bill for areas where there is congestion and where there is a great deal of pollution? Would it be more economical and at less expense to do a pilot program in the Mid-Valley of Oregon as opposed to all of the state?
421	Gevurtz	Grew up in the rural community, with dollars being tight, people have to make monetary choices. Problem is the tight timeline for world health and well being. This bill would give industry and individuals the opportunity to be part of the solution.
