		* appreciates comments on cost of program but does not believe the wheel must be reinvented; believes Oregon can join in with the state of Washington
		* task force does exist in Washington and they are reaching to Oregon to ask for opinions
376		* bill is not perfect, but need to start somewhere
408	Peter Grundfossen	Association of Oregon Housing Authorities, testifies that they are concern about the bill not for what it intends to do, but for what it "may do"afraid of unintended consequences.
		* there are 22 housing authorities in Oregon
		* interpretation goes on on a daily basis in a fairly informal manner
		* housing authorities supply some interpreters if the client does not bring his/her own
		* interpreters are people on staff in other on-going capacities, but are familiar with needed language; it has been a functioning, working system to this point

208	Rep. Kurt Schrader	Testifies in support of HB 3064:
		* bill has been introduced because of misinterpretation or division of interpretation on what constitutes a county's ability with regard to abandoned cemeteries
		* there are 20 plus cemeteries in Clackamas County listed as abandoned by the county and no one is taking care of them
		* correspondence from county indicate they are concerned about costs, responsibility and liability, and questions whether the counties have authority over the cemeteries
		* attempt is to find a way for the county or the applicable jurisdiction to vacate their interest to those who do have an interest and ability to take care of the historic cemeteries
218	John Keeley	Chairman, Highland Cemetery Association: testifies in support of HB 3064:
		* has maintained Highland Cemetery for last 10 years on a voluntary basis
		* about two years ago there was a burial which they knew nothing about; found out later by placement of a headstone that a lady was being buried by her husband

		* it brought up point that there was no administrative control of the cemetery
		* cemetery was dedicated in 1926 and has burials back to the 1890's and is about 40 percent full
		* could find no statute that sets up administration for public cemeteries
		* felt this would be the simplest means of transferring authority from the county to another public body that could maintain the cemetery
		* attorney suggested the non-profit corporation
		* interest has been received from the Highland Grange to request that the board of county commissioners vacate their authority over the cemetery to the Highland Cemetery Association
		* has received letter from the district attorney saying it is impossible for the commissioners to vacate their authority
		* bill would enable commissioners to react to the public cemeteries which have no administration
		Issues discussed:
300		* ways of transferring property in Oregon
		* language in line 8 of the bill
345		* differences of opinions of legal counsels
		* whether intent is to collect fees that would be dedicated to maintaining the cemetery
380		* whether Association of Oregon Counties and Clackamas County support HB 3064
		* permissive language; counties could choose not to transfer or could put stipulations on the transfer
410		* whether there were stipulations on the original dedication of the property
446	Chair Strobeck	Requests that Rep. Schrader request a letter from Clackamas County and closes the public hearing on HB 3064.

020	Bob Panuccio	State Fire Marshall, introduces Jim Russell, attorney general's office, submits the SB 29-1 amendments (EXHIBIT K) and testifies in support of SB 29 (EXHIBIT J).
		* existing wording in the bill could subject many state, county and municipal agencies to submitting to the governor any future interstate

		agreements and perhaps some in existence
		* process would be cumbersome for some agencies
082	Rep. Hill	Asks why ORS 190.110 does not give authority for cooperative agreements between state agencies and agencies of other states.
084	Jim Russell	Assistant Attorney General, Oregon Department of Justice, replies he is not sure what occurred when the Wenatchee fire occurred in Washington; was looking at the interestate compact under ORS chapter 401 dealing with disasters.
		* Washington could not, under their program, come under the interestate compact under ORS chapter 401
		* ORS 190.110 authorizes state agencies in Oregon to enter into intergovernmental agreements with the state and local agencies of other states, and another broad provision deals with things other than interestate compacts
		* ORS 190.410 to .440 deal specifically with interstate compacts; there are additional provisions in ORS chapter 194.420 dealing with duration, methods of termination and financing, and ORS 194.030 requires a review and approval as to legal sufficiency by the attorney general's office
119		* a formal attorney general opinion dealing with the multi-state lottery told the Lottery Commission they could enter into a multi-state lottery; it was based on ORS 190.110 and included a footnote that they were not sure whether 190.410 to .440 would apply because it used the term "public agency"
		* two years later in an informal opinion, the attorney general indicated the real estate commissioner who had entered into a reciprocal agreement with Idaho and Washington on mutual licensing of brokers, made a reference that approximately a year earlier the attorney general had told the real estate commissioner that the reciprocal agreement was invalid because it failed to comply with ORS 190.410 to .440
140		* the later opinion gives the indication the ambiguity may not exist
156		* the ambiguity is still there because there was an informal opinion and the prior one was a formal opinion; this would clear up the ambiguity mentioned in the multi-state lottery opinion
		Issues discussed:
176		* whether the opinions affect the statutes
195		* definition of "authority or entity organized and existing under laws of this state"
228		* whether local governments contracted with Washington
250		* whether governor's office is in agreement with the amendment
258		* whether this could be abused with too many agreements going back and forth
