PUBLIC HEARING ñ SB 495-A				
010	Paul Warner	SB 495-A was in response to issue brought forward by a taxpayer who couldn't collect refunds for overpayment of taxes due to lack of flexibility in the current law. The taxpayer worked with Dept. of Revenue to draft SB 495.		
023	Dean Bloemendaal	Spoke in support of the measure. See letter from Dean D. Bloemendaal (EXHIBIT 1) . Spoke on behalf of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Collins who did not file timely state tax return or extensions in 1995 because of his terminally ill wife. According to state law, those who fail to respond to a 90-day warning letter to file, lose their rights to appeal. He was unable to file for his 1995 refund. Dept. of Revenue garnished his wages. SB 495-A puts Oregon law in line with federal law, giving Mr. Collins three years to file.		
091	Susan Browning	Spoke in support of the measure. See written testimony (EXHIBIT 2), Background: A taxpayer can currently appeal through the court system and Dept. of Revenue can see it again for cancellation of liability.		
131	Browning	SB 495-A makes the following changes: • An individual who has failed to file a tax return when required will now be able to file a tax return at any time to establish correct tax liability.		
138	Browning	• The department may reject a return if it is not signed or if it is obvious that the return is not materially correct. Etc.		
208	Rep. Shetterly	Asked Browning if Dept. of Revenue is satisfied that there are still enough consequences for people who purposely fail to file.		
217	Browning	Dept. of Revenue looked at this closely. Wants to avoid causing people to not file. Non-filer must still pay penalties and interest. Intent is to collect the true tax.		
230	Rep. Shetterly	MOTION: MOVED SB 495-A TO THE HOUSE FLOOR WITH A DO PASS RECOMMENDATION.

245	Rep. Juley Gianella	Spoke in support of the measure. See written testimony (EXHIBIT 5) verbatim. HJR 59-A would increase the number of state troopers on Oregon highways. Voter initiative.		
277	Capt. Greg Willeford	Spoke in support of the measure. See written testimony (EXHIBIT 6) . Asking for funding of state police out of Highway Trust Fund. Gave brief history of funding for state police highway patrol. General fund has decreased funding to 65%. General fund funding has been unstable. State police are not able to answer 12,000 calls per year because of staffing.		
364	Willeford	HJR 59-A (voter initiative) would provide legislature an additional funding option for uniform patrol for Oregon State Police. Would add third element of highway safety programs ñ enforcement ñ to education and engineering efforts. Would reduce highway crime.		
395	Chair Strobeck	Committee has heard testimony about deteriorating roads and highways, and how the existing taxes are causing roads to fall behind. By adding state police back into this fund, wouldn't this adversely affect state highway maintenance?		
412	Willeford	State police recognize deteriorating infrastructure of roads, but safe highways are not just from engineering. Roads also need enforcement, engineering and education. This bill does not have a fiscal impact. It only refers to a vote.

052	Richard Yates	Explained, amendments from House Transportation Committee eliminated lines 21-23 but reinstated language that limits use of funds to use of funds to policing of public highways, roads, streets, and roadside rest areas.
070	All	Questions and discussion concerning amendments. Concern that there are police budgets that extend beyond highways.
090	Willeford	House Committee on Transportation amended the original bill. Concern was that troopers in Patrol Division are full-service police. Sponsor Rep. Hill didnít want bill to stop state police from assisting local police. Bill is intended for uniform branch of patrol division only.
107	Rep. Shetterly	Clarification in language would be helpful. Broader concern is impact on highway fund. Also, reason state police are not in constitution is that voters took them out. Will oppose resolution.
123	Rep. Merkley	Supports resolution. Would clarify language on line 22. Bill gives option to use state highway funds, does not make it mandatory.
140	Vice Chair Rasmussen	Will support resolution to give voters options on how to fund state police.
154	Rep. Kafoury	Supports need for more state troopers. Is concerned with debate about gas tax, and this would complicate the issue.
163	Rep. Shetterly	Concurred with Rep. Kafouryis testimony. Will make it harder to get funding for roads.
178	Rep. Witt	Will support resolution. Patrolling roads is a part of the function of maintaining roads. Should not confuse this with gas tax debate. Would rather refer this resolution to voters for constitutional change.

206	Rep. Welsh	Will support resolution, but reserves right to vote "no" on the floor.

337	David Hooper	Spoke in support of the measure. See written testimony (EXHIBIT 12), -1 Amendment to SB 258 Relating to Taxation, Oregon State Lottery. History: Law does not state whether Oregon state income tax for lottery winnings would apply to non-residents.		
		Issue: SB 410 made Oregon Lottery prizes a form of income, subject to state taxation.		
		Solution: Change applicable date to prize payments to "beginning on or after January 1, 2000."		
		Directed membersí attention to ñ1 amendments (EXHIBIT 13).		
428	Browning	Dept. of Revenue concurs with -1 amendments.

022	Browning	Not common. Example would be a retired couple who moves to Arizona part-year and still considers Oregon to be home. Issue is one of intent. Another example is of military personnel living overseas.
