| 039 | Dick Yates | Gives overview of the major provisions of HB 2041, beginning with bonds and annual taxes and fees. Refer to HB 2041 Overview (Exhibit 1) and staff measure summary (Exhibit 2). |
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| 168 | Yates | Continues with discussion on income tax capture and the truck engine tax credit. |
| 284 | Sen. Deckert | Asks if this bill favors dump trucks. |
| 286 | Yates | Responds that they are favoring them, but not by a large amount. |
| 295 | Sen. Ferrioli | Asks how many long haul dump trucks there are doing interstate commerce. |
| 297 | Yates | Responds that he doesn't know. |
| 299 | Sen. Ferrioli | States that there are none because it is assumed that they are locally owned facilities doing short haul projects and that is why dump trucks pay less. |
| 308 | Yates | Responds that he doesn't believe that to be the case. Discusses estimates of |

the income tax capture.

OPENS PUBLIC HEARING ON HB 2747 B

420 Andi Jordan Testifies in support of adequate and stable school funding. Refer to written testimony (Exhibit 5).

| 017 | Andy Saultz | Testifies in support of HB 2747–B8 amendments because it would stabilize Oregon's tax structure and set up a dedicated source of funding for k-12, in turn allowing other programs in the General Fund to thrive, such as Opportunity Grants. Refer to written testimony (Exhibit 6). |
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| 052 | Chris Dudley | Testifies in support of HB 2747-B8 amendments because Oregon is over reliant on the volatile income tax and needs tax reform in order to keep Oregon the kind of place people want to live in. Discusses previous achievements of Oregon schools and the downturn they are facing. Refer to Public Education in Oregon (Exhibit 7). Discusses unfunded federal mandates for schools. |
| 089 | Sen. Starr | Asks how much federal funds flows into Oregon for education. |
| 093 | Dudley | Responds that he doesn't know. |
| 095 | Sen. Starr | Suggests that the No Child Left Behind Act might not be completely funded but there are significant federal funds flowing into Oregon for education. |
| 098 | Dudley | Responds that he will get information about funds dedicated for certain acts inside the federal agenda describing why the money is not adequate for the outcomes expected. Points out that Oregon is lucky because they set up high standards and requirements early on. |
| 122 | Sen. Deckert | Asks if reform should come from the Legislature or from citizens. |
| 128 | Jordan | Responds that members of the PTA believe the Legislature should because that is what they were elected to do. |
| 136 | Saultz | Responds that they haven't directly talked about this, but that he favors a decision in this building because tuition is being decided right now and they need a decision as soon as possible in order to keep tuition down in the fall. |
| 143 | Dudley | Responds that it has to be both because if one group supports tax reform and another opposes it, mixed messages will be sent and the measure will fail. |
| 179 | Ozzie Rose | Testifies in support of HB 2747-B8 amendments because a consumption tax of some sort needs to be added to current tax system to balance the system and adequately fund schools. States that the Legislature needs to look at |

| | | information provided, write a proposal that will help the Oregon economy, and provide information to the public so they will be able to make informed decisions. |
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| 297 | Carol Robinson | Testifies in support of HB 2747-B8 amendments because Oregon citizens can't wait any longer for stable and adequate school funding and as voters have elected the legislature and the Governor to do the job. Refer to verbatim written testimony (Exhibit 8). |
| 375 | Lynn Lundquist | Testifies in support of tax reform and states that the Legislature needs to put forth the best plan possible in order for it to have a chance to succeed. Suggests using the Business Activity Tax as part of the package and that if the Legislature cannot stay here for a significant amount of time, that they come back immediately after the session ends and continue to hold hearings. Discusses the impacts of Measure 5 on the share of taxes paid by businesses. |

| 060 | Sen. Ringo | Asks if the current tax structure is unfriendly to business. |
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| 062 | Lundquist | Responds that it is not <i>un</i> friendly, but there are ways to improve the system to make it friendlier. |
| 066 | Sen. Ringo | Asks if the high personal income tax rate is an incentive for owners of business to locate in other states. |
| 072 | Lundquist | Responds affirmatively. |
| 075 | Sen. Ringo | Asks if OBA has taken a hard look at the business activity tax. |
| 077 | Lundquist | Responds negatively, but states that they will when the time is necessary. |
| 082 | Sen. Ringo | States that some legislators believe that the question of revenue reform should be addressed after the close of session and that others believe they need the pressure of session on them to do that work and that if OBA believes in the latter they need to submit their position as soon as possible. |
| 088 | Lundquist | Responds that they have a hard time believing that the heat comes off once the session ends. |
| 103 | Sen. Ringo | Encourages OBA to start working on this and give their opinion as soon as possible so that the Legislature knows where they stand. |
| 105 | Lundquist | Responds that OBA will be there in support of whatever the Legislature decides to do. |
| 111 | Sen. Corcoran | Asks if OBA is working with anyone outside the building to look at |
| 112 | Lundquist | Responds affirmatively. |
| 113 | Sen. Corcoran | Asks who they are working with. |
| 115 | Lundquist | Responds that he can't say, but they have been working with a group of people for over a year. |
| 131 | Michael Slater | Testifies in support of HB 2747-B8 because Oregon needs comprehensive tax reform and that now is the time to do it in the Legislature. Offers support for a broad based consumption tax such as Sen. Schrader's proposal. |

| 164 | Tina Kotek | Testifies in support of HB 2747-B8 amendments because Oregon needs tax reform and more stability and adequacy. States that people need short term solutions and long term reform. |
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| 204 | Phillip Kennedy- Wong | Testifies in support of HB 2747-B8 amendments because the time for tax reform is now. States that churches have been forced to turn people in need away and that services need to be restored. |
| 267 | Paul Warner | Discusses the Oregon Tax Incidence Model and the results of the business activity tax using the model. Refer to OTIM Results (Exhibit 9). |
| 404 | Sen. Corcoran | States that it seems like the group that benefits the most is the highest income earners. |
| 406 | Warner | Responds affirmatively and continues discussion. |

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| 121 | Kristina McNitt | Explains the policy behind the -4 amendments, which was to prevent gaming of the 20-80 deferral program created in HB 2197. |
| 136 | Clint Bentz | Testifies in support of the -4 amendments because it prevents gaming of the 20-80 deferral program, while allowing land owners who do not game the system to benefit. |
| 163 | Sen. Ringo | Asks whether this would allow any type of gaming by transferring to shelters. |
| 166 | Bentz | Responds negatively. |
| 179 | Sen. Ringo | Asks if there is a revenue impact with this amendment. |
| 181 | Yates | Responds negatively. |

| 185 | Sen. Ringo | Asks what the original bill does. |
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| 188 | Yates | Responds that it began as cleaning up obsolete language, but once HB 2197 was passed, they had to change the language to resolve conflicts with the -1 amendments and the -4 amendments were proposed to solve the problem of gaming the system. |
| 220 | Sen. Starr | MOTION: MOVES HB 2188-1 AMENDMENTS DATED BE ADOPTED. |
