- 330 ANGSTROM: I am not familiar with all those who do. There is one I know of on the Nehalem River. On the Illinois there is one commercial operation. We get some gravel in upland resources at the mouth of the Illinois River.

380 SEN BUNN: Are you saying we won't stop increases by voting against this bill, because either the Oregon DEQ or the Federal government will do it?

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- 005 HANSEN: In this legislation, that is exactly the case.
- if \mbox{EPA} went to fee higher than \mbox{DEQ} , voting for this will keep the fee lower
- 010 SEN SMITH: I have heard for years "if we don't do it, then the 'Feds' will. So we have examples in other states where that is the case. DEQ is the only contact for EQC policies and is creating impediments to citizen relations to government. Maybe EQC should be given a chance.
- 021 HANSEN: We at DEQ have also thought internally, it might be better to give this back to the EPA.
- DEQ feels it is better to solve problems person to person through science and technology (rather than following rules and regulations). EPA's enforcement approach has lesser level of presence EPA's attitude toward enforcement is harsh DEQ staff as effective regulator explaining regulations to citizens DEQ provides greater levels of timely, technical assistance small particulate pollution needs to be addressed southern Oregon has one of the worst small particulate problems in the US Title 1 and 5 amendments Title 3 provides list of polluting substances
