006	Diane Lewis	Committee Administrator. Provides measure history on HB 2259. Submits HB 2259 –1 amendments (EXHIBIT A).
030	Jane Meyers	Oregon Dental Association. Provides testimony in support of the –1 amendments.
041	Susan Wilson	Director of the Health Licensing Office. Submits written testimony (EXHIBIT B). Clarifies that the proposed amendment corrects language that was created by the 1997 Legislature and that language would synchronize the board with other operations within the office.
046	Rep. Krummel	Asks for clarification of ORS 680.542 and its purpose.
049	Meyers	Explains that it is the statute that deals with the Denture Technology Board and lays out all the requirements.

340 Rep. Carlson Responds that she is more familiar with the family resource centers in Springfield, which are all school-based except the community center. Adds that there is a district-level advisory committee in place, which has proven to be very successful.

250	Mike Harris	Representing Coalition for Community Learning Centers. Submits and provides testimony in support of HB 2082. Provides letters of support from various community agencies (EXHIBIT G) .
300	Harris	Continues with testimony on integrated services.
360	Julianne Cullen	Social Service Coordinator, St. Helens School District. Submits and provides testimony in favor of HB 2082 (EXHIBIT H) .
410	Cullen	Continues with testimony on parent involvement.
450	Cullen	Continues with testimony on providing services to families that are homeless.

101	Rep. Krummel	Asks Mr. Harris about the types of support within school organizations.
117	Harris	Responds that there is strong support from teachers’ unions because they were able to show positive impact in support of student and family well being.
139	Rep. Monnes-Anderson	Refers to a note from Jim Green, lobbyist for the Oregon School Boards’ Association (OSBA) stating support from school districts.
142	Rep. Barnhart	Asks if the model would provide assistance to teachers in performing social work services.
165	Cullen	Responds that these services are already provided because of their access and because of their collaborations. States that they have the resources to go out and find needs for families such as

191	Cullen	Asks how they would increase the involvement of parents. Responds that one of their efforts to get parent participation was to provide family nights once a month.
210	Riley	Responds that the effort is for the center to provide activities for people within the community in order to get people interacting so that the school is seen as a hub of community life and participation.
234	Rep. Barnhart	Asks if they are able to get involvement from people who are not parents.
237	Cullen	Responds that they do.
260	Linda Simington	Administrator, Portland Public Schools. Provides testimony in support of HB 2082.
299	Simington	Continues with testimony on student service plans. Describes a process in place wherein a mixed group of people (district staff and outside community resources) meet weekly to review student concerns.
357	Lewis	Refers to the weekly meetings and asks if there are issues of confidentiality when sharing information among participants and how those issues are addressed.
365	Simington	Explains that they have permission forms that are signed by families before the meetings take place.
372	Rep. Barnhart	Asks how the programs are funded.
380	Simington	Explains that funding is provided through grants and from various community organizations
400	Alice Black	Administrator, Gresham Barlow School District. Provides testimony in support of HB 2082.

015	Black	Continues with testimony and provides account of two students who have benefited from their program; how the community center advocated positively.
048	Rep. Monnes-Anderson	Asks about the types of evaluations that the center will provide.
056	Black	Responds that the evaluation will show the program's effectiveness.
064	Rep. Monnes-Anderson	Asks if there is an advisory group and how they communicate with the Commission on Children and Families.
067	Black	Explains that their co-managers sit with the caring community in the area who have access to all of the agencies and different services.
077	Rep. Monnes-Anderson	Asks about funding for the centers.
080	Black	Explains that currently they are funded through Multnomah County, the City of Portland and the City of Gresham. Adds that they are also looking at additional support funds through grants.
100	Chair Kruse	Directs Rep. Monnes-Anderson to section 8, page 5 of the bill and states that lines 10 and 11 were completely rewritten in the proposed amendments which speaks to the appropriation.
114	Rep. Krummel	Asks if the –4 amendments were the appropriate amendments.
119	Lewis	Provides clarification of the proposed –4 amendments (EXHIBIT J) which were created in order to correct a minor technical change on page 2 of the bill relating to appropriations.
121	Denise Goer	Representing Metropolitan Family Service. Provides testimony in support of HB 2082. Reads letters from parents in support of

		the SUN program.
183	Rep. Garrard	Provides appreciation of the program in its support towards Latino youth and asks about the program's effort in supporting African-American youth.
192	Goer	Responds that they are doing a fine job in reaching marginalized communities.
230	Rep. Krummel	Refers to the SUN model and asks how the students have performed in meeting benchmarks.
232	Goer	Responds that at Lane Middle School, behavioral referrals dropped almost by half in the first year, as well as the number of suspensions and there was a significant increase in 8 th grade reading benchmarks.
260	Laurie Baird	Administrator, Parrish Middle School, Salem. Submits and provides testimony in support of HB 2082 (EXHIBIT K).
301	Doug Thompson	Associate Director, Salem Boys and Girls Club. Submits and provides testimony in support of HB 2082 (EXHIBIT L).
350	Thompson	Continues with testimony on high-yield learning activities.
420	Baird	Resumes testimony on efforts with advisory committees.
482	Baird	Continues with testimony on staffing.

070	Baird	Explains that there are about five different volunteer groups.
082	Chair Kruse	Comments on the efforts of the Boys and Girls Club in Roseburg.
099	Rep. Monnes-Anderson	Asks about the need for the statute, since appropriating moneys are being removed from the bill.
108	Chair Kruse	Explains that just because a specific amount of money is being removed, it does not mean that moneys cannot be directed towards it. Adds that the bill basically provides for structure.
121	Lewis	Clarifies that part of what HB 2082 does is that it defines how various state agencies may support local communities to implement and sustain community learning centers, which currently does not exist in statute.
150	Chair Kruse	Further clarifies that by putting language into statute, "this will allow agencies to do things that they probably want to do, but maybe couldn't do because no one has told them that they can."
159	Rep. Monnes-Anderson	Asks for clarification on language included on page 5 of the proposed -4 amendments
162	Committee discusses the	proposed -4 amendments.
270	Chair Kruse	Defers further public testimony on HB 2082 until the March 15 meeting.
283	Chair Kruse	Closes the public hearing on HB 2082 and adjourns the committee at 4:00 p.m.
