006 CHAIR TARNO: Calls meeting to order at 2:05 p.m.

HB 3458 PUBLIC HEARING

013 REP. UHERBELAU: Gives background introduction on HB 3458.

039 RICHARD BENNER, OREGON DEPT. OF LAND CONSERVATION AND DEVELOPMENT:  
Speaks about regional planning problems which could not be solved by one body.

089 -Outlines the goals and techniques for regional planning and the collaborative effort between local governments.

103 CHAIR TARNO: Asks REP. UHERBELAU what kind of feedback she has received from her district on this bill.

108 REP. UHERBELAU: Responds by listing the groups and individuals she has spoken to. States there has to be agreement among the players.

128 CHAIR TARNO: Asks if the people from St. Joseph County concur with the bill.

130 REP. UHERBELAU: States that St. Joseph County is interested.

140 CHAIR TARNO: Will there be a vote required by the group or body involved in the plan

152 BENNER: Not been tried before, but would anticipate that they would agree on an agenda, and then begin goal setting; what does the region want to accomplish.

179 REP. NORRIS: Thinks it's a good idea in principal. Suggests other departments which could be included.

209 REP. FISHER: Why should I presume LCDC would sign on to this.

216 BENNER: Program designed to allow some flexibility in periodic review schedules.

229 REP. CORCORAN: In line 41 of page two, does that include rural unincorporated communities.

235 BENNER: Yes.

243 REP. CORCORAN: Makes reference to some of the smaller rural unincorporated districts such as Marcola.

254 BENNER: States that yes it could include those rural unincorporated districts.

260 REP. UHERBELAU: Points out the section in the bill which deals with those areas.

265 REP. JOSI: Makes reference to Section 4, subsection 5.

268 BENNER: Responds to a question regarding commercial agricultural and forest lands.

307 REP. NAITO: Has a problem with putting something like this forever in the statutes when they don't know if it will work. Suggests a two year sunset.

317 REP. UHERBELAU: Couldn't get off the ground with a two year sunset, possibly four.

320 BENNER: Doesn't feel they would be able to assess the program at the end of two years.

352 REP. NAITO: Asks if they would support a four year sunset.

356 BENNER: Would have no objections.

358 REP. NORRIS: Would like to pass the bill out as it is and let them try it out.

378 CHARLES SWINDELLS, 1000 FRIENDS OF OREGON: Speaks in opposition to two provisions of HB 3458 from written testimony. (EXHIBIT A)  
428 -The goals should be made the basis of this plan.

TAPE 65, SIDE A

053 BURTON WEAST, SPECIAL DISTRICTS OF OREGON: Proposes amendments to HB 3458.

079 REP. NORRIS: Asks if water districts should not be included.

089 CHAIR TARNO: How do you define special districts.

093 WEAST: Local government or municipality includes special districts. Districts are not comprehensive planning agencies.

100 CHAIR TARNO: You feel special districts need to be included in the language of this bill.

108 ROY BURNS, INTERGOVERNMENTAL COORDINATOR, LANE CO.: Suggests some additional language which may need to be added to the bill which would allow a county to select out a portion of a county for regional planning.

144 REP. UHERBELAU: Would have to be careful so we didn't get into the area where one entity alone could call itself a region.

153 REP. LUKE: Is it going to take every one of those areas to agree in this process to be called a region.

164 -Speaks of LCDC's exclusive review.

181 BURNS: Not privy to all of the testimony which has been given before.  
196 -We can invite LCDC to work with us now.

198 REP. LUKE: Have they refused.

200 BURNS: To my knowledge they have not refused.

220 REP. LUKE: Page 2, line 18; you could make those tougher rather than easier.

226 BENNER: Explains why that particular language was included in this bill.

234 REP. LUKE: Can this be appealed to LUBA.

236 BENNER: No, the court of appeals.

266 ART SCHLACK, ASSN. OF OREGON COUNTIES: Testifies in support of the concepts of HB 3458. Has a concern that there may be limited resources to implement the goals.

309 REP. UHERBELAU: Understands there will be a person at LCDC to deal with this included in the budget.

326 REP. LUKE: Do you anticipate that they would charge you for this service.

330 SCHLACK: Does not think they would charge but rather a service they would provide.

339 REP. NORRIS: Refers to language in Section four.

350 SCHLACK: Not concerned with state participation, but asks about what resources would be available if a lot of areas want to participate.

392 REP. UHERBELAU: Had thought about possibly making this a pilot program.

408 REP. FISHER: Are there a lot of special districts in Jackson County.  
431 -Is it possible there would be so many you could never come to a decision.

446 SCHALCK: Doesn't believe that is the case.

Submits written statement regarding The Amazon Student Housing Complex (EXHIBIT X).

340 -You're asking for local control.

360 REP. LUKE: Thinks this is a good bill and would not like to see it vetoed by the addition of this amendment.

376 REP. CORCORAN: Thinks this addresses a very severe problem in Eugene. States that SEN. JOHNSON does support the amendments.

174 MOTION: REP. CORCORAN: Moves SB 749-A to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation.

VOTE: In a roll call vote all members present vote AYE. REP. LUKE is excused.

CHAIR: The motion CARRIES. REP. CORCORAN to carry to the floor.

SB 158 PUBLIC HEARING

200 FRED ROBINSON, ASSISTANT STATE FORESTER: Speaks in support of SB 158, from written testimony. (EXHIBIT N)

387 REP. NORRIS: What is your definition of State Forester.

390 ROBINSON: Gives his definition of State Forester.

409 -Thanks Rep. Norris for drawing his attention to the language problem. Should delete a and insert "the forester".

427 REP. NORRIS: That would not cover a private party.

437 CHAIR TARNO: Would cover a private owner if he belonged to a fire district.

447 ROBINSON: No. Only a state forester.

454 REP. NORRIS: Still questions terminology State Forester.

466 ROBINSON: State Forester or one of his fire crews. Describes the scenario where this bill would apply.

038 REP. UHERBELAU: Asks about the chapter involved.

040 ROBINSON: Responds Chapter 477.

045 -Wants to clarify the amendment to line 17 taking the word "a " out and inserting the word "the".

060 TOM BESSONETTE, OREGON MUTUAL AND SUBLIMITY INSURANCE: Testifies in opposition to Section 6 of the bill. Doesn't think this is good legislation. Passes the liability from the child to the parents and in turn to the insurance carriers.

110 -Expresses parents right to know about the law.

113 REP. UHERBELAU: Doesn't provide for language regarding negligence or

willfulness.

120 REP. LEWIS: Asks if inserting language regarding negligently or willfulness would satisfy the concerns.

124 BESSONETTE: No it would not. There is no provision for the parents right to know.

149 REP. FISHER: Did they oppose this in the Senate.

154 BESSONETTE: Yes he did. He reads the language which was proposed in the Senate.

SB 158 WORK SESSION

168 REP. UHERBELAU: Can't find language which indicates an adult would be responsible with regard to willful or negligent.

175 CHAIR TARNO: Points out the language regarding negligence.

183 REP. THOMPSON: Has a problem with the whole concept.

192 REP. CORCORAN: Given the economic difficulties we are in right now, we have to try to recoup these as users fees.

200 CHAIR TARNO: On line 18 on page 3, the words suppressing fires caused by negligent or willfully started.

212 REP. LEWIS: Said negligently or willfully would satisfy Mr. Bessonette. Perhaps REP. Naito or REP. Uherbelau could suggest some language.

220 REP. NAITO: Describes some situations where this law might cause problems for the parents, since they were not aware of the behavior.

234 REP. FISHER: Has a concern with due process. Doesn't see where the parents have access to due process.

247 CHAIR TARNO: Cites a section of statute.

253 REP. NAITO: The child would not have notice. Only need to show the child started the fire.

266 REP. LEWIS: Seems to fly in the face of the judicial process.

275 REP. THOMPSON: Quotes the economics of the bill.

285 REP. NAITO: Limited to the actual costs.

291 MOTION: REP. NAITO: Moves to delete Sections 5 and 6 of the SB 158- A engrossed bill.

306 REP. CORCORAN: Discusses willful and negligent acts of children.

326 REP. LUKE: Would like to hear from Mr. Robinson what the procedures would be in this process.

350 ROBINSON: Describes the process which would be followed in these instances.

367 REP. LUKE: Do they get a hearing.

370 ROBINSON: If they don't pay the bill. We would normally just send a bill. If they refuse to pay the amount then we pursue through legal action.

390 REP. THOMPSON: Parents may not be inclined to report the fire if they feel their children are involved.

406 REP. CORCORAN: This bill would not delay responsibility.

419 REP. LEWIS: Goes through the process. Do you use the statements the parents made to them on the day of the fire.

426 ROBINSON: Supposes they probably would.

003 ROBINSON: They do use State Police but they also have their own investigators.

008 REP. UHERBELAU: Section 477 does not allow recovery.

017 REP. NAITO: Generally can not use hearsay as evidence.

021 CHAIR TARNO: Do you currently have a way to recover from the parents if  
a child starts a fire.

023 ROBINSON: Only if they can definitely prove negligence on the parents  
part.

030 CHAIR TARNO: Would like committee to vote on the motion on the floor.

038 REP. FISHER: Quotes language which may solve the problems.

043 REP. NAITO: Doesn't believe that would do anything.

054 VOTE: In a roll call vote REP. LEWIS, NAITO, UHERBELAU, WELLS vote AYE.

100 JOHN RAYBURN, PORT OF NEWPORT: Submits and reviews testimony on SB 944  
and the LC-2 amendments, in support of the bill. ( EXHIBIT O)

153 -Current regulations will force the closure of the Port of Newport by  
1995 unless they are granted some relief.

205 KENT ROBERTS, COOS BAY SPILL RESPONSE COOPERATIVE: Submits and reviews  
testimony on the proposed amendments. ( EXHIBIT P)

235 REP. UHERBELAU: Asks why these amendments were brought forth at this  
point. These are not simple amendments, why were these not brought to the  
committee much earlier. There may have been people from DEQ who should  
have been here to speak to the amendments.

351 RAYBURN: This is an attempt to reach a resolution with DEQ

358 REP. UHERBELAU: We're not being consistent with late amendments.

377 REP. CORCORAN: This has been discussed with DEQ and the maker of the  
bill.

385 REP. LEWIS: Expresses her concerns with the bill.

410 ROBERTS: Only coastal ports affected are Newport and Coos Bay.

427 REP. LEWIS: Asks questions about Section E.

434 ROBERTS: States time frame in which DEQ has to develop this plan.

447 REP. LEWIS: You're not going to be shut down for a year while they  
develop this plan.

460 -Asks questions on page eight of the SB 944-2 amendments.



037 REP. NORRIS: Did you present this amendment to the Senate.

040 ROBERTS: No we did not.

045 REP. FISHER: Has a problem with people bringing things like this at the 11th hour.

055 JOHN BURNS, MARINE SPILL RESPONSE: Speaks in support of SB 944. Simple one page bill which went through the Senate with a vote of 29 in support and 1 excused. Neutral to the amendments submitted by the ports of Newport and Coos Bay.

093 -Wants to be sure the Governor will sign the bill if amended.

099 -Absolutely neutral to the amendments. Only concern is a veto by the Governor.

110 RICHARD REIDER, MANAGER SPILL PROGRAM, DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY: Feels Rayburn and Roberts have correctly stated the facts.

140 -Giving up coverage of 200 vessels.

176 CHAIR TARNO: Please speak only to the dash two amendments.

180 REIDER: Would lower the preparedness for Yaquina and Coos Bay. Also exempting them from prevention requirements.

213 REP. UHERBELAU: What period of time did it become pretty clear you were not going to be able to reach an agreement.

220 REIDER: Approximately two months ago.

225 REP. THOMPSON: What's the size of your budget.

230 REIDER: Staff available and been giving assistance. Not surplus revenue.

236 REP. THOMPSON: Have you an idea of the cost to the local community.

240 REIDER: The vessels would have to provide the plan.

242 REP. THOMPSON: Asks if he has an idea of the impact on the local community.

250 REIDER: Yes, that's why they gave them an additional year.

255 REP. CORCORAN: Thinks the ports need this assistance now. Time to look over this in the next two years. Thinks the best thing to do would be to table this until Friday to determine if it will fly with the Governor's office.

270 REP. LUKE: Is there clean-up equipment in either of these places now.

275 REIDER: Yes, for their operations, there is equipment. No agreement to cover the cargo vessels at this time.

286 REP. LUKE: There is equipment, the problem is they can't work out an agreement as to who can use it.

292 REIDER: Equipment but no agreements.

299 REP. LUKE: Any clean up equipment at Yaquina Bay.

300 REIDER: Not that's he's aware of.

306 REP. LUKE: Asks if there could be an agreement with the port.

312 REIDER: Legally possible, but the port prefers not to be responsible.

318 REP. LUKE: You stated you were neutral to these amendments.

320 REIDER: Prefer they remain neutral and let the legislature decide.

337 REP. FISHER: Numbers make it easier to share facilities.

361 REP. NORRIS: Was aware there was an effort to exempt Yaquina Bay and Coos Bay from SB 944.

381 -Makes statements about Columbia river traffic. Wants to know if this applies to all of the Columbia.

420 Closes the PUBLIC HEARING on SB 944. Will bring this bill back.
