014	Dick Yates	Explains the -2 amendments (Exhibit 1) which replaces the original bill and increases the fee for obtaining an identification device in connection with the weight-mile tax and reduces fees for registration cards, plates and stickers. Refer to staff measure summary (Exhibit 2).
020	Mike Marsh	Testifies in support of SB 469 because it fixes problems discovered with the implementation of HB 2041. Refer to written testimony (Exhibit 3).
055	Bob Russell	Testifies in support of SB 469-2 amendments because it is necessary for the implementation of HB 2041.
060	Sen. Hannon	Asks if the truckers will stop at the point of entry to obtain a sticker.
062	Russell	Responds that they can obtain them at the point of entry or a variety of other ways.
071	Sen. Hannon	Asks if truckers will have to wait for long periods at points of entry waiting for them to open up.
075	Russell	Responds negatively.

125	Sen. Hannon	Explains the -2 amendments (Exhibit 4) which addresses Longview Fibre Co. and urges support.
145	Lizbeth Martin-Mahar	Explains the -3 (Exhibit 5) amendments which add the components of SB 549 A to allow for an increase in the maximum payroll tax rate for mass transit districts by 1% of the wages paid of each employee. Refer to staff measure summary (Exhibit 6). Discusses the revenue impact of the -3 amendment (Exhibit 7). Explains the -4 amendments (Exhibit 8) which deletes the original bill and increases the research and development tax credit. Refer to staff measure summary (Exhibit 9). Discusses the revenue impact for the -4 amendments (Exhibit 9). Discusses the revenue impact for the -4 amendments (Exhibit 10). Explains the -7 amendments (Exhibit 11) which does not delete the existing bill and just adds the increase in the research credit to it. Discusses the revenue impact for the -7 amendments (Exhibit 12).
222	Sen. Deckert	Asks if the change in the research credit conforms to federal law and increases the cap to \$1 million.
225	Martin-Mahar	Responds affirmatively.
233	Sen. Nelson	Asks how to sort out all these bills.
240	Sen. Deckert	Responds that the ones most strongly under consideration are the -2, -3, and -7 amendments.
250	Fred Hansen	Testifies in support of the -3 amendments because it would allow TriMet to access federal discretionary funds to expand mass transit. Discusses widespread business support. Refer to written testimony (Exhibit 13).

286	Sen. Starr	Asks about the federal funds that are at risk if this bill does not pass.
294	Hansen	Responds that the dollar amount would be over a six year period and would be around \$400 million for projects that would be matched by local dollars and private investment.
325	Sen. Deckert	Points out that this is not imposing but rather allowing Tri-Met to go ahead with this tax.
332	Olivia Clark	Points out that the Lane Transit District is also in support of the amendment.
336	Paul Phillips	Testifies in strong support of the -7amendments because moving to a single sales factor would keep Oregon competitive and the research credit would help technology companies.
378	Sen. Ringo	Asks about the OTIM analysis that said this would create 20 jobs and asks for the realistic estimate.
387	Phillips	Responds that there are a lot more benefits than just 20 jobs and that in every other state that moves to a single sales factor, there has been a positive return and jobs created.
450	Sen. Starr	Asks about what the passage of this bill means to keeping headquarters in the state.
453	Phillips	Responds that this would help Oregon with the problem of attracting and retaining corporate headquarters.

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031	Sen. Deckert	Asks about start-up companies and how the research credit would impact them.
034	Jim Craven	Responds that the R&D credit increases the allowable cap and broadens the definition. States that there are exciting things going on to give a signal that economic development is in Oregon's future.
065	Sen. Ferrioli	Asks about the -4 amendments.
070	Phillips	Responds that they are not supportive of the -4 amendments.
072	Sen. Ferrioli	States that the next big thing could be anything and might not fit into the current definition.
080	Phillips	States that he agrees with Sen. Ferrioli and that is why the identical language is in the -7 amendments.
085	Sen. Hannon	MOTION: MOVES HB 3183-2 AMENDMENTS DATED 6/27/03 BE ADOPTED.
090	Sen. Metsger	Asks if this would conflict with any other portion of the bill they intend to adopt.
