010 DOUG COLLINS, OREGON SCHOLARSHIP COMMISSION: Testifies in favor of HB 2962 -successful scholarship program

-continue program; create more

030 SALLY WOODYARD, DOLLARS FOR SCHOLARS: Submits and reads written testimony in favor of HB 2962 (EXHIBIT B)

077 JOANIE LAFFERTY, DOLLARS FOR SCHOLARS: Testifies in favor of HB 2962 -background of Dollars for Scholars organization -fund raising activities

HB 3296 - Informational Hearing

135 TOM HART, MARION COUNTY DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S ASSOCIATION: Testifies in support of HB 3296 -explains bill

-appropriate that schools make children aware of what they are risking when

committing a crime

-REP. FLOYD PROZANSKI, DISTRICT 40: Testifies in favor of HB 3296 -important to understand the problems that we are having -this is going to be viewed as an unfunded mandate; important to have an effective and efficient program and one that has been tried and piloted to get a message across

JIM GREEN, OREGON SCHOOL BOARDS ASSOCIATION: Testifies in opposition to HB 3296 200 -we do see this as an unfunded mandate; imposing costs -requiring this would take away from regular education classes

-oppose bill as currently written; if a pilot program is implemented hope that funding is also provided

206 WILMA WELLS, CONFEDERATION OF OREGON SCHOOL ADMINISTRATORS: Testifies in opposition to HB 3296

-takes time away from current curriculum that we are required to teach

PROZANSKI: In response to Luke, have not used peer court in Lane county -it is a reactive stage, although important -want to make sure that kids know what their responsibilities to society are prior to getting into trouble

HART: In response to Lehman, describes types of conduct -reformation clause -deterrents

PROZANSKI: Juvenile crime influx

340 HART: In response to Meek, discusses SB 1 -youth authority providing education

LUKE: Opposition to -5 amendments

LEHMAN: Opposition to -5 amendments

050 MILNE: Opposition to -5 amendments

SHIELDS: Wondering what segment of the population we are dealing with

064 MEEK: Discusses sum of money trying to be recovered; only addresses those six months in default -garnishment of wages adds additional costs

-money needs to be available for current students; 70 million dollars

SHIELDS: How many people are behind? -believes in good faith efforts

110 DOUG COLLINS, SCHOLARSHIP COMMISSION: If someone goes 180 days without making any payments they are technically in default, then they have 180 days plus 30 days after that to get in good standing with us

McCOMB: Do not yet have fiscal statement on -5 or -6 amendments; hope to get those before it is heard in the full committee

SHIELDS: Need to help scholarship commission retrieve funds -the -6 amendments are less punitive

LEHMAN: Commission has right to receive any tax refunds from unpaid loans

 $\ensuremath{\mbox{MILNE:}}$ May be talking about people who are not employed, not getting tax reform

166 KATHY SILKIE, SCHOLARSHIP COMMISSION: Explains what they do according

to a persons situation (i.e. inability to pay)

COLLINS: Will check if fault rate is any higher for public versus private schools

MEEK: This is not punitive -addressing individuals that should be repaying loan but are refusing to -supports -5

LUKE: Why don't we give it to banks, credit unions etc. bothered that there is no connection between loans and drivers license

SNODGRASS: Recalls testimony that this has been done in another state

SILKIE: There are two states that have passed similar legislation -Texas law

REP. PETER COURTNEY, DISTRICT 33: The issue of revoking a drivers license originated in the early 1980s to deal with a drug problem in the Ashland area; the idea came from the students, not adults -need this extra tool for extraordinary situations

MOTION: MEEK MOVES HB 2487, AS AMENDED, TO THE FULL COMMITTEE WITH A DO PASS RECOMMENDATION

100 SNODGRASS: Questions language in section 7, nothing that relates to

violence, stands on its on

MEEK: The -2 amendments section 3 addresses that language

VOTE: THE MOTION PASSES 5-2. MEEK, SHIELDS, SNODGRASS, AND MILNE VOTE AYE. LUKE AND LEHMAN VOTE NO. MEEK CARRIES.

ROBERT NOOSE, OREGON STUDENT LOBBY: Submits and reads written testimony on HB 3175 (EXHIBIT E)

200 GEORGE PERNSTEINER, ASSOCIATE VICE CHANCELLOR FOR ADMINISTRATION: Submits and reads written testimony on HB 3175 (EXHIBIT F)

300 REP. CAROLYN OAKLEY, DISTRICT 36: Testifies in favor of HB 3175 -increasing tuition costs

HB 3296 - Informational Hearing

272 REP. EILEEN QUTUB, DISTRICT 8: Testifies in favor of HB 3296 -explains how bill came about -does not know fiscal ramifications

HB 2450 - Informational Hearing

JIM GREEN, OREGON SCHOOL BOARD ASSOCIATION: Not sure what the sponsors were trying to get at in this bill because in our administrative rules and school policies teachers have ability already, this is an additional definition

-this is currently what we are doing

-reluctance, for fear of lawsuits, of using physical force

-in response to Luke, can use reasonable physical force if disruptive to classroom

386 MEEK: Statutorily need to make it more clear for the teacher to feel more comfortable in using physical force; this makes it clearer

GREEN: Discusses the term "reasonable"

TAPE 33, SIDE B

REP. LIZ VanLEEUWEN, DISTRICT 37: Testifies in favor of HB 2450 -refers to proposed amendments (EXHIBIT G) -school personnel do not know how far they can go; this helps clarify

GREEN: In response to Luke, there isn't anything in this bill that creates

any problem

-the issue is what is the reason for the reasonable force

-this addresses the teacher but we do have other employees who have control

over children (i.e. school bus driver)

041 STEPHANIE HOLMES, OSEA: Discusses disruptive behavior

VanLEEUWEN: Suggested language change to include volunteers or other school employee which was the intent of the bill

073 JOHN DANIELSON, OREGON EDUCATION ASSOCIATION: Under current law, many school districts adopt policy whereby physical force is entirely prohibited

in the schools, so there is no use of physical force, even though there is an implication based on current law that it is allowable -if you adopt this you then supersede the district's ability to prohibit physical force -probably could expand to include classified employees -this is a policy change, more than it may appear HB 2965 - Informational Hearing MEEK: Testifies on HB 2965 093 -explains bill -in response to Luke, discusses possible language to do background checks on other employees LUKE: Adds consistency 120 OZZIE ROSE, CONFEDERATED OREGON SCHOOL ADMINISTRATORS: Do not feel that the bill is necessary -does not open many options that don't already exist HB 2609 - Informational Hearing 151 GARY CHRISTENSEN, OSSHE: Submits and reads written testimony on HB 2609 (EXHIBIT H) -doesn't feel that bill is necessary -in response to Luke, talks about residency HB 2694 - Informational Hearing DAN McCULLOCH, NORTH PACIFIC UNION OF SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTISTS, OREGON 190 FEDERATION OF INDEPENDENT SCHOOLS: Submits and reads written testimony on HB 2694 (EXHIBIT I) 226 GREG McMURDO, DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION: Intent may be simple but the bill goes beyond; willing to work on it -no requirement that private schools register or be regulated in any way 260 McCULLOCH: Testing for transfer students -suggest having language that states "test and place" 294 GREEN: Discusses present policy for testing of transfer students -adding language could add costs to school districts -schools try to evaluate student records LUKE: Clarifies McCULLOCH: Importance of properly placing a student 361 WILMA WELLS, CONFEDERATION OF OREGON SCHOOL ADMINISTRATORS: Discourages requiring schools to test students that transfer from another states -cost would be excessive HB 3317 - Informational Hearing 390 REP. LYNN SNODGRASS, DISTRICT 10: Introduces bill

TAPE 34, SIDE A

035 -submits proposed amendment (EXHIBIT J)

045 DR. ROBERT McCALISTER, OREGON HEALTH DIVISION: Testifies on HB 3317 -was not aware of the proposed amendments -sexually active children statistics -sexual transmitted diseases (STD)

-irresponsible parents not showing interest in their children; these are the children who are at greatest risk of pregnancy and contracting STDs

075 -existing statute should be left in its present form -submits written testimony (EXHIBIT N)

086 WILMA WELLS, CONFEDERATION OF OREGON SCHOOL ADMINISTRATORS: Testifies

on HB 3317 -shares experiences of parental agreement process -will have difficulty obtaining permission slips from certain families

HB 2997 - Informational Hearing

135 REP. CHARLES STARR, DISTRICT 3: Submits and reads written testimony in favor of HB 2997 (EXHIBIT K)

-do not know what organic documents are

STARR: History books have recently eliminated many things -doubt that we are doing an adequate job in bringing historical events to our students -reference important documents as encouragement

225 DAVID FIDANQUE, AMERICAN CIVIL LIBERTIES UNION: Testifies on HB 2997 -teaching of American history -ACLU has never opposed the teaching of the place of religion in the lives

of the founders of Republic or in the lives of Americans today -bill of rights -problems with section 1 -examples of when teachers or administrators have used certain religious guotes to advance his or her religious agenda

-sanitation of text books to avoid problems

284 -excerpts out of text to promote religion -separation of church and state -purpose of constitutional separation of church and state -content based discrimination -page 1, line 19 -the constitution clearly prohibits school officials and teachers to use

their position to advance their religious belief; believes this bill would attempt to permit for them to do that

008 GREG McMURDO, OREGON DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION: Testifies on HB 2997 -shares some of Fidanque's concerns -circumstances that the Oregon Constitution would be violated

JOHN DANIELSON, OREGON EDUCATION ASSOCIATION: Testifies on HB 2997
