029	Everett Cutter	<b>Oregon Railroad Association</b>  Testifies and submits written testimony in support of HB 3376. <b>(EXHIBIT Q)</b> Asserts that increasing the penalty for criminal trespass will deter offenders and encourage prosecution of the offense. Discusses the physical dangers of trespassing on railroad property.
091	Chair Bryant	What is a shortline railroad?
093	Robert Melbo	<b>Oregon Shortline Railroad Association</b>  Testifies and submits written testimony in support of HB 3376. <b>(EXHIBIT R)</b> Defines class I, regional, and shortline railroads. Discusses the public railroad accidents and the importance to change the public attitudes regarding railroad property.
176	Sen. Courtney	I have read that the Salem corridor is 2 <sup>nd</sup> worst in the nation for railway accidents. Is this true?
180	Cutter	I'm not sure, but it's one of the worst.
183	Sen. Courtney	Explains that physically barring access to railroad structures and right of ways is impossible.
212	Cutter	Discusses enforcement, education and engineering solutions to railway accidents such as railway fencing and lighting.
