		Testifies in support of HB 2349, HB 2350 and HB 2562. This legislation would provide serious punishment and act as a deterrent for repeat property offenders. Without a serious deterrent, property crimes increase and offenders move on to bigger crimes. This legislation stops property offenders while intervention is still possible. Oregon has the highest rate of property crimes in the 9 western states, gives statistics. Since Measure 11 was passed in 1994, violent crime has dropped, but property crimes continue to increase.			
095	Rep. Prozanski	You mentioned a decriminalization based on SB 1145. Do you mean that certain crimes were dropped from felonies to misdemeanors?			
101	Doell	We have used local jails for 12-month sentences and anything beyond that was a prison sentence. Because the jails were so overcrowded, many offenders sentenced to 12 months would only serve 60 or 90 days.			
114	Rep. Prozanski	HB 3488 that was passed in 1996 focused on burglary and auto theft plus two other property crimes. What has the data shown in targeting those four high property crime areas?			
129	Doell	I do not have any specific data, but we have a problem with the law because a judge is trying to determine if the 13-month sentence was a minimum or maximum. Discusses multiple car thefts in Multnomah County that are still not getting stiff enough sentences.			
145	Rep. Prozanski	Are these individuals not getting higher sentences because the court is not imposing them, or is there no option for the judge to impose a longer sentence?			
153	Doell	I donit know the answer to that.			
155	Rep. Hansen	How long were people incarcerated before SB 1145 and how long are the sentences since SB 1145?			
163	Doell	I do not have the data, but SB 1145 is not working as it was designed because they have gotten overloaded with cases at the local level.			
167	Chair Mannix	We should ask the Department of Corrections to advise us of the sentencing			

		pattern for time sentenced and time served before and after SB 1145.
175	Rep. Hansen	I heard that SB 1145 was not working like anyone intended. The counties were getting half the number of prisoners as expected, but they were staying in jail twice as long as expected.
188	Rep. Prozanski	We need to ask the Department of Corrections (DOC) where people were located in the correctional facilities because many people were in transition awaiting release.
196	Chair Mannix	I didnit realize that if a person was sentenced for three felonies for one event, and each sentence was less than 12 months, the person served his sentence in the county jail. That could put a person in jail for over 3 years, and the county jails do not have rehabilitation programs designed to last three years.
224	James Rice	Oregon Criminal Defense Lawyerís Association
		Testifies in opposition to HB 2349, HB 2350 and HB 2562. From the standpoint of the inmate, a prisoner would rather serve a long sentence in prison than in a county jail. District attorneys feel that long sentences in jails use up valuable county resources.
