007 REPRESENTATIVE JOHN WATT, COMMITTEE CHAIR: Convenes meeting at
1:33 as subcommittee. -Rep. Delna Jones is excused.

015 WATT: Opens hearing on HB 2314.

(Tape 28, Side A) HB 2314 - REQUIRES FISCAL OFFICER TO PREPARE HUMAN
SERVICE IMPACT STATEMENTS

017 ADRIENNE SEXTON, COMMITTEE ADMINISTRATOR: Explains HB 2314.

045 LEE HAZELWOOD: Introduces and explains written testimony
(EXHIBITS A & B).

083 REPRESENTATIVE LONNIE ROBERTS: Didn't we pass out something like
this last session? 087 ED SAGE: Yes, there are clear fiscal
statements, but what about people or positions
that will be cut or added?

101 ROBERTS: How will they determine that?

112 SAGE: We just want some semblance of order.

129 ROBERTS: I don't know if anyone is qualified to answer about the
human impact.

160 WATT: We need more specifics.

175 SAGE: We'll get that to you.

184 JOHN MULLIN: Submits written testimony (EXHIBIT C).

208 ROBERTS: Where does the H.S.C.O. get money?

211 MULLIN: Membership fees. Government employees and private employees.

229 ELLEN LOWE, ECUMENICAL MINISTRIES: In support of HB 2314.
-Submits a study (EXHIBIT D).

309 BETSY BAILEY: In opposition to HB 2314.

344 WATT: Closes hearing on HB 2314.

350 REPRESENTATIVE DAVE MCTEAGUE: Questions why HB 2314 is necessary.

378 WATT: Opens hearing on HB 2495.

382 SEXTON: Explains HB 2495.

445 REPRESENTATIVE BEVERLY CLARNO: In support of HB 2495. -Submits
written testimony (EXHIBITS E & F).

TAPE 29, SIDE A

035 CLARNO: Continues. -Gives examples.

077 REPRESENTATIVE MICHAEL PAYNE: Would this prohibit some
student activities (co- curricular)?

083 CLARNO: I haven't seen anything about that yet.

116 CAMERON BIRNIE: Submits written testimony (EXHIBIT G) in
support of amended version of HB 2495.

158 WATT: How many fleets are there?

161 BIRNIE: 6 or 8. -Continues explaining what motor pool does.
-Explains written testimony.

271 ROBERTS: Asks question to clarify a line in the written
testimony.

280 BIRNIE: Not sure, but will find out the answer.

295 WATT: Questions what an acceptable driving record is.

300 BIRNIE: According to D.M.V. Will be defined soon. -Will get more
clarity on that. -Reads down his list of things that will be changed.

402 WATT: Questions what "pursuing consolidation" means.

412 BIRNIE: Responds. -Closing remarks.

TAPE 28, SIDE B

030 ROBERTS: What is a "direct activity" dealing with academics?

040 BIRNIE: Responds.

065 ROBERTS: Asks about insurance.

080 DAVE WHITE, RISK MANAGEMENT: Limits that the state has are \$200,000 per person and up to \$500,000 total.

107 WATT: Could you define what "agents of the state" are?

110 WHITE: Can't be sure until after the fact. -Gives example.

125 WATT: A student?

127 WHITE: After the fact, maybe. But we don't think so. -Notes about rehabilitation programs.

144 PAYNE: For perspective . . . compared to the state as a whole, how is the state's accident record?

150 WHITE: Low. Most drive during the day, but alot of higher education do night driving.

160 HAYDEN: Does the state save money by being self-insured?

170 WHITE: Responds.

188 PAYNE: Asks for comparison to rental car companies, etc.

194 WHITE: State is in the good group in comparison to most.

202 PAYNE: Asks about consolidation . . . and why not?

213 BIRNIE: Responds.

235 KARMEN FORE, OREGON STUDENT LOBBY: Written testimony (EXHIBIT H) in opposition to HB 2495 in present form. -Suggests changes in language.

292 WATT: By adding this language, who would that restrict from driving state vehicles?

296 FORE: No one.

301 REPRESENTATIVE ELDON JOHNSON: What kind of penalties are there?

309 CHERYL HUNTER: Responds. -Comments on Rep. Clarno's testimony. -Notes what accidents occurred.

410 ROBERTS: Notes that we're not just talking about accidents, but also about citations and being pulled over.

450 HUNTER: Notes that there is a driver certification procedure for U of O.

TAPE 29, SIDE B

045 WATT: Did you contact rental car agencies about this?

055 ROBIN OAKES: Responds. -Notes handout (EXHIBIT I).

080 HUNTER: They would accept purchase order, but all drivers had to meet other requirements of having a major credit card and being over 25.

086 PAYNE: This bill is discriminatory because it's going after students. Why?

100 HUNTER: Responds.

114 SARA DODGE: Submits written testimony (EXHIBIT J). -Opposed to HB 2495 unless amendments are made.

160 JOHNSON: Do sports groups use state vehicles? 163 DODGE: Many teams except football do.

180 AMY NEEL: Speaks about project Saferide.

234 PAYNE: If we abolished funding for Saferide, would assaults increase?

240 NEEL: Yes. -Will provide written testimony at a later time.

252 FRANK GELTNER: Submits written testimony (EXHIBIT K & L). -In opposition because it would restrict out of classroom experiences. -Adopt language to have drivers be trained.

410 MARI ANNE GEST, O.P.E.U.: Submitted written testimony (EXHIBIT M) in opposition to HB 2495. -Notes not to restrict too much.

050 DUTCH BAUGHMANN: Submits written testimony (EXHIBIT N) in opposition of HB 2495.

116 THOMAS LUTHER, DEPT. OF TRANSPORTATION: Submits written testimony (EXHIBIT O) on HB 2495.

162 PAYNE: Do you know what the incident rate is in O.D.O.T.?

166 LUTHER: I can get that information.

172 DENIS DOWD, DEPT. OF CORRECTIONS: Speaks of vehicles operated by the inmates, etc.

234 DON UNDERWOOD, DEPT. of FORESTRY: Submits written testimony (EXHIBIT P). -In support of the majority of the bill.

258 ROBERTS: Do you have amendments?

262 UNDERWOOD: Not at this time. -Supports general services amendments to this bill.

297 KRISTI UFFELMAN, WOSC: In opposition of the language in the bill. -Change the "academic" language.

317 PAYNE: How many rental agencies are there near W.O.S.C.?
323 UFFELMAN: None I know of that we can rent from.
337 ROBERTS: Closes hearing on HB 2495.
341 SEXTON: Explains bills to be introduced (EXHIBIT Q).
395 MOTION: REP. JOHNSON moves that the bills be introduced.
406 ROBERTS: Hearing no objections, bills are introduced. -Adjourns
meeting at 4:51 p.m.
