OPENED WORK SESSION ON SB 715

Exhibit A - (-3) Amendments. The Amendment allows Columbia 5j school district to split into two districts and also deals with the Northwest Regional education service district ("ESD") state timber revenue distribution. Language in Section 1 distributes state timber money based on 1995-96 rates in effect prior to merger of two education service districts. Before the merger one district was getting \$1.17 per thousand of timber revenue, but after the merger the tax rate was 30 cents per \$1,000 over all four counties in the ESD. In the 1996-97 school year all the money went to the school districts where it was shared

		statewide by formula and not to the ESD at all. This Amendment restores funds to the ESD and includes a requirement that the ESD distribute the funds to school districts in Clatsop, Columbia, and Tillamook Counties and school districts in Washington County with an Average Daily Membership (weighted) of less than 2,500.
052 1	Meyer	The language at top of page 8 indicates those funds are not counted as local revenues as far as the statewide formula goes. The districts get to keep the money in order to buy ESD services which they were previously getting directly from the ESD prior to the merger.
066 <mark>8</mark> 1	Sen. Hartung	Asked if this affects the Northwest ESD only or other ESDs as well.
068 1	Meyer	Answered that it does not have much impact on other ESDs. Because of 1996-97 being an interim year affected by the merger tax rates, moneys that went to school districts in the ESD for that year were counted in the formula, therefore being shared statewide. Now with the moneys going back to the ESD and districts within the ESD, it would not be shared statewide. This Amendments goes back to what the procedure was prior to the merger, when an intermediate year disrupted the process.
084 <mark>8</mark>	Sen. Dukes	Stated this might have impact on other parts of the state, but it should be minimal. This affects county forest trust lands, about 85% of which are located within Clatsop, Columbia, and Tillamook Counties. Not aware of any other ESD which had the same drastic reduction in tax rate that the Northwest ESD did.
098 1	Meyer	Added that depending on what happens with Measure 50 this issue may have to be revisited because rates will drastically change from what they have been for this distribution process.
102 <mark>5</mark>	Sen. Dukes	Stated that this Amendment addresses moneys the ESDs were getting in the past, based on a taxpayer-approved tax base in each of the counties and that the moneys will be distributed based on the rate that was established as a result of the voter-approved tax rate. This Amendment affects only Clatsop and Tillamook but not Columbia and Washington Counties.
129 <mark>(</mark>	Chair Baker	Said he feels the ESDs should be equalized within the next two years and would expect that within the next two legislative sessions there will be a comprehensive way of funding them. Questions and discussion interspersed.
