Voices concern over the lack of adequate health care for people who transition out of the prison system, but sees the bill as addressing the issue.

States that if the state were to do what the bill directs, it would represent an additional form of outreach for the health plan and result in more people being covered. Adds that there is a cost to this additional outreach, which is not covered in the Governor's recommended budget. [Discussion.]

239                    Rep. Monnes-Anderson

Comments on the critical importance of having the mentally ill and pregnant women be able to continue on the Oregon Health Plan. Refers to amendment language relating to pregnant women and asks Mr. Crawford for his opinion on the amendment language.

245                    Crawford

Responds that he supports the amendment more than the original bill. Explains that his only concern with the amendment language is if a pregnant woman leaves the institution to deliver her baby, she is not eligible for Medicaid because she is still an inmate of a public institution. [Discussion.]

298                    Rep. Walker

Clarifies that the language in the amendment is due to a problem that has surfaced in that many women in corrections who are pregnant have addictions. When delivery is imminent, they have to release them because there is no facility to take care of them, which results in no health coverage for drug treatment. States that often the new mothers revert to their previous drug-using behaviors.

140	Rep. Morrisette	Expresses two concerns surrounding this issue: dollars supporting coalition members, and increase funding for smoking cessation based on population. [Discussion.]
186	Rep. Garrard	Comments on the abuse of tobacco reduction moneys by counties.
188	Higginson	Responds that the health division’s program is not inept, but agrees that mistakes have been made. [Discussion.]
263	Rep. Barnhart	Asks Dr. Higginson if he understands the chore of differentiating the expenditure of public funds for advocacy, versus education use of funds.
271	Higginson	Responds that the policy is clear, but there is a gray line that is sometimes difficult to see. The challenge for the health division is to get out policy materials on what is acceptable. [Discussion.]
297	Rep. Barnhart	Refers to submitted material relating to target benchmarks and asked when were the targets devised.
305	Higginson	Responds that he will have to get the information from the Oregon Progress Board.
320	Rep. Monnes	Refers to testimony wherein a decline of 41% percent of 8 <sup>th</sup> grade students in smoking was reported. Asks if he has this breakdown by county.
324	Higginson	Responds that the information comes from a survey funded by the Youth Risk Behavior Survey, which is done every other year in Oregon and involves over 40,000 students, but it is not done in every school or in every county. [Discussion.]
402	Rep. Krummel	Asks if there is ever 100 percent success.
414	Higginson	Responds that as long as people have choice, they are going to

have the ability to select some risky behaviors.

- 027 Rep. Krummel Refers to submitted material relating to grants and awarded to counties and asks for description of the reduction/increase in funding dollars.
- 032 Higginson Responds that Lake County should have a similar amount to show in the 1999-2001 column, but at the time it was printed they did not have a “body” ready to accept the dollars.
- 078 Rep. Morrisette Comments on smoking cessation measures taken and states his belief that the measure of success is how school-age children are affected.
- 101 Higginson Agrees that decreasing smoking in youth is a critical aspect of the program. Adds that concern that most of the efforts need to be focused on youth is not necessarily true. [Discussion.]
- 132 Rep. Barnhart Asks if he knows how much money tobacco companies spend on advertisements
- 134 Higginson Responds that he does not have the numbers but would guess that the numbers spent in advertisement is more than numbers they are spending in prevention and education.
- 138 Rep. Monnes-Anderson States that the way the bill is written, moneys will go to counties on a population basis. Voices concern on moneys being used on activities other than tobacco prevention.
- 142 Higginson Responds that this is one of the division’s concerns as well.
- 153 Rep. Lee Asks for clarification that 38 percent of the dollars go to counties (36 percent for coalitions, and 2 percent for training and materials).
- 157 Higginson Clarifies that the 1999 biennium is 36 percent for coalitions and 2 percent for training and materials.
- 164 Rep. Lee Suggests that language in line 7 of the bill should be amended to say “...38 percent shall be distributed to the governing body of each county.”
- 166 Higginson Responds that this would put in statute the current funding formulas, and in general believes it is better not to put those things in statute. [Discussion.]
- 204 Rep. Tom Butler House District 60. Presents testimony in support of HB 3524.
- 270 Rep. Butler Continues with testimony on the various uses of tobacco.
- 330 Rep. Monnes-Anderson Comments on best practices and restates her concern on moneys that are awarded to the county not being used specifically for tobacco prevention efforts.
