005 CHAIR BAUM: Calls the meeting to order at 2:12.

WORK SESSION ON SB 64A

060 KATHRYN VAN NATTA: Staff Measure Summary, Amendments, Senate Vote Sheet, Fiscal Impact Statement and Revenue Impact Statement are

submitted for the record (Exhibit A). SB 64 deals with mining. It provides for civil penalties for unpermitted mining activities. The amendment would decrease the fine from \$10,000 per day to \$5,000 per day.

097 REP. HOSTICKA: We're setting caps on penalties; we're not setting the penalties. What has changed since we passed this bill out?

105 CHAIR BAUM: The aggregate industry representatives decided \$10,000 was too high for a penalty.

109 REP. LUKE: They testified in favor of it and now they're not in favor of it?

111 REP NORRIS: I think \$5,000 is pretty steep.

120 MOTION: REP. JOSI: Moves to suspend the rules.

122 CHAIR BAUM: Restates motion.

124 VOTE: On a roll call vote, REPS. DELL, DOMINY, JOSI, MARKHAM, NORRIS, REPINE, VanLEEUWEN and CHAIR BAUM vote AYE. REPS. HOSTICKA,

LUKE and PETERSON vote NAY. REP. FISHER is EXCUSED.

140 CHAIR BAUM: The motion CARRIES.

142 MOTION: REP. JOSI: Moves to reconsider the vote by which SB 64 was passed.

143 VOTE: CHAIR BAUM: Hearing no objections, so ADOPTED.

145 MOTION: REP. JOSI: Moves to adopt -A2 amendments to SB 64-A.

147 CHAIR BAUM: Restates motion.

149 REP. REPINE: I would request that we have a more definitive answer on why the penalty was changed.

153 RICHARD ANGSTROM, Oregon Concrete and Aggregate Producers Assn.: Rep. VanLeeuwen raised the issue that \$10,000 may be too high. We still

support the \$10,000 but \$5,000 would be great.

167 REP. REPINE: What's the logic of the \$5,000?

173 REP. VanLEEUWEN: We're talking about anyone who moves any aggregate?

178 ANGSTROM: Yes.

180 REP. VanLEEUWEN: I think \$10,000 cap is too big a penalty for removing 1/2 yard of illegal gravel.

184 GARY LYNCH, Mined Land Reclamation Department: The minimum amount we have authority over is 5,000 yards. No permit is required for 5,000

yards or less.

193 REP. NORRIS: Did this come out of your committee with no opposition to the \$10,000?

200 REP. REPINE: There was some opposition to it.

204 REP. DOMINY: I don't believe I would support the amendment.

209 REP. HOSTICKA: Mr. Angstrom indicated that a person might be able to gross 6,000 per day on an aggregate operation. We'd want the penalty

to be at least higher than that.

212 REP. MARKHAM: There's a big difference between gross and net.

216 REP. LUKE: I think we did a good job when we passed it out of committee.

222 REP. DOMINY: Is this a big enough penalty?

226 LYNCH: There is nothing particularly important about the \$10,000 penalty.

238 REP. FISHER: If \$5,000 is satisfactory, we don't have to go any higher.

240 REP. DELL: We were convinced that the agency would not abuse the fine. If a big penalty would be needed, the \$10,000 fine would be available.

252 CHAIR BAUM: We will take a vote on the -A2 amendments.

258 LYNCH: In response to a question by Rep. VanLeeuwen, our current law (ORS 517.750) states that those operations that operate below 5,000

yards per year and one acre of disturbance are exempt from the rules.

269 VOTE: On a roll call vote, REPS. DELL, DOMINY, HOSTICKA, LUKE, NORRIS, PETERSON and REPINE vote NAY. REPS. FISHER, JOSI, MARKHAM,

VanLEEUWEN and CHAIR BAUM vote AYE.

278 CHAIR BAUM: The motion FAILS.

280 MOTION: REP. HOSTICKA: Moves SB 64-A Engrossed, as amended, to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation.

288 CHAIR BAUM: Restates motion. 290 VOTE: On a roll call vote, REPS. DELL, DOMINY, FISHER, HOSTICKA, JOSI, LUKE, MARKHAM, NORRIS, PETERSON and CHAIR BAUM vote AYE. REPS. REPINE and VanLEEUWEN vote NAY.

300 CHAIR BAUM: The motion CARRIES.

WORK SESSION ON HB 2792

320 VAN NATTA: Staff Measure Summary, -1 Amendments, and Revenue Impact Statement are submitted for the record (Exhibit B). HB 2792 eliminates

requirements that a partition plat be required for parcels created that are not surveyed and monumented. The exception applies to parcels

greater than 10 acres unless local ordinances otherwise require

recording.

349 REP. VanLEEUWEN: Who submitted the amendments?

352 VAN NATTA: They come from the county surveyors with input from the homebuilders.

354 MOTION: REP. REPINE: Moves the -1 amendments to HB 2792.

355 REP. HOSTICKA: Restates motion.

370 VOTE: REP. HOSTICKA: Hearing no objections, the AMENDMENTS are ADOPTED.

 $374\,$ MOTION: REP. JOSI: Moves HB 2792, as amended, to the floor, with a DO PASS recommendation.

376 REP. HOSTICKA: Restates motion.

383 REP. REPINE: Asks Rep. Luke if he's comfortable with the bill.

385 REP. LUKE: I wasn't in committee that day. If you're comfortable with it, I am.

390 REP. DELL: Were the -1 amendments written with the cooperation of the surveyors and the homebuilders?

399 REP. HOSTICKA: There has been plenty of opportunity for people to view these and raise objections if they are uncomfortable.

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005 VOTE: On a roll call vote, all members present vote AYE. CHAIR BAUM is EXCUSED.

010 REP. HOSTICKA: The motion CARRIES.

011 Closes work session on HB 2792.

012 REP. REPINE will carry the bill.

WORK SESSION ON SB 5

026 VAN NATTA: SB 5 repeals a Division of State Lands' statute regarding filing lode or placer mining claims on state-owned lands. Staff Measure Summary, Senate Vote Sheet, Fiscal Impact Statement and Revenue Impact

Statement are submitted for the record (Exhibit C)

045 MOTION: REP. JOSI: Moves SB 5 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation.

050 REP. HOSTICKA: Restates motion.

054 VOTE: On a roll call vote, all members present vote AYE. CHAIR BAUM is EXCUSED.

060 REP. HOSTICKA: The motion CARRIES.

061 REP. LUKE will carry the bill.

062 REP. HOSTICKA: Closes the work session on SB 5.

WORK SESSION ON SB 190-A

062 VAN NATTA: SB 190 relates to the non-chemical process mining policy and Department of Geology and Mineral Industries duties. Staff Measure

Summary, Senate Vote Sheet, Fiscal Impact Statement and Revenue Impact

Statement are submitted for the record (Exhibit D).

090 REP. DOMINY: We discussed taking the word "voluntary" out in lines 21 and 24 of page 2. It would read cleaner if we take the word "voluntary" out.

MOTION: Moves to suspend the rules to take out the word "voluntary" in

line 21 and line 24.

100 REP. HOSTICKA: Restates motion. Are there any objections?

103 REP. JOSI: I object. By putting "voluntary" in there, it is clear that this is over and above what mandatory reclamation practices are. The

word "voluntary" is pertinent to the language.

110 REP. FISHER: I agree with Rep. Josi.

111 REP. DOMINY: Dick Angstrom recommended this amendment.

115 DONALD HALL, Department of Geology and Mineral Industries: "Voluntary" does not add anything to the meaning. We are comfortable with the word

"voluntary" being removed in lines 21 and 24.

123 REP. JOSI: Withdraws objection.

126 REP. NORRIS: I think as a practical matter, if we amend the bill then it has to go back over to the Senate side and we might not get it

passed.

132 REP. VanLEEUWEN: I have another proposed amendment. I have a problem with Section 1 that says that it's the policy of the State of Oregon to recognize the contribution that the industry makes. Then we say in line 10, "and to prevent unacceptable adverse impacts on recreational

activities." Why don't we have in there to prevent the unacceptable adverse impacts on other natural resource industries as well as environmental, scenic and recreational? 144 REP. HOSTICKA: So you would be proposing to add "other natural resources" in line 10?

145 REP. VanLEEUWEN: Yes, other natural resource industries.

151 REP. FISHER: It would be important to me to have the word "voluntary" in there.

156 VOTE: On a roll call vote, REPS. DOMINY, HOSTICKA and VanLEEUWEN vote AYE. REPS. DELL, FISHER, JOSI, LUKE, NORRIS, PETERSON and

REPINE vote NAY. CHAIR BAUM is EXCUSED.

177 REP. HOSTICKA: The vote to suspend the rules fails.

180 MOTION: REP. LUKE: Moves SB 190-A to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation.

183 REP. HOSTICKA: Restates motion.

185 VOTE: On a roll call vote, all members present vote AYE. CHAIR BAUM is EXCUSED. 186 REP. HOSTICKA: The motion CARRIES.

190 REP. LUKE will carry the bill.

192 REP. HOSTICKA: Closes work session on SB 190-A.

WORK SESSION ON SB 255-A

195 CATHERINE FITCH: Staff Measure Summary, Lien Information, Senate Vote Sheet, Fiscal Impact Statement and Revenue Impact Statement are

submitted for the record (Exhibit E).

SB 255-A extends the time an agricultural lienholder has to notify

affected security interest holders of lien placement - from 20 days to

30 days. The measure also provides that failure to notify an affected

security interest holder of an agriculture lien of \$20,000 or more makes that lien subordinate to the perfected security interest lien.

212 REP. HOSTICKA: Does it make the whole lien subordinate to other security interest holders or just the \$20,000?

215 FITCH: It would make the whole lien subordinate.

219 REP. HOSTICKA: Asks Mr. Brawner if the whole lien is subordinate to other security interest holders.

221 FRANK BRAWNER, Oregon Bankers: It's intended that the amount in excess of \$20,000 becomes subordinate to other lien holders.

230 This bill only affects those when they don't send notice.

246 The entire agricultural community is in agreement with the bill, as far as I know.

252 MOTION: REP. JOSI: Moves SB 255-A to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation.

257 REP. HOSTICKA: Restates motion.

259 VOTE: On a roll call vote, all members present vote AYE. CHAIR BAUM is EXCUSED.

267 REP. HOSTICKA: The motion CARRIES.

269 REP. DELL will carry the bill.

270 REP. HOSTICKA: Closes work session on SB 255-A.

WORK SESSION ON SB 542-A

272 FITCH: Staff Measure Summary, Fiscal Impact Statement and Revenue Impact Statement are submitted for the record (Exhibit F).

SB 542 requires the State Forester to select suitable hardwood species

as well as coniferous species when reforesting state-owned and managed

lands. The bill also requires that silvicultural practices have as

their objective the maintenance or improvement of forest health and soil fertility.

284 REP. JOSI: This is something already in practice in many areas.

296 MOTION: REP. JOSI: Moves SB 542-A to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation.

300 REP. LUKE: Will this create problems for replanting forests?

302 FITCH: There was no negative testimony.

305 REP. HOSTICKA: The objective continues to be the production of a continuous supply of coniferous and hardwood timbers.

313 VOTE: On a roll call vote, all members present vote AYE. REP. DELL and CHAIR BAUM are EXCUSED.

320 REP. HOSTICKA: The motion CARRIES.

321 REP. FISHER will carry the bill.

322 REP. HOSTICKA: Closes work session on SB 542-A WORK SESSION ON SB 782

333 FITCH: Staff Measure Summary, Senate Vote Sheet, Fiscal Impact Statement and Revenue Impact Statement are submitted for the record

(Exhibit G).

SB 782 authorizes the state Health Division to establish a fee-supported program to certify a cross connection or backflow device inspector

certification program.

355 MOTION: REP. NORRIS: Moves SB 782 to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation.

361 REP. FISHER: I thought there were some proposed amendments.

363 REP. NORRIS: Those weren't adopted. We considered it and rejected it. It was proposed to include the words "and repair" on line 10, but we did not go ahead with that.

370 REP. REPINE: That amendment was withdrawn because they felt that those words would cause some other problems with the plumbing industry.

389 REP. NORRIS: We wouldn't want the inspectors to be inspecting their own work. This was to keep them separate.

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013 REP. HOSTICKA: There is a fiscal impact on this. So it's recommended that we move this bill to Appropriations.

019 SB 782 was moved to the Committee on Appropriations with a DO PASS recommendation.

020 VOTE: On a roll call vote, all members are present and vote AYE.

025 CHAIR BAUM: The motion CARRIES.

030 Closes work session on SB 782.

PUBLIC HEARING ON SB 933-A

042 REP. DOMINY: Requests that this bill not be heard because the Department of Housing believes they can resolve the situation through

the Housing Division. Submits letter from the Housing Division to that

effect (Exhibit H).

049 CHAIR BAUM: Closes public hearing on SB 933-A.

WORK SESSION ON SB 1005

050 VAN NATTA: Staff Measure Summary, -1 Amendments, Senate Vote Sheet, Fiscal Impact Statement and Revenue Impact Statement are submitted for

the record (Exhibit I).

SB 1005 conforms Oregon mining affidavit requirements with federal law. The amendments add an emergency clause.

074 MOTION: REP. REPINE: Moves the -1 amendments to SB 1005.

075 CHAIR BAUM: Restates motion.

076 VOTE: CHAIR BAUM: Hearing no objections, the AMENDMENTS

are ADOPTED.

080 MOTION: Moves SB 1005, as amended, to the floor with a DO PASS recommendation.

081 CHAIR BAUM: Restates motion.

082 VOTE: On a roll call vote, all members present vote AYE. REPS. DOMINY and HOSTICKA are EXCUSED.

090 CHAIR BAUM: The motion CARRIES.

091 REP. LUKE will carry the bill.

092 CHAIR BAUM: Closes work session on SB 1005.

WORK SESSION ON SB 1007-B

093 FITCH: SB 1007-B would create the Oregon Forest Resource Trust as a means of providing financial, technical and other support to private

forestland owners to establish new timber stands and improve forestland management.

Staff Measure Summary, -B3 Amendments, Senate Vote Sheet, Budget Report and Measure Summary, and Revenue Impact Statement are submitted for the record (Exhibit J).

120 REP. LUKE: The lien is actually on the timber, not on the land.

125 REP. DELL: That is the crux of the problem. The bill, however, says the lien runs with the land. I would want some clarification that

whoever writes the rules, writes them in such a way that a couple of

things are acknowledged. On thing would be that first lien holders are

in no way affected by this. Also landowners who sign these agreements

are given full notice that this may create some difficulties for them in subsequent refinances on their properties.

167 FITCH: I received a message that the Secretary of State would be happy to hold this bill over if necessary.

169 REP. LUKE: The Secretary of State's intention is to get some of their money back when somebody sells the timber. It is not their intention to cause problems with the land.

173 CHAIR BAUM: The issue is, should the bill address this issue of what the lien is attached to and notifying people of the ramifications of

that lien?

180 REP. DELL: I don't want to hold up this bill. I'm comfortable with it going with a letter saying we hope the rules will address these

issues.

189 REP. LUKE: There's nothing in this bill that forces the owners to sign it. I think it can be worked out by administrative rule.

196 REP. VanLEEUWEN: If it was unclear, I suggest we hold it.

201 REP. NORRIS: There is not a direct reference to a lien in the bill.

210 REP. LUKE: You create a lien by signing a contract stating they have an interest in the timber.

The point is, the bill doesn't say what the lien is against.

218 WALLACE RUTLEDGE, Department of Forestry: We envision this working the same way that the Forest Practices Reforestation requirements go with

the land. There is notification from landowner to landowner that the

obligation is there.

225 REP. DELL: So it is a lien against the property?

228 RUTLEDGE: It's not a lien as normally understood, because the money will not be collected from the property unless the timber is harvested.

233 REP. DELL: Is the land behind the promise of the contract?

237 RUTLEDGE: You could not sell the timber without repaying this.

241 REP. DELL: What's the filing process?

245 RUTLEDGE: It would be collected the same way as severance taxes are collected.

252 REP. DELL: You're saying that this does not operate against the property?

265 RUTLEDGE: In a sense that's right. It's not what we consider a normal lien. The timber is the process through which this is repaid.

268 REP. DELL: If I sell the timber and don't pay you, do you have to sue me to get the money?

275 RUTLEDGE: I believe that is correct.

278 REP. MARKHAM: You could require co-payment when the logs are sold.

282 REP. JOSI: Is there any opportunity to transfer the lien on the sale?

289 RUTLEDGE: Yes, the contract would have to be transferred with the transfer of the land.

317 REP. LUKE: How does a person sell the trees?

324 RUTLEDGE: There's several different ways.

361 REP. NORRIS: Could the contracts be made with an out of state owner?

368 RUTLEDGE: Yes.

370 REP. NORRIS: Would the contract be enforceable across state lines?

378 RUTLEDGE: Yes.

383 MOTION: REP. JOSI: Moves the -B3 amendments to SB 1007-B.

384 CHAIR BAUM: Restates motion.

385 MOTION: REP. JOSI: Moves SB 1007-B, with the -B3 amendments, to Appropriations Committee with a letter delineating our concerns with a DO PASS recommendation.

400 VOTE: On a roll call vote, all members present vote AYE. REPS. HOSTICKA and PETERSON are EXCUSED.

402 CHAIR BAUM: The motion CARRIES.

WORK SESSION ON HB 3087

047 FITCH: Staff Measure Summary, -8 Amendments, and Fiscal Impact Statement are submitted for the record (Exhibit L). Also submitted are

the -7 amendments (Exhibit M).

HB 3087 addresses the issue of regulatory compensation. It requires state agencies, local governments and special districts to compensate private property owners for specified actions taken after 1/1/94 which, for reasons not related to specific public health or safety, or direct

federal regulation, result in loss of land value. The -8 amendments would totally replace the bill.

 $077\,$ The -8 amendments would totally replace the bill. They call for a 15 member private property regulation task force to be formed within the

Executive Department. Those 15 members would be representatives of various state agencies and various landowner and user groups. It would be this group's responsibility to report to the Speaker, President of

the Senate, and the Governor as well as joint legislative committees.

113 REP. VanLEEUWEN: If no compensation was required, there would be no fiscal impact?

115 FITCH: Correct.

125 REP. BILL MARKHAM, District 46: Rep. VanLeeuwen is right, if there's no taking, there's no debt due. I don't think this bill will even get

past the House. I want the issue to be looked at.

145 REP. JOSI: I cannot support the bill the way it is, but I would be willing to support the -8 amendments.

149 REP. DOMINY: I submitted the amendments because there is doubt that the bill, as is, would get past the House. The key is to keep the issue out there.

176 MOTION: REP. DOMINY: Moves the -8 amendments to HB 3087.

178 CHAIR BAUM: Restates motion.

185 REP. VanLEEUWEN: If we prefer the version that came from the committee, we would vote "no" on the -8 amendments, even though they may be better than nothing.

190 CHAIR BAUM: That's true.

203 REP. FISHER: This could have a huge savings to the agencies if they were actually doing something to help out the situation instead of

taking property from people. 225 VOTE: On a roll call vote, REP. DOMINY, HOSTICKA, JOSI, LUKE and PETERSON vote AYE. REPS. DELL, FISHER, MARKHAM, NORRIS, REPINE,

VanLEEUWEN and CHAIR BAUM vote NAY.

230 CHAIR BAUM: The motion FAILS.

257 FITCH: The -7 amendments were not adopted by the subcommittee.

274 MOTION: REP. VanLEEUWEN: Moves the -7 amendments to HB 3087.

275 CHAIR BAUM: Restates motion.

280 VOTE: CHAIR BAUM: Hearing no objections, the AMENDMENTS are ADOPTED.

285 MOTION: REP. MARKHAM: Moves HB 3087, as amended, to the full committee with a DO PASS recommendation.

289 A five minute recess is called at 3:55.
