REP HAYDEN: Why was section 3 deleted, and what is the need for the bill in the absence of section 3?

NINA JOHNSON, EXECUTIVE ASSISTANT TO SECRETARY OF STATE: Testifies in

opposition; Want to make everything internally consistent.

268 REP WYLIE: Concerned about governmental or publicly funded bodies that must respond to the existence of a ballot issue.

295 JOHNSON: This amendment makes the bill cleaner and more consistent.

REP HAYDEN: Can a state employee sign a petition during working hours?

341 ART JAMES, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT: Testifies in support; support Secretary of States position to provide greater clarity in the law. -REP HAYDEN, NINA JOHNSON AND ART JAMES CONTINUE DISCUSSION.

CHAIR PARKS: Governor's office has conceptual amendments that they thought might improve the bill and we will talk about those before I accept your motion.

ADKINS: The current wording is more appropriate to an agency that

regulates businesses. - Need to make the bill apply to private companies in the gaming

industry that have a contractual relationship to lottery, not regulated by the lottery.

MOTION: REP HAYDEN MOVES THAT THE CONCEPTUAL AMENDMENT BE ADOPTED

VOTE: HEARING NO OBJECTION THE CONCEPTUAL AMENDMENT IS ADOPTED

MOTION: REP HAYDEN MOVES THAT HB 2453 BE SENT TO THE FULL COMMITTEE WITH A DO PASS RECOMMENDATION

VOTE: IN A ROLL CALL VOTE THE MOTION PASSES. REP HAYDEN, REP WYLIE AND

CHAIR PARKS VOTING AYE. REP EDMUNSON AND REP MILNE ARE EXCUSED.

HB 3343 - PUBLIC HEARING

(EXHIBIT J), SUBMITTED BY JON MANGIS, THROUGH STAFF. REP HAYDEN: Testifies in support of HB 3343 and HB 3250. - HB 3343: this bill would work with people with substantial lists of

property and urge the coordination of all those properties. - HB 3250: the intent is to allow the public greater access to the

decision making process.

REP JOHN MEEK, DISTRICT 5: Testifies in support. - HB 3343: this would be of great value to all.

172 REP WYLIE: Do state agencies have the authority to accept property that might have strings?

REP MEEK: A variety of agencies have the authority, statutorily to

accept gifts.

REP WYLIE: How far away are we from having this task completed?

REP MEEK: Minimal fiscal impact, it's a matter of accumulating it, the

target is on or before September 15.

REP HAYDEN: Refers to fiscal.

212 REP BAKER: The school district that I just came off the board with, did this about three years ago and it is a very healthy exercise.

REP MEEK: Just in Washington county, they sold property in excess of four hundred thousand dollars, property that was no longer necessary to own.

240 CHAIR PARKS: Shouldn't the Veteran's Department do this to the

extent that they are equity owners on foreclosed property?

REP HAYDEN: That would be up to you.

CHAIR PARKS: Why shouldn't property that you have foreclosed on and are holding in inventory subject to resale, be included in the state's

property?

252 LEONARD HILL, PROPERTY MANAGER, DEPARTMENT OF VETERAN'S AFFAIRS: We usually dispose of these properties as rapidly as possible and the

proceeds go to the Oregon War Veteran's sinking fund.

CHAIR PARKS: How many properties do you have now?

HILL: We only have about fifteen properties.

293 - CHAIR PARKS AND REP MEEK CONTINUE DISCUSSION

REP WYLIE: I worked with the foreclosure program in Multnomah county and there are ways of negotiating fees for large amounts of property

appraisals.

306 BILL NICKLEBERRY, DEPARTMENT GENERAL SERVICES: Testifies; submits written testimony (EXHIBIT K).

133 GARY BAUER, OREGON INDEPENDENT TELEPHONE COMPANY: Testifies. -Wants clarification of "Expenditure"

CHAIR PARKS: In reviewing Cindy Becker's testimony it appears she may be correct.

REP HAYDEN: Intent was to open up the process to interested individuals and provide public notice.

188 REP HAYDEN: Get possible work group together.

223 CHAIR PARKS: Asks interested parties to call Rep Hayden's office to participate in work group.
