- SEN. SPRINGER: What counties will receive less money?
- CAREY: Eleven counties. It is a hold harmless feature so they don't 318 receive less money.
- SEN. SPRINGER: Section 4, sub 5 refers to community corrections plans,

and questions how that is going to work.

- McGUIRE: Section 4, page 2, lines 41- 45 deals with what we hope will produce a data base.
- 404 SEN. SPRINGER: Were any judges asked for input, as if judges don't trust this it won't work?
- SYNDER: Several judges had input.
- SEN. HAMBY: Will the state have beds when counties don't have room? 440
- CAREY: Department of Corrections will probably be buying beds outside of the state.
