health professionals -the intent of the bill is not to exclude anyone

-discusses added costs beyond long term care 291 -section 5,
subsection 3: problems with the language 328 -discusses lack of
monitoring -this bill has a definite fiscal impact

345 LISA JOYCE, DEPARTMENT OF INSURANCE & FINANCE: supports
cooperating with the industry -shifting private paid patients fund
source, like savings to long term care insurance will not save
significant money for Medicaid -discusses language problems:
"institutional care" use of word, "suitable"; suggests "appropriate"
415 Section 10 language: purpose is not clear
