004 CHAIR FISHER: Calls the meeting to order at 1:37 PM.

Opens the Public Hearing on SCR 2 Witnesses: Senator Rod Johnson

Ted Ferrioli, Malheur Timber Operators

Paul Ehinger

Ross Mickey, National Firefighters Association KC Cowan, Wheelabrators Environmental Systems

- Old STAFF: Presents overview of SCR 2 which is a request to Congress to immediately adopt legislation requiring that dead and dying timber on federal lands in Oregon be sold, awarded and available for harvest.
- O30 SEN. ROD JOHNSON: Testifies in support of SCR 2, calls attention to resolutions on page 2 of SCR 2-A.
- 073 -Provides Senate vote statistics. Continues with discussion of SCR 2.
- Resolution is on track with events in Congress.
- 120 Dead and dying trees problem most acute in Eastern Oregon; witnesses

that testified at Senate Natural Resources were not required to come and testify in this committee; Senator Johnson speaks for them. Will submit testimony from that meeting to Staff.

- Discusses dead timber and fires, in response to Chair Fisher's comment about a conference on forest fires.
- 200 REP. CORCORAN: Questions perception of impact on environmental lawsuits, referring to release of harvest timber for previously offered, sold and/or awarded timber sales.
- 230 TED FERRIOLI, MALHEUR TIMBER OPERATORS: Testifies in support of SCR 2. Submits Exhibit H.
- 290 CHAIR FISHER: Questions the scope of his area (Malheur).
- 301 PAUL EHINGER: Submits Exhibit A and discusses it, highlighting mill closures; media is "numb", don't want to hear about it (mill closures & job
- loss). "Silent attrition".
- Continues his testimony, citing information from Exhibit A.
- Notes effect of inflation, clarifies testimony.
- 457 CHAIR FISHER: In other words, the consumer has "swallowed" the expense.
- 465 EHINGER: Agrees, continues with presentation of Exhibit A.
- 535/022 Continues with presentation of Exhibit A.

TAPE 16, A

- 058 EHINGER: Testifies that the available jobs have gone down not because of automation, but because of volume of wood available.
- O83 Provides statistics demonstrating the problems with the current timber economy; we get more out of every log.
- 102 CHAIR FISHER: Provides comments.
- 145 EHINGER: Lists mills that have recently closed, or downsized.
- 195 REP. CORCORAN: Requests estimate of imported logs.
- 203 EHINGER: Somewhere between 300 500 million board feet; can't verify.
- 212 REP. CORCORAN: Questions how much timber we are exporting.
- 225 ROSS MICKEY, NATIONAL FIREFIGHTERS ASSOCIATION: Testifies in support of SCR 2. Discusses wildfires, forest health and ecosystem management.
- 278 Acres burned, "didn't go in and thin out the herds", i.e. trees, so forests are grossly overpopulated, stressed, insects are killing them off.

Forests need management.

305 - Situation ripe for major wildfire, "massive destruction". Creating an

ecosystem in the NW that we've never seen before; not a balanced system. Either nature will restore the balance (via insects, disease or wildfire), or we will (by good forest management).

- Calls for sensible management.
- 355 CHAIR FISHER: Wonders if situation will invite arson.
- 360 EHINGER: States that arson is a "ridiculous assumption".
- 370 MICKEY: Responds to Chair's question. Only makes sense if you're talking

about a monolithic huge industry. Too much risk for an individual for no return.

404 EHINGER: Offers a different perspective about arson. No one can know what's in the mind of an arsonist; bigger threat is lightening strikes.

- 005 EHINGER: Continues sharing about lightening strikes and catastrophic forest fires.
- 038 K.C. COWAN, WHEELABRATORS ENVIRONMENTAL SYSTEMS: Supports SCR 2, represents wood fueled plants.
- 082 Explains test project in Eastern Oregon, and the reason Wheelabrators supports SCR 2.
- 093 CHAIR FISHER: Questions what kind of forests worked in. (Fir or Pine).
- 095 COWAN: Clarifies, and elaborates on the thinning performed.
- STAFF: Submits for the record, written testimony from Barnes Forestry in

support of SCR 2. (Exhibit B)

- 124 SEN JOHNSON: Lists submittals for the record (Exhibit I).
- 146 CHAIR FISHER: Closes Public Hearing on SCR 2
 Opens Work Session on SCR 2

MOTION: REP. WELLS: Moves that SCR 2 A be sent to the Full Committee with a recommendation that it BE ADOPTED AS AMENDED

VOTE: In a roll call vote, all members that are present vote AYE. REP. WELSH is excused.

CHAIR FISHER: The motion CARRIES.

- 160 CHAIR FISHER: Closes Work Session on SCR 2
 Opens the Public Hearing on HB 2568 and HB 2601 Concurrently.
- 166 STAFF: Presents overview of HB 2601. Bears have been removed, season was over moot point.
- 190 Presents overview of HB 2568.
- 205 ROD INGRAM, OREGON DEPARTMENT OF FISH AND WILDLIFE: Submits Exhibit C, regarding HB 2601 and Measure 18. Chances of success in taking a cougar without hounds is very slim.
 - Offers amendments.
 - Delete "upon application" line 6. Would rather refund to all

non-successful hunters, otherwise a lot of paperwork.

- 289 REP. JOSI: Questions the number of legal successful hunts.
- 300 INGRAM: Every cougar taken has to be reported to our office for biological history of takes.
- 316 REP. WELLS: Questions the procedure regarding the tag and a successful hunt.
- 325 INGRAM: Responds, tear out day and date on tag or be cited. All cougar taken in state must be taken to ODFW office and checked in .
- 337 REP. WELLS: Questions how many potential tags to be reimbursed.
- 341 INGRAM: Provides statistics; about 450 tags to be refunded. Fiscal impact about \$25,000.
- 358 REP. CORCORAN: Comments that there may be some rationale regarding date
- of effect of Measure 18, not interested in refunding money prior to implementation of law for those that already hunted and were not successful.
- 392 INGRAM: Explains, responds that there is no way to know if people actually hunted or not.
- 412 CHAIR FISHER: Thanks department for offering refund in the first place.
- 476 REP. LARRY SOWA: Submits Exhibit D and testifies, opposing HB 2568.
- 800 ROD INGRAM, OREGON DEPARTMENT OF FISH & WILDLIFE: Submits Exhibit E, commenting on HB 2568. Doesn't think the hunters should have to pay for the damages incurred by the creatures protected from hunting by recent legislation.
- 598 REP. WELLS: Questions the Wildlife Fund, what it is and asks if we generally compensate for damage due to wildlife.

- OO2 INGRAM: Responds, explains fund. The state of Oregon does not currently compensate for damages due to wildlife.
- 039 ROD HARDER, OREGON SPORTSMENS DEFENSE FUND: Supports HB 2568. Submits Exhibit F and testifies from it. Supports HB 2601.
- 128 CHARLES WILLIAMSON, ATTORNEY, HUMANE SOCIETY: Opposes HB 2568, submits Exhibit G.
- 174 Continues to read, cites letter from Dr. Paul Beier in his testimony regarding increase in human/cougar encounters.
- 220 Suggests that liability be checked out before bill is passed.
- $^{232}\,$ Regarding HB 2601, notes statistics regarding number of tags vs. number of cougar taken.
- 258 CHAIR FISHER: Closes the Public Hearing on HB 2568 and HB 2601 Opens the Work Session on HB 2568

MOTION: REP. JOSI: Moves that HB 2568 be sent to the Full Committee with a

DO PASS recommendation.

VOTE: In a roll call vote, REPS. JOSI, FISHER AND WELLS vote AYE. REPS. CORCORAN AND WELSH ARE EXCUSED.

CHAIR FISHER: The motion CARRIES.

285 CHAIR FISHER: Closes the Work Session on HB 2568
Opens the Work Session on HB 2601.

MOTION: REP. JOSI: Moves the $\,$ -1 amendments, AS AMENDED by Oregon Fish & Wildlife Department proposals, BE ADOPTED.

VOTE: CHAIR FISHER: Hearing no objections, the amendments are ADOPTED. All members are present. REPS. CORCORAN AND WELSH are EXCUSED.

MOTION: REP. JOSI: Moves that HB 2601, AS AMENDED be referred to the Full Committee with a DO PASS recommendation.

VOTE: In a roll call vote, REPS. JOSI, FISHER & WELLS vote AYE. REPS. CORCORAN & WELSH are EXCUSED.
