044 REP. KEVIN MANNIX: Introduces amendments (Exhibit B).

- 336 CHAIR FISHER: Explains plans to blend HB 2120 and HB 2420 into one bill, also including terminology from HB 2463 and HB 2446.
- 353 REP. LIZ VANLEEUWEN: Supports combining HB 2120 and HB 2420, and notes

- JILL BOWLING, DEPARTMENT OF FORESTRY: Submits and reads from Exhibit F. Provides comments about how to craft state Endangered Species listing; notes key policy issues.
- 076 REP. CORCORAN: Questions "sound verifiable" vs. " best available".
- 080 BOWLING: Prefers "sound verifiable".
- 083 REP. CORCORAN: Suggests that the term "sound verifiable" will cause problems in delisting; feels it is a higher standard.
- Questions Exhibit F, ecosystem approach rather than single species approach; "unintended negative consequence".
- 095 BOWLING: Provides clarification; discusses decoupling of listing process
- and the recovery planning process. Long range management planning effort,

holistic view of forest. Downside of concentrating on a few species, is that other species tend to fall by the wayside. Look at planning process, important to use common sense, give managers flexibility at the local level.

- 130 REP. WELSH: Concerned about appeal process, Exhibit F; need to look at it.
- 140 BOWLING: No appeal process at this time. (In planning).
- REP. JOSI: Discusses scientific and political processes involved. Science is involved in listing/delisting; questions if politics are then involved in planning/recovery process.
- 168 BOWLING: Responds, "We're making some trade-offs and balancing things".
- 186 Important to separate the listing and planning processes.
- 206 REP UHERBELAU: Questions if analysis of social and economic factors happens during the recovery period.
- 214 BOWLING: We need to do more thinking about where this is more appropriate.
- 224 REP JOSI: Need to design public input "so as not to derail the original intent".
- 230 DAN TEN EYCK, REYNOLDS METALS COMPANY, MGR. OF PUBLIC AFFAIRS: Comments

that HB 2420 is simpler, supports it. Discusses fish issues on Columbia River.

Regarding HB 2120, generally supports it, notes that the bill is much more complicated, technical, could benefit by additional consideration of language.

- TOM REYNOLDS: Calls for balance and understanding of environmental impacts.
- 330 GREG MILLER, STATE TIMBER PURCHASERS DIVISION OF OREGON FOREST INDUSTRIES COUNCIL: Submits Exhibit G, amendments to ORS 496.004. Questions differences made by listing at the state level.

Recovery is the main concern; narrow the focus by definition. Suggests

amendment.

403 REP. JOSI: Notes that amendment seems limited to birds.

- 015 REP. JOSI: Requests clarification of "to not qualify."
- 093 STEVE KAFOURY, AMERICAN FISHERIES SOCIETY: Here to solve problems, comments to testimony preceding him. Economics should be other than biologist's concern.
- Notes regarding the term "verifiable science", that peer review is done all the time; asked by other scientists continually to do it. Standard of science should be set by peer review.
 - Ecosystem management is important in terms of cutting costs.
- MARLIN ARNEY, UNITED PAPERWORKERS OF OREGON: Speaks in support of HB 2120.
- JOHN MCCULLEY, OREGON CATTLEMEN'S ASSOCIATION: Makes general comments in support of HB 2120. Change is good, direction is good, like human element in legislation.
- 235 RUDY ROSEN, OREGON DEPARTMENT OF FISH AND WILDLIFE: Submits Exhibit End reads from it, providing constructive comments related to changing and improving the Oregon Threatened and Endangered Species Act.
- "Cooperative programs should involve the public" (Exhibit H).
- Need to avoid listing species in the first place.
- 345 REP. LEWIS: Refers speaker to Mr. Miller's remarks, solicits his opinion.
- ROSEN: Responds, in terms of handing over state's responsibility to federal government, "we give up opportunity to create management plans that
- can allow for state redemption for rights of management". Cites example.
- JIM GREER, STATE DEPARTMENT OF FORESTRY: Responds, management plan by state allows for flexibility.
- 404 REP. LEWIS: Referring to Exhibit G, asks for comments from Mr. Rosen regarding listing issues.

002 ROSEN: Prefer not to give up state's rights. Biological determination should not be feared here in Oregon. Danger of reproductive failure should

be watch list; then once species are listed, this simply identifies species as being in danger of reproductive failure.

- 030 REP. LEWIS: Questions what it costs the state to go through its own independent listing.
- 074 REP. UHERBELAU: Requests clarification regarding whether economic impacts are frozen in time. Questions if ODFW has the means to determine future impacts.

- 087 ROSEN: If I understand you correctly, no. Explains social and economic impacts.
- 113 REP. UHERBELAU: Lack of clarity, if a species is endangered, purely biological determination. Questions where we bring in the discussion of economics and people.
- MIKE MILLER, EXECUTIVE VICE-PRESIDENT, OREGON ASSOCIATION OF LOGGERS: Doesn't want any species to become extinct. We have limited capability to recover a species.
