SEN. JOHN LIM, District 11: Testifies and submits written testimony 010 in favor of SB 343. [EXHIBIT A]
055 - bill doesn't preempt local regulations on graffiti

SEN. SORENSON: Is there a way to broaden the mandated sanctions so if

community needs some other labor done it can be added to the community service section?

SEN. LIM: I don't have a problem in broadening the penalty areas.

089 SEN. SORENSON: This is making an offense rather than a crime so we wouldn't incur any indigent defense costs for people accused of violating this offense, is that correct?

SEN. LIM: I'm not a lawyer.

CHAIR BRYANT: Page 2 of the amendments may make it more than a violation and cause indigent defense costs.

SEN. SORENSON: Can the community service be done for a city or for a non-profit group?

131 SEN. LIM: It isn't indicated in the bill.

REP. KATE BROWN, District 13: Testifies in support of SB 343-1 proposed amendments [EXHIBIT C]. Graffiti creates an atmosphere of fear, and a negative economic impact.

CHAIR BRYANT: Ouestions what can be considered a graffiti instrument.

SEN. SORENSON: When we add on sanctions, we make this a crime in competition with other crimes. How can we make it a violation rather than

a crime?

REP. BROWN: I think you avoid imposing jail sentences and that would

avoid the problem.

CRAIG WALKER, Lieutenant, Gresham Police Department: Testifies in support of SB 343.

Relates past history of graffiti treatment in Gresham.

WALTER SLUSARCZYK, Gresham Police Department: Would like bill to sav 260

it "shall"

impose a fine of \$500 rather than "may". Graffiti is a psychological

crime, and offenders do not need any leniency.

300 - leave it is a violation, eliminating costs so case can move to court more swiftly

315 - felt tip marker would be a graffiti instrument, but suggests adding specific "intent" to commit violation - parents need to be held responsible for children second time this

happens

363 CHAIR BRYANT: In Gresham voluntarily locking up the paint?

SLUSARCZYK:

384 SEN. SORENSON: Are there store thefts where people try to get spray paint?

SLUSARCZYK: We did a study and didn't see any increase of spray paint theft by voluntarily banning it.

411 CLAUDETTE LaVERT, City Council, City of Gresham: Testifies in support of SB 343.

Describes Gresham's experiences with graffiti.

445 RANDY LUMSFORD, Chief of Police, City of Silverton: Testifies in support of SB 343. Submits Mayor Ken Hector's written testimony for the record [EXHIBIT D].

482 JODI SHERWOOD, Community Policing Coordinator, City of Keizer: Testifies in favor of SB 343. Relates Keizer's experience with graffiti ordnance.

SEN. BRYANT: Do stores have an obligation to lock up paint, or keep book on sales in your ordnance?

SHERWOOD: No, we do not.

096 SEN. SORENSON: If defendant doesn't do what judge ordered, what can judge do?

SHERWOOD: Californian cities stop them from getting drivers licenses 098

SEN. BAKER: When you currently arrest juveniles do you ask them where they got supplies?

SHERWOOD: Not exactly.

SEN. STULL: Keizer has the support of the business community.

152 PAUL SNIDER, Association of Oregon Counties: Testifies without a position on SB 343.

Graffiti problem is significant.

165 $\,$ JIM ARNESON, Oregon Criminal Defense Lawyer's Association: Has concern that Lines 5-7 of SB 343-1 amendments might elevate offense to more

than a violation.

- has concern that possession of graffiti instruments would lead to discriminatory enforcement against minorities

190 $\,$ CHAIR BRYANT: You would suggest doing away with the part about possession of graffiti instrument with intent to use it.

ARNESON: Yes.

195 SEN. HAMBY: Washington County doesn't have court time for violations and misdemeanors.

I share that concern. I don't know what the fiscal or SNIDER: organizational impact would be on counties to implement. It isn't clear under whom community service will be.

222 SEN. SORENSON: You are interested in other ways to deal with sections that refers to Department of Corrections, what did you have in mind?

216 ARNESON: Impose a fine but allow person to void fine by doing community service.

CHUCK MARTIN, City of Portland Graffiti Steering Committee, Vice President and President-Elect of Alliance of Portland NeigHB orhood Business

Testifies and submits written testimony on SB 343. [EXHIBIT E] Has some problems with amendments.

- 387 CHAIR BRYANT: Sen. Lim is willing to delete section dealing with retailers; locking up paint and keeping books.
- 406 TED HUGHES, Pacific Northwest Paint Council: Testifies in favor of SB
- 343. National Paint Council has developed research in graffiti area which is available upon request.
- 467 SEN. SORENSON: Is it true that a large portion of paint is stolen?
- HUGHES: Don't know answer to that.

 $490\,$ CHAIR BRYANT: Department of Corrections needs to be deleted, do you have suggestions Mr. Taylor?

TAPE 65, B

- 045 TAYLOR: I believe we should take that out. On page 1, fine of \$500 perhaps could be increased to \$750 which is less than a misdemeanor. This gives judge the option of imposing community service and the person the option of accepting it, in lieu of a fine.
 - mandated community service starts to look like a crime questions if mandated service becomes involuntary servitude
- 066 SEN. SORENSON: A time limit on community service is good. Wants to delete Department of Corrections from amendment, and requirement of record keeping.
- 082 CHAIR BRYANT: Within Section 7, items 3, 4, and 5 would be deleted.
- 084 CHAIR BRYANT: Conceptual we have Mr. Taylor's suggestions plus Sen. Sorsenson's suggestion that community service must be completed within six months.
- 106 $\,$ TAYLOR: With the option, the person can choose and we reduce problems with involuntary servitude.
- SEN. SORENSON: I would like to put a time limit in the statutes.
- 133 CHAIR BRYANT: Language could be "in no event shall this community service not be performed within six months".
- 123 SEN. SORENSON: I like the language "community service shall include removing graffiti either those the defendant created or those created by another or both or such other community service as the court deems appropriate"
- 132 SEN. HAMBY: I think time should be open ended.
- 139 CHAIR BRYANT: OK, we will change that to at least 30 hours, and under Section 2b at least 20 hours.
- 143 TAYLOR: Do we want the language "At the option of the court and the option of the defendant or option of the defendant" as defendant may choose 30 hours of community service.
- 146 CHAIR BRYANT: Prefer to let judge have discretion on it. I intend to leave in Section 3 on intent.
- 178 SEN. SORENSON: I'm concerned with broadening this to allow police officers to ticket people or arrest them for conduct which they may not be aware is a violation of an offense.
- 197 CHAIR BRYANT: Section 7 prohibits selling to minors without consent of parent. Section 6 imposes a \$250 fine which is rather steep.
- 215 SEN. STULL: One thought is to insert "intent".
- CHAIR BRYANT: We will prepare amendment and bring bill back.

Questions whether this would include workers compensation insurers as payer. 125 JIM ARNESON, Oregon Criminal Defense Lawyer's Association: Has concern with Section 4 as when you allow at DA's discretion the aggravation of crimes into one count you have problem with what crime you are in violation of. 165 - has a concern when don't identify what claim is for five year limitation 170 - don't know what Section 6 means CHAIR BRYANT: If you could express your concerns to Janine. 180 Closes PUBLIC HEARING on SB 220 Opens WORK SESSION on SB 367 CHAIR BRYANT: We pulled this bill back as we have a problem. TAYLOR: Problem is slot machine can be both a gray machine and a gambling device and under the definition it would be in violation of a gray machine. Explains Amendments SB 367-2. [EXHIBIT H] 220 CHAIR BRYANT: I went over these changes with the state police. CHAIR BRYANT: Moves to SUSPEND RULES to bring SB 367 back to MOTTON. committee. Hearing no objections, the motion CARRIES. All members are present. VOTE: MOTTON. CHAIR BRYANT: Moves to ADOPT SB 367-2 AMENDMENTS. Hearing no objections, the amendments are ADOPTED.
