027 REP. CORCORAN: Thinks that the Secretary of State is doing a good job
with the audit. There will be more money spent by contracting out, than
keeping it in house.

MOTION: REP. COURTNEY: Moves SB 400 be sent to the floor with a DO PASS

085 JIM CARLSON, OREGON HEALTH CARE ASSOCIATION: Testifies in support of SB
543.

120 CARLSON: The bill creates an advisory council composed of 12 persons
that allow for non providers to have a 7 to 5 vote margin, over those who
provide services. Acts strictly in an advisory position to the Senior and
Disabled Services Division.

160 CARLSON: This council will serve to look at proposed impacts on the
Senior and Disabled Services Division.

182 REP. ROBERTS: Did you check with senior citizens on this bill?

194 CARLSON: The objections to the bill center around amendments which deal
with settlement issues.

202 REP. ROBERTS: I am looking at statements saying that there will
inflation of \$31.2 million dollars over the Governor's budget, if this
goes through. Is that from the -13 amendments?

208 CARLSON: Yes, that will be a result of the -13 amendments. This bill
does not address any of those issues.

292 LINCOLN CANNON, OREGON FOREST INDUSTRIES COUNCIL: Testifies in support
of SB 683A. Explains -A3 Amendments.

342 REP. BEYER: Does this enable the experiment that trades protected
lands?

344 CANNON: Yes, it applies to Federal government and would facilitate
exchanges for protected lands. Continues testimony on the -A3 amendments.

388 CANNON: Proposes changes in the -A3 amendments.

003 MOTION: REP. BEYER: Move to adopt the -A2 amendments to SB 683.

005 CHAIR BAUM: Hearing no objection, the amendments are adopted. All
members are present.

010 CANNON: The -A3 amendments negate the -A2 amendments

010 MIKE EVANS, SENECA SAWMILL: Testifies in support of -A3 amendments.

029 Rep. Roberts: What do you mean by substandard?

031 Evans: The law as it now reads allows for the creation of a parcel of
80 acres on forest lands. This bill allows for the creation of a parcel
less than 80 acres, however that can not be used for residential purposes.

034 Rep. Roberts: Someone with an existing home, who wants to sell off
timber can parcel off the 80 acres, due to the fact that they are
pre-existing.

038 Evans: Right, there are really two provisions in this bill.

050 Rep. Roberts: What I am really worried about, if some family got in a
political quagmire, where they can't afford to move and can't afford to
obey the government's direction.

070 EVANS: The bill also allows for trading off of parcels such as
old-growth forests for harvestable timber.

088 BOB RINDY, Department of Land Conservation and Development: Testifies
in opposition to the -2 amendments. At line 18 on page 1 of the -3
Amendments, applies only to lands zoned for forest use. Explains proposed
amendments that would clarify this further. Line 18, wants the word "lot"
should be stricken.

151 REP. MARKHAM: There wouldn't be a surprise if there was a deed restriction.

153 RINDY: This provision has been in the program for a number of years, and the pressure is coming from people who are sure there is a deed restriction. If there is a minimum size of 40 acres this, bill could be acceptable.

163 ROY BURNS, LANE COUNTY: Testifies in support of the -A3 amendments. No absolute size on the changes, usually is on the value of the timber, rather than the size of the parcel. Urges to keep the parcel size flexible.

184 REP. LUNDQUIST: If you leave the parcel size flexible, it makes more sense.

202 art Slack, Association of oregon counties: Testifies in support of SB 683 A and the -A3, would like it applied to any land consistent with goal four.

242 DON SCHELLENBERG, OREGON FARM BUREAU: Testifies in support of SB 683 A and the -A3 amendments.

270 ANTHONY BOUTARD, 1000 FRIENDS OF OREGON: Testifies in opposition of SB 683 and all the amendments (Exhibit A). The optimum size of forest management is between 40 and 80 acres. Argues against sub-standard lots as merely a tax break.

327 REP. LUNDQUIST: I would like to see scientific evidence that 40 acres is the "right" size.

CLOSES PUBLIC HEARING ON SB 683A

OPENS WORK SESSION ON SB 683A

342 MOTION: REP. BEYER: Moves to ADOPT the -A3 amendments to SB 683A.

VOTE: CHAIR BAUM: Hearing no objection the amendments are ADOPTED. All members are present.

379 EVANS: This section removes the ability to create parcels less than 80 acres.

382 REP. WATT: The experiment that former Governor Goldschmidt is doing can't go on without this.

385 EVANS: That is my understanding.

396 REP. ROBERTS: What difference does it make what size the parcel is, if it is bought and added to another existing parcel?

Tape, 88, Side B

011 EVANS: None, if you don't allow a dwelling on the forest land, then I believe the land is protected.

018 REP. ROBERTS: Can they sell smaller parcels as long as there is no dwelling?

020 EVANS: Yes.

027 BOUTARD: If the intent is to allow for private swaps between federal lands and private owners, please specify it in the bill.

035 REP. BEYER: Asks for clarification of objections from 1000 Friends of Oregon.

040 BOUTARD: If these are used for tax purposes to create sub-standard lots, we are opposed. That is a short term financial gain, for a long-term management loss.

053 MOTION: REP. COURTNEY: Moves to AMEND SB 683A to delete lines 7-16 on page 2 of the -A3 amendments.

086 RINDY: If you leave line 18 on page 1, that allows for splitting of the parcels. It works whether or not you have lines 7-16 in the amendment.

091 REP. ROBERTS: What does removal on lines 7-16 on page 2 out of the

amendment do to the bill?

101 RINDY: It is to allow forest land owners to swap pieces of any size.

110 REP. LUNDQUIST: It appears to me that it allows for the 5 acre parcel, but it wouldn't allow for the other parcel would have to be full size.

130 REP. BEYER: This section seems to do it. It doesn't seem to effect anything but ownership.

135 RINDY: It affects forest management. It could fracture the parcels, into very small parts, where if a person did not have many of them, they would not have a normal size parcel.

VOTE: In a roll call vote, REP. COURTNEY votes AYE, REPS. CORCORAN, LUNDQUIST, MARKHAM, MILNE, ROBERTS, WATT, BEYER, and BAUM vote NAY. The amendment FAILS. All members are present.

MOTION: CHAIR BAUM: Moves to AMEND the -A3 amendments to on page 2, line 27, goes to be after the small C; On page 3, line 13, after "shall sign a statement" insert "which shall be recorded with the county clerk where the property is located."

192 VOTE: CHAIR BAUM: Hearing no objections, the amendments are ADOPTED.
All members are present.

MOTION: REP. BEYER : Moves to amend the -A3 amendments to incorporate the -A2 amendments to SB 683

200 CHAIR BAUM: Where do these amendments come from?

205 REP. BEYER: The amendments come from former Marilyn Dell, who worked with Polk County's current zoning laws.

211 REP. LUNDQUIST: What does this amendment do with the Governor's office?

I think it can get the bill killed.

VOTE: In a roll call vote, REPS. LUNDQUIST, ROBERTS, WATT, BEYER, and BAUM vote AYE. REPS. CORCORAN, COURTNEY, MARKHAM and MILNE vote NAY. The amendments are ADOPTED. All members are present.

300 WILSON: Our agency is the 8th largest agency in State government. Most of the money we spend goes to providers, so we are constantly adjusting our rates. We do not think that our estimate of staff people is unreasonable, explains.

421 SHIPWRACK: We wanted to start combining some of the electricians licenses, explains.

431 REP. WATT: Given a couple of days, could this be straightened out?

010 CROSS: I don't know if that is possible or not, explains.

017 REP. WATT: Is counsel telling you that you need that language to keep this legal?

018 CROSS: Yes, we have to have a licensed person doing that work now, or a total exemption.

020 REP. WATT: If you can't work it out, what will happen if the bill doesn't pass?

024 CROSS: There will be no opportunity for building operators to have state licensed individuals doing maintenance work in compliance with state law. Many of them cannot afford to have a electrician doing the work.

032 REP. WATT: Is it your estimation that there is no more that can be done?

035 CROSS: I believe that the workgroup identified the items, on a limited scope, that should be set out as certain activities that could be done by someone who was less than an apprenticed two year journeyman.

044 REP. CORCORAN: It sounds like there was an agreement principal that didn't make it into the bill. Is there an ability to get that agreement principal back?

050 SHIPWRACK: I don't know. Discusses what happened in Legislative Counsel with the bill.

054 REP. CORCORAN: Can we get Legislative Counsel here?

055 SHIPWRACK: I don't know.
