141	Vice Chair Carlson	Referenced a Fiscal Impact form prepared by the Agency and read the institutions that would be affected. (Exhibit 4)

214 Vice Carlson Chair The program you were interested in wasn't available at the school where you could have kept your grant?

217 Pat Hardie

Presented testimony in support of measure. (Exhibit 3)

Continued as a sub-committee at 2:31 with Rep.'s Bates, Hass, Witt and Vice Chair Carlson in attendance.

Convened as full committee at 2:47 p.m. with the arrival of Chair Shetterly.

329 Thomas Turner

Spoke in opposition to the measure.

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015 Vice Carlson Chair Questions and discussion regarding for purposes of clarification on the status of whether two institutions are separate or one. :

- 1. Clarified that Cascade College and City University are two separate universities.
- 2. Clarified what institutions were included in the listing given in the Fiscal Impact Form? (Exhibit 4)

031 Rep. Witt

Questions and discussion regarding:

1. Clarification that federal PELL grants are provided to students of these institutions on an equal footing with students at two and four-year traditional institutions.

- Questioned if it would be appropriate to apply federal criteria at a state level, dollars aside.
- 3. Verified that Turner's opposition to the measure is because of budget constraints not equity.
- O78 Rep. Bates Does your agency receive matching federal funding?
- On a limited basis, explained the funding mechanisms of the Oregon Student Assistance Commission.
- 137 Geoff Winkler Spoke to the measure; no position taken requested that in consideration of this measure the funding ramifications be considered.
- 186 Kathy Campbell Spoke to the measure; no position taken.
- 217 Melissa Unger Spoke in opposition to the measure, not because she opposes the philosophy, but opposes enlarging the pool until adequate funding can be found.
- 232 Rep. Williams "The objection is not the four-year, for-profit institutions, the objection is that the need grant is not funded at an appropriate level?"
- 244 Winkler Yes.
- 250 Campbell Yes.
- 267 Unger Concurred with prior witnesses.
- 277 Rep. Williams

 Noted that a key component to this measure is allowing people to make educational choices and is concerned that the prior witnesses do not want to enlarge the pool for fear of diluting the dollars. Spoke of concern about "limiting the size of the lifeboat by not allowing the dollars to follow a student"
- 343 Rep. Hass Commented on debate and discussed his

perspective of the benefit — not only to the student, but the State as a whole.

- 372 Chair Shetterly Commented on debate and discussed that there is exclusion currently, just of a different sort.
- 399 Rep. Witt Questions and discussion regarding:
 - 1. Agreement that all students that qualify

are deserving and the programs are deserving.

2. Questioned if alternative policy decisions could be made.
