	Rep. Beyer	Clarifies if there have been charter schools for 10 years.
	Rep. Bowman	Responds that her testimony was regarding alternative schools, which are charter schools. Will submit written summary of her testimony and comments later today.
125	Vicie English	Director, Brownsville Academy, testifies in favor SB 628A (EXHIBIT G). [7]( Discusses her contract with the local school district and the requirement to submit a proposed budget. Relates experience of two students in her school and their success.
219	Tricia Bosak	Legislative Representative, Oregon Education Association (OEA), testifies against SB 628A (EXHIBIT H). [8]( Specifies what part of the charter school bill the OEA objects to and makes suggestions for alternate provisions.
304	Rep. Deckert	Asks if local school board and school district approve of a charter school, why not allow the state to give 80% of state monies.
	Bosak	Responds that it is not appropriate for state money to fund any private school.
325	Rep. Thompson	Comments he has a problem with the sponsorship question; appears to be "a wide open door."
	Bosak	Expresses concerns with wide sponsorship of bill that particular sponsors might not be equipped to provide proper oversight.
360	Rep. Thompson	Asks regarding the continuity inside the public education system in the teaching process. If students fail at charter schools, how much trouble

	would it be to re-integrate student back in public school system.
Bosak	Responds and gives her experience with situation in another state.
Rep. Thompson	Closes public hearing on SB 628A. Adjourns meeting at 9:40 a.m.
