		• SB 706, which prohibits person other than person signing petition from writing information about person signing petition on signature sheet of state initiative or referendum petition or recall petition
		• SB 780, which directs chief petitioner of state initiative petition to file signature sheet with Secretary of State not later than 90 days after date first signature was obtained on signature sheet
		Submits written testimony (EXHIBITS A, B). Discusses forgery issue (video) and informs how to alleviate the problem.

293	Sen. Burdick	Explains other concerns, with people moving and changing counties. Comments that as the chief petitioner the issue was getting on the ballot and there was adequate time for that.
312	Sen. Richard Devlin	District 19. Testifies in support of SB 678. Points out the bill requires a witness when signing an initiative.
351	Sen. Devlin	Testifies in support of SB 680 and offers information on falsifying a signature on a witness sheet. Explains cases where this has happened.
387	Co-chair Brown	With public hearing on SB 678, SB 680, SB 706 and SB 780 remaining open, opens public hearing to include SB 565.

287	Meek	Testifies in opposition to SB 780 and offers information on deadlines for turning in signature sheets. Testifies in support of SB 680 and SB 565 only if the bills are amended. Discusses the initiative primary process which would eliminate fraudulent signatures.

241	John Lindback	Elections Division, Secretary of State. Discusses problems with writers, and petitions that are turned in from counties where the signatures were filled in by writers, which has created serious problems.
308	Sen. Burdick	Asks if he would have a problem if the signature gatherer prints the name above an illegible signature the name of the signer.
314	Lindback	Agrees there is no problem with this.
315	Sen. Burdick	Notes even people who have disabilities in writing still want to

		sign the petitions.
