		* changes language to make it more permissive
		* electricians and plumbers are in favor of paying for the service so that an interim task force can determine whether there can be a suggestion for the next legislative session for better delivery of services throughout the metropolitan area

270	Pat Bridges	Director of Technology and Codes, Oregon Building Industry Association, testifies in opposition to HB 3290:
		* in 1992, Governor Roberts appointed a task force; conclusions on the issue of consolidation at that time was it would not benefit the residential construction in any way
		* recommendations were presented to the legislature and a number were implemented to alleviate the problem that was occurring at that time
		* SB 35 in the 1995 Session encompassed the whole question of services to the residential construction industry; there have been policies implemented as a result of that bill
296		* consolidation would probably mean there would be very few, very large building departments within the metropolitan area
		* contractors get the least amount of service on a timely basis from the large jurisdiction than from the smaller jurisdictions
		* testimony has been offered that this would expedite the permit process; does not know where the plumbing and electrical programs are coming from because in residential the permits are all obtained by and paid for by the builders in a one-stop process
		* in Metro area contractors are colliding with the general policy within the urban growth boundary for higher densities with the local ordinances that deal with set backs, etc.; fear is that with consolidation they would have to go through local review to deal with zoning and siting issues
330		* Has been asked by Bill Cross who represents the Portland Metropolitan Association of Building Owners & Managers to indicate they are in opposition and have the same fear that consolidation would end up with less service (EXHIBIT C).

098	Rep. VanLeeuwen	Comments that perhaps ORS 408.320 should be removed, but leave in tact other parts of law including those on retail distributing facilities which are self-serve.
106	Chair Strobeck	Asks if SB 526 would have any influence on any practice of dispensing gasoline at cardlocks or regular gas stations.
108	Sen. Miller	Responds negatively.
110	Chair Strobeck	Due to limited time, ask witnesses to limit their testimony to no longer than three minutes.

		* the second concern was with the board and the percentage of electors to get a board member

		* amendments provide that where there is 20 percent or more of the population in the smaller districts, a seat is assigned
