drafted without knowing that HB 2124 would be re-passed this session -describes that measure creates special property tax assessment for 0.5.0 historic commercial property (quorum established) -questions and discussion 069 Mike Byrnes -appears on behalf of Senator Hannon as well as Historic Preservation League of Oregon -explains history of measure and its relationship to SB 2124 -distributes and refers to testimony titled "Recommended Housekeeping Amendments to SB 684" (Exhibit A) -requests committee permission to work with legislative counsel to 100 incorporate amendment and contribute information toward fiscal impact statement 112 -distributes memorandum from Historic Preservation League of Oregon (Exhibit B) 170 Lisa Burcham -Historic Preservation League of Oregon -distributes and reads written testimony in support of SB 684 (Exhibit C) 262 -question about any known opposition to measure 270 Cathy Galbraith -Bosco-Milligan Foundation, Director -states mission of Foundation to open a regional architectural heritage center which would serve as a resource center for historic property owners and advocates in SE Portland "SB 684, for the first time, provides meaningful incentives to private 308 property owners to help them preserve their historic properties" -speaks to value of historic preservation in Oregon and its relationship 320 to jobs, tourism, construction industry, energy conservation and land conservation 386 -states importance of incentives offered in SB 684 to people of "very moderate means" TAPE 071 SIDE A 014 Galbraith -testimony continues about preservation of irreplaceable heritage in Oregon -questions and discussion about any known opposition to this measure and building code requirements which may prohibit preservation 023 James Hamrick -Oregon Parks and Recreation Department, Deputy State Historic Preservation Officer -presents written testimony in support of SB 684 (Exhibit D) -states for the record, Department support of incentives for historic and cultural resources Hamrick -approves: limiting benefit to depreciable property, one-time incentive for seismic upgrades of unreinforced masonry buildings, and incentives for property locally designated under statewide land use planning Goal 5 057 Hamrick -outlines concerns about bill as noted on page 2 of Exhibit D -distributes and comments on Questions/Recommendations for SB 684 052 Amendments (Exhibit E) 108 Chair Phillips -asks Mr. Hamrick to work with Mike Burns and legislative staff to achieve consistency on amendments 122 Judy Gerrard -Dayton, Oregon -distributes written testimony and comments in support of SB 684 (Exhibit F) 217 Les Miller -Dayton, Oregon -distributes written testimony and comments in support of SB 684 (Exhibit G) -comments about accessibility of the program and fair distribution of benefits within the affected group 265 John Beaulieu -Oregon Department of Geology and Seismic Safety Policy Advisory Commission -explains advantage of "reasonable" seismic retrofit of older buildings to reduce damage from earthquake -states no specific Department position on this measure yet, but 325 expresses willingness to work with interested parties in any aspects of retrofit in the State of Oregon -agrees to monitor bill closely -Portland Association of Building Owners and Managers (BOMA) 340 Robin White -speaks about state building code mandates for seismic retrofit, and "dangerous building codes" in some cities -states support of portion of measure dealing with seismic retrofit and 385 explains range of costs for retrofit TAPE 070 SIDE B SB 461 PUBLIC HEARING/ WORK SESSION Richard Yates -presents staff report on SB 461 which prohibits local 010 governments from imposing selective sales and gross receipts taxes -refers to Revenue Impact Statement (Exhibit M) with attached documentation

about magnitude of taxes in effect: Oregon transient lodging tax, summary of state and local taxes, and state and local government finances by level of government and state 1991-92 045 Mike McCallum -Oregon Restaurant Association and Oregon Small Business Coalition -distributes written testimony in support of SB 461 from Oregon Restaurant Association (Exhibit N) -notes language of proposed amendments to SB 461 and copy of Peat Marwick 225 study "Analyzing the Impact of State and Local Taxes on the Economy" attached in Exhibit N 2.32 Chair Phillips -summarizes five points of Mr. McCallum's testimony: .not asking for preemption .not asking for prevention of taxes .suggesting partnership between voters and local governments .desire to restore government credibility with voters .correlation between generation and purpose of tax 250 Joe Gilliam -National Federation of Independent Business State Director and Oregon Small Business Coalition Chair -states unanimous support of SB 461 by Oregon Small Business Coalition 260 -lists members of Coalition -membership advocates tax reform at the local level before committing support to tax reform at the state level - "the idea that you're going to go in and tax a restaurant or tax an auto garage for a general fund purpose is very unfair in our eyes" -questions and discussion about possible amendment relating tax to 310 industry at all levels of state government ("one pocket theory"), and voter approval 343 Steve McCoid -Association of Oregon Food Industries President and Oregon Small Business Coalition -distributes written testimony in support of SB 461 as amended (Exhibit O) -questions and discussion about inclusion of state government and voter 400 approval TAPE 071 SIDE B 020 Marilyn Holstrom -City of Fairview, City Administrator -testifies in opposition to SB 461, stating that City opposes all preemption of local authority -explains measure's possible negative impact on funding sources for the City of Fairview needed to provide services for residents -describes effect of Measure 5 and plan to present a tax base increase 057 measure to voters -responds to impact of three proposed amendments Linda Meng -City of Portland, Chief Deputy City Attorney 082 -presents testimony from Portland City Attorney's Office (Exhibit Q) in opposition to SB 461 100 -explains effect of measure that would "get rid of and delete many existing taxes that were authorized by the legislature" and problem with distinction between excise tax and sales 110 -"the effect of this bill - the way it is written - is not what it purports to be by the proponents...the distinction between and excise tax and a sales tax is muddled throughout the entire bill" -points out problems with determining effect of the amendments 135 Marge Kafoury -City of Portland -states opposition and opinion that SB 461 is "the mother of all preemption bills" -speaks about restoration of confidence in government, and describes safequards/opportunities at the local level for cities to communicate with citizens 171 Kafoury -states fundamental objection to these types of bills which create "wedges and barriers" between government and industries at the local level -comments on confusing language in proposed amendment 180 SB 816 WORK SESSION 200 -Oregon Bankers Association Frank Brawner -reviews rationale for introduction of SB 816 which gives priority to security interest lien over lien for homestead deferred taxes if noted on certificate of title before tax lien attaches 2.2.2 -expresses support of measure in its current form, and plan for
