029 RAY STEINFELD, JR: Informational. -Speaks on performance
measures. -As relating to business and government. -Concept of Total
Quality Management (TQM). -Notes that four benchmarks are most important:
-Customer service, accountability, commitment to positive change &

efficient/effective use of resources. -Very supportive to reducing
government.

171 REPRESENTATIVE ELDON JOHNSON: Do you operate a union operation?

Would a non-union operation work differently?

177 STEINFELD: Yes, Steinfeld's has a union. Unions are supportive of TQM, and non-unions aren't much different.

188 JOHNSON: Do you deal directly with employees?

194 STEINFELD: Not with bargaining. We do with grievances, but not directly with TQM.

-Submits written testimony (EXHIBITS D & E). -In support of HB 2031 as
amended.

040 HILLMAN: Would like to operate on their own.

060 PAYNE: Notes Salem Child Development Center is leasing space
at the fairgrounds. If HB 2031 goes through, will that lease be in
jeopardy?

064 HILLMAN: The lease would still be valid.

067 ORVILLE ROTH: In support of HB 2031. -Notes the need for the fair
to be an affordable function.

109 JACKIE WINTERS: In support of HB 2031. -The contracting process
is very difficult. -The constraints are too limiting.

142 JONES: Is the fair a non-profit business?

143 WINTERS: Yes.

145 JONES: Any objections to having a member of the neigHB orhoods
involved on the board?

147 HILLMAN, ROTH, WINTERS: All reply "no."

148 JONES: What possible objections could there be?

150 ROTH: Don't eliminate audits. -Notes high turnover of board
members.

166 JONES: Lack of control is a concern?

168 ROTH: Yes.

171 WATT: Asks about proposed amendments.

176 HILLMAN: Responds.

200 DAVE HALE: In support of HB 2031. -Doing this would cut a lot
of the red tape to allow Oregon to win

national competitions.

231 SUSAN BROWN, SALEM CHILD DEVELOPMENT CENTER: In support of HB
2031. -If this is not done, they might not be able to do what they have
been

doing so far.

249 MIKE ALLEN, NEIGHB ORHOOD COALITION: In support of HB 2031. -Also

in support of amended HB 2698. -Submits written testimony (EXHIBIT F).

349 JONES: Are you familiar with the amendments presented?

354 ALLEN: Yes. They are alright.

390 REBECCA FISHER, FFA: In support of HB 2031. -Explains the role of the FFA and the fair.

433 WATT: Do you know anyone who opposes this?

435 FISHER: No.

440 TROY HADLEY, FFA: In support of HB 2031.

038 ADAM BERGERSON, FFA: In support of HB 2031.

045 WILLIE BOVARD, FFA: In support of HB 2031. -State fair is very important to FFA. -HB 2031 will allow more to be done for young people.

086 GORDLY: How many members do you have and how many participate?

089 FISHER: About 4000 state wide and about 600 in the fair.

103 CAROL FISHER SULLIVAN, MARION COUNTY: In support of HB 2031.

123 AUDREY KENDALL: Not concerned with this bill . . . just here about the noise. Would it be noisy all year round if this bill passed?

150 LOUIS KENDALL: Repeats Audrey Kendall's concern.

157 WATT: Fair is subject to City of Salem laws.

164 RICH PEPPERS, OPEU: We represent some of the state fair employees.

173 PHYLLIS KEATON: On behalf of the employees. -In support of HB 2031.

185 LORI DAVIS: In support of HB 2031.

199 BOB BURTON: In opposition to HB 2031. -Should remain a state fair and not a private fair.

244 WATT: Specifically, why are you upset?

250 BURTON: Responds.

278 WATT: It seems that if it were a private corporation, those problems wouldn't exist.

282 BURTON: Responds.

300 HEIDI STUTZMAN: Introduces Jacqueline Zimmer. -Notes that Zimmer is here as a City Council member, not a Legislative

Aide.

320 JACQUELINE ZIMMER: In support of HB 2031 as long as the sensitive attitude stays in place, etc. -Proposes amendments (EXHIBIT G). -Don't abolish the capital planning commission.

389 CASEY CAMPBELL: In support of HB 2031. -Will eliminate red tape. -Keeps financial security for the fair. -Fair vendors are not hucksters.

444 FRITZ SKIRVIN, NEIGHB ORHOOD STATE FAIR LIAISON COMMITTEE: The relationship between the fair and the community is good now, so we need to make sure it stays that way after these changes.
