#### **OPENS PUBLIC HEARING ON 2135**

120	Yates	Explains HB 2135 which defines the General Funds to include payments into those funds or accounts specifically established in law as funds or accounts in the General Fund, makes payments into all other funds or accounts separate and distinct, continuously appropriates moneys in trust funds to the agency administering the trust, revises procedures for registering warrants if General Fund is exhausted, clarifies authority of Treasurer to pay moneys out of State Treasury, and specifies circumstances under which Treasurer may require agency to stop issuing payment obligations. 140	Bond	Gives background of HB 2135. Discusses each section in detail and testifies in support of HB 2135 because it fixes inconsistencies in the statutes dealing with the definition of the General Fund, clarifies and modernizes the language dealing with the process put in place should the State run out of money and be unable to pay General Fund warrants, clarifies the language dealing with the Treasurer's authorization, provides the Treasurer authority to revoke an agency's ability to issue payment items, and gives the Treasurer the authority to deal with agencies overdraft accounts. 		Clarifying questions and answers interspersed.
320	Sen. Deckert	Asks if the Treasury currently follows the procedures in section 10.
330	Bond	Responds affirmatively.
336	Sen. Ferrioli	Asks about the purpose of overdraft charges.
348	Bond	Responds that an overdraft is an unauthorized interfund borrowing and that they have to issue an interest charge to compensate the agencies borrowed from.
		Discussion follows.
380	Sen. Ferrioli	Asks if this bill gives the State Treasury the authority to transfer money from dedicated funds.
406	Bond	Responds that this wouldn't give the Treasury the authority to go into the General Fund or funds that have legal restrictions.
		Discussion follows.

421	Sen. Ferrioli	Asks where the Treasury goes if there is no money in the General Fund.
429	Bond	Responds that the Treasury would then go to the Legislature.
		Discussion follows.
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003	Sen. Ferrioli	Asks if the bill gives the Treasury the authority to borrow from other agencies funds to cover overdraft charges.
006	Bond	Responds that this bill doesn't do that, but that they already have the authority to.
028	Sen. Ringo	Asks if there are some circumstances for revoking a check that aren't addressed in the bill and if the Treasury should be given broader authority.
039	Bond	Responds that they tried not to make it so broad that agencies would be scared to write checks and testify against the bill.
		Questions and answers interspersed.
068	Sen. Deckert	Asks if any agencies expressed opposition.
070	Bond	Responds that there were a few questions, but they were all answered.
075	Sen. Starr	Asks if there is a rationale that led to the statute requiring three constitutional officers and why it is being changed to two.
085	Bond	Responds that he doesn't know why it was that way, but that their rational is they don't want to have an outlier hold back the process because they don't understand the implications.
103	Sen. Deckert	Asks if there has been any situation where agencies couldn't pay their bills.
105	Bond	Responds that Oregon has not had to issue warrants before and that the only case he is aware of was in California 10 years ago. States that Oregon is as close as it has ever been to being in this situation.
		Discussion follows.
127	Sen. Ringo	Suggests that it isn't a good idea to eliminate one constitutional officer because during such difficult times all of the top officers of the State should be on board.
136	Bond	Responds that the worst thing that could happen was if one of the officers didn't agree because the warrants would still be returned, just not as orderly and without interest.
		Discussion follows.
192	Kate Richardson	Responds that it is a protection for the people because it allows it to be handled in an orderly manner and is interest bearing. States that it would make a bad situation much worse if one person held out for whatever reason.
231	Sen. Ferrioli	Asks it the Treasury looked at the history of the statute that says the three need to be unanimous.
235	Bond	Responds negatively.

Discussion follows.

- 254 Sen. Ferrioli Argues that in a doomsday scenario, although the issuing of warrants is necessary and should be automatic, the three top officers of the state should be in agreement.
- 310 Sen. Starr Agrees with Sen. Ferrioli.
- 313 Sen. Deckert Asks about the circumstances of the California situation in regards to the constitutional officers.
- 314 Bond Responds that he doesn't know.
