CHAIR CEASE: Giving exemptions for what was agreed to last session in SB 66 is not acceptable or agreeable to this committee after its passage through both houses unanimously.

O05 PETER GREEN, Committee Administrator, gives history of SB 1011 and section by section overview of proposed amendments, with memo on minimum recycle content - fees relating to virgin plastic pellet importation into Oregon - cap of 25 percent to raise \$2 million

O60 CHAIR CEASE: (Reads letter into the record) and presents overview of EXHIBIT H. 080 JOEL ARIO, OSPIRG, offers testimony on SB 1011, and overview of EXHIBIT I. -overviews of history of proposed measure - plastic provisions criteria included in legislation - plastic industry is not moving ahead - public demand was number 1 reason for legislation involving - number 2 reason was level of concern in industry with lack of investments within Oregon - largest plastics producer (American Plastics Council) does least promotion of recycling

227 CHAIR CEASE: If exemptions were extended till 1995, would the industry come back and ask for another extension? 235 ARIO: Yes, the extension is not what industry wants. They want exemption. - extension if tied to industry's movement toward specific recycled content goals CHAIR CEASE: If extension was given without work on acquiring funds for marketing, what message would be sent to those who made a good faith effort to meet standards of law? 260 ARIO: Companies who do the right thing are at disadvantage to those who do little or nothing, and end up paying for those who do not comply. 275 SEN SMITH: Many plastics are recycled at good rates. Some or these requests are impossible with existing technology. I am troubled that everything the plastics industry comes up with is unacceptable. There may not be an alternative and they may not meet these arbitrary deadlines we set. The recycling council may be dysfunctional because there are no ideas. OSPIRG and industry doesn't have answers. Only so much plastic can be converted into park benches. 31 l CHAIR CEASE: You have given us a very strong endorsement for this bill. You have said that there may be a need for an extension, but that if you had money for leveraging on the market and aided the process of finding more effective way to recycle, we wouldn't have a need to continue the extension. I think the two issues are tied together. The date you referred to was not arbitrary but agreed to by all parties (SB 66).

370 ARIO: Many involved in various parts of plastics industry say privately, the commitment from resin makers to recycling is less than 100 percent. Industry does not want that on the public record. Many tell me in private they have real questions about the resin makers commitment to recycling, and it is no secret why. - technology exists to use all types of plastic for recycling - bottle recycling was not economical until in place in many states - we support statutory fees - more responsibility needs to be with the top end of industrial scale

005 ARIO: - continues testimony on SB 1011, and overview of EXHIBIT I. - \$10 million for recycling - discussion with committee members 040 SEN KINTIGH: I don't think there is all the public concern you

say regarding plastic recycling. 053 ARIO: The public is in support of plastic recycling. 058 DANKO: DEQ supports concepts in amended SB 1011. - responsibility for implementation of compliance to options for rigid plastic containers - without major plastic recycling market development effort in Oregon, the recycling rate for plastics will not improve - we support the \$2 million fee options as the minimum to achieve recycling goals - DEQ recommends Economic Development Department gets involved with plastics and other recyclable market development

- O90 RIP GAGE, Chair, Gage Industries Board of Directors, offers testimony opposing SB 1011. recycling markets development council does not support proposed legislation as chair of Plastics Division of Plastics Recycling Markets Development Council representing Dow, USI Plastics and Union Carbide I am charged to assist in the implementation of SB 66 (1991 Legislative Session) in our 10 meetings we never agreed to support a bureaucracy costing \$2 million dollars -1 amendments seems to us like a betrayal of a year long process proposed amendment is extremely punitive to plastics industries in Oregon and does nothing to accelerate recycling in Oregon
- 163 CHAIR CEASE: Why is plastic recycling lower than it was 2 years ago? 171R GAGE: I didn't know that was true. I can't answer that question. "The amended SB 1011 is so onerous it will practically destroy the destroy plastics industry in the state of Oregon. It makes us totally non-competitive".

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JEFF GAGE, President and CEO, Gage Industries, offers testimony opposing SB 1011. - presents sample of product manufactured by Gage Industries (plastic plant pots) - overviews company's progress and consumption of virgin plastic over last decade - no industry has done its' share with regard to plastics recycling, it is individual companies who decide to deal with recycling or not 276 SEN COHEN: What about the other industry in the state? If all the other companies would do what you did we would be close to the 25 percent goal. 289 J GAGE: The problem is in the diversity of materials. - all plastic cannot be recycled - figures from METRO are dramatically inflated - problems with virgin resin markets which are very depressed - PET is running at about \$.40 per pound in this country 374 SEN COHEN: When we talk about resin companies who are those companies? 392 J GAGE: - continues testimony on SB 1011.

O05 CHAIR CEASE: Will Gage Industries will meet the 25 percent recycling rate in Oregon 1995? 014 R GAGE: I am saying that industry will very possibly meet that rate in 199 5. 087 ROB GUITRIDGE, Associated Oregon Recyclers, offers testimony on SB 1011 - we are not in favor of extensions for plastics industry 114 JACK BROWN, James River Corporation, offers testimony on SB 1011. - this legislation is highly discriminatory - we work very hard on research and development of recycling options - intention is self funding diversion of paper and solid waste from landfills - it is not fair to impose business tax 156 GEOFFREY LEVEAR, Levear International Plastics, Peuget

Incorporated, Chair, Plastics Education Consortium, offers testimony in opposition to SB 1011. - we have worked hard to get out of state industries into Oregon - confrontation with .75 percent tax would cause us to loose business - plastics industry needs more time to accomplish these goals
