Roberts asks whether we can give any exemptions. Steve Johnson states that this law affects only trucks on the federal highways > Answering Rep. Hosticka, states that log trucks and dump track generally fit into the wheel base pattern > Answering Rep. Roberts, Johnson states that Oregon law gives incentive to add axles

349 > Mike Meredith, Oregon Trucking Associations, testifies in opposition to the intent of the bill > Chair Norris asks what changes would have to be made to trucks > Rep. Hosticka clarifies that this bill would not make trucks obsolete, but would charge an \$8 per year exemption fee
