		* people of Coos County support a veterans home with a \$3.2 million dollar bond issue

		* stuck with certificate of need process which was not needed for the previous home in the Dalles
		* conflicting numbers on occupancy are being used
		* questions if any government-owned facility could get a certificate of need with the current process; letter from the Health Division to the county regarding the certificate of need process were negative from the beginning
032		* suggests the problem may be updating of certificate of need process
		* Coos County 15 years ago was a vibrant community
		* population is stagnant or dropping and are getting older people in every day
050		* current process for certificate of need does not address changing demographics
		* Coos County needs the home; people have voted in the money and the process does not address the demographics

Lucht	Explains that only those placed in the state homes are eligible for the disability pension and aide in attendance and daily care.
Rep. VanLeeuwen	Asks if this applies only to veterans with disabilities after their service has ended.
Lucht	Responds it is for those who do not have service related disabilities.
Rep. VanLeeuwen	Asks if there is an obligation on the state if the home defaults.
Lucht	Responds there is a federal law that says if the facility cannot operate, the state would have to return the federal money put into the home.
Rep. Schrader	Asks if all veterans homes target the same population.
Lucht	Responds they do not, and that the types of veterans homes could be from an old soldier home completely subsidized by the state, to a skilled nursing care facility that is required to be self-sustaining.
Chair Strobeck	Comments that the Roseburg home does not show up on the list.
Lucht	Responds that is because it is a federal veterans affairs nursing home.
Chair Strobeck	Asks where the two Washington homes are located.
	Notes that Mr. Lucht's testimony indicates two homes in the area may close and they do not care if they close, and asks if the reason they are having problems is their method of operation.
Lucht	Responds they have not documented the information, that it has been supplied by others who have indicated if the Coquille veterans home was constructed, it would cause two nursing homes to close, that they are having problems now, prior to a veterans home being established.
Chair Strobeck	Asks when the home will open in The Dalles.
Lucht	Responds that dedication is set for October 9, 1997.
Chair Strobeck	Notes statement submitted by Lucht during the 1995 session and asks if he has changed his mind on the certificate of need.
Lucht	Responds he has not, and adds it appeared at the time it was the only way there was going to be a chance for the legislation to be passed, and the veterans concurred with the committee on the suggestion for the requirement of a certificate of need and did not indicate they would not consider changing their opinion as to what might be requested in the future.

		Explains that the expectation with The Dalles facility is a 24-month fill up, and the department budget includes \$1.3 million to be a loan, and by the end of the third year the department intends to begin recouping

		the dollars back to the War Veterans Fund. Adds that he would anticipate doing the same thing on a smaller basis if the Coquille home is built.

151	Chair Strobeck	Asks what happens if the federal timelines expire on the matching funds.
163	Capehart	Comments Oregon is number one on the list and is uncertain that there would be an extension if Oregon were in the process of completing the paper work. The money comes out of the federal veteran affairs budget; Medicare comes out of the social security budget.
		Adds that the veterans who would be in the veterans home stay in their homes; they will not leave their home property to go to an area like an apartment; if they can go to a veterans home, they have the commradrie of boot camp, basic training and feel like they are home again and it is not the same atmosphere as a private nursing home.

185	Mangis	Explains the U. S. Department of Veterans Affairs annually reevaluates the list. Oregon has until October 1 of 1997 to file the formal application for the grant; there may be an opportunity to get an extension, but several are lined up that have state veterans homes planned and want the money that has been dedicated to Oregon.
201	Rep. Montgomery	Asks if ODVA instructed the people in The Dalles before they went to the vote to get five more acres.
	Mangis	Responds negatively.
	Rep. Montgomery	Asks whether ODVA indicated there would be a potential 50 more beds in a wing they thought they were going to be able to build.
230	Mangis	Explains that the home is built for expansion, two wings on the west end and an additional 25-bed Alzheimer addition; it was mentioned in the beginning there was a potential for expansion in the future. Adds it is the same design that would be used in Coquille.
241	Rep.	Comments that his people at home said they were promised they would have 50 beds and now are excited that they won't get any beds because another 100 is being added in Coquille. Adds that if this is approved
