217 CRAIG: The stewardship program is much broader than the intent of this program. They are complementary programs.

218 KEISLING: Presents overview of EXHIBIT A, proposed amendments of SB 100 7. 285 KINTIGH: Doesn't understand why bill plants more trees than the Forest Practices Act requires. 296 RUTLEDGE: The Forest Practices Act requires a minimum. If you plant 300 or more trees per acre, then you allow for commercial thinning. 302 CRAIG: This just gives some flexibility. 312 KEISLING: Section by Section analysis of SB 1007 amendments (EXHIBIT A).

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RUTLEDGE: The intent is to get at the lands that do not produce enough revenue to reforest; lands where outside assistance is needed to bring them back into full production.

388 SEN KINTIGH: Concurs with Rutledge's comment. Wonders if that intent is tied down enough in the bill. - questions to Rutledge

To comprehensively look at a watershed, you need a lead agency that deals with more than just fish or wildlife and that can coordinate with other agencies. Supports the allocation of lottery to this effort. 114 SEN DUKES: Agrees. 136 SEN S BUNN: Concurs. 142SEN J BUNN: Purchasing and converting water rights seems to he a large portion of this. Do we study the impact of this on communities? 160 SEN BRADBURY: The Department needs to look at all the options.

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- this bill does not deal with salmon only but rather the whole of the fish population in Oregon - cleveloping eco-systems is the type of program that needs to be dealt with in the watershed program

187 SEN DUKES: The irrigators have been with this hill from the beginning. There is still work to be done on this bill. 199 SEN COHEN: I would not feel comfortable leaving this up to ODFW. 212SEN KINTIGH: Is concerned the area is too large to coordinate in a concentrated effort. 212SEN S BUNN: We're racing against time. We need to move swiftly. 218 SEN BRADBURY: It clear that we will leverage new resources by doing this. - discusses possible amendments that may be proposed by Oregon Trout - Counsel could draft some language that would connect this bill with HB 201 5 - need to reference a locally created watershed council in this bill
