392 Sen. Cohen: Were we in accord when we had the discussion as to

whether the Commission would adopt such guidelines themselves. Did we actually

talk in terms of their adopting them and enforcing them?

005 Paige Sipes-Metzler, Executive Director, Health Services Commission: Responds.

031 Sen. Cohen: Do you need "and adopted"?

033 Sipes-Metzler: Responds.

035 Chair Shoemaker: If you write them in the guidelines you need to adopt them don't you?

039 Sipes-Metzler: Responds.

044 Chair Shoemaker: This tightens up the line items within the list?

047 Sipes-Metzler: Responds.

054 Coombs: The question was asked as to what about the other insurance recommendations that were in SB 757. For the record a lot of those

would be transferred into SB 766 for study and review and recommendation by the Commission.

060 Chair Shoemaker: SB 757 is a broad bill that covers many of the recommendations to the Health Resources Commission. As the bill is some of them are a bit general to adopt at this time. My thought is,

assuming we establish an interim Commission to develop a delivery system for health care in the State, these recommendations would be part of

that Commission's work.

072 Sen. Cohen: The bill would not move forward, including the civil penalty for failure to maintain basic health care coverage, right?

073 Chair Shoemaker: Right.

075 Sen. Cohen: Is anything left in the bill other than the SB 757 -1 amendments?

076 Chair Shoemaker: I think the SB 757-1 amendments are within the bill, right?

079 Coombs: Concurs.

096 MOTION: CHAIR SHOEMAKER MOVED TO CONCEPTUALLY AMEND THE SB 757 -1 AMENDMENTS, EXHIBIT C, BY REPLACING "MEDICAL" WITH "CLINICAL" ON LNS. 6-10, REPLACING "THEM" WITH "THOSE SELECTED" ON LN. 8 AND A ","

SURROUNDING "WITH OR WITHOUT MODIFICATION" ON LN. 8.

102 VOTE: MOTION ADOPTED BY CONSENSUS.

104 MOTION: CHAIR SHOEMAKER MOVED THAT THE CONCEPTUALLY AMENDED SB 757 -1 AMENDMENTS BE ADOPTED.

107 Sen. Cohen: Do we have a date?

119 Coombs: Is the question when will it affect policies to the general public other than just the prioritized list?

120 Sen. Cohen: Responds.

127 Chair Shoemaker: The Services Commission will work during the interim to revise and update the list and that comes back to the Legislature in 1995.

125 Sipes-Metzler: July of 1994.

127 Chair Shoemaker: Okay and the Legislature in 1995 would consider a new line on the list, change the funding formula, etc. The following

biennium it would continue.

132 Sipes-Metzler: Guidelines need to be reviewed every two years. There is not an indication that every item needs a guideline. I would see a

very slow process.

140 Sen. Cohen: I prefer to not have it automatically in force.

149 Chair Shoemaker: What would you suggest?

151 Sen. Cohen: Suggests a certain point in time by which the Commission can make proposals.

156 Chair Shoemaker: Ponders how it would work. If it were separated I don't know how they would deal with it.

167 Sen. Cohen: They would come in 1995 and articulate those guidelines as part of the list description or the updates that they have recommended.

168 Chair Shoemaker: Describes a hypothetical of three line items and two lists; one without guidelines and one with guidelines, as a

demonstration of the differences. The Legislature would have those alternatives before it and could go with or without them. Does that make sense?

173 Sen. Cohen: I envision a bill similar to SB 801.

179 Chair Shoemaker: My problem with that is they are working with these during the interim as they relate to the present list.

184 Sen. Cohen: I just don't want Oregon Medial Assistance

Program to demand, as a condition of a Health Maintenance Organization that comes

in and signs up to serve certain populations, that in order to get that contract they have to change their contract terms prior to 1995 or in

the interim.

190 Chair Shoemaker: If the Legislature is presented with two different lists in 1995 wouldn't that give the Legislature the final say on that?

192 Sen. Cohen: In the meantime you disarrange some important contracts.

195 Coombs: Isn't there a contractual element that this would supersede?

196 Sipes-Metzler: Contracts that are let, as a result of the funding level of our 1993 report would not be impacted at all by medical guidelines

until we came back in 1995.

205 Sen. Cohen: That is what I am trying to get to. I want it listed here explicitly. The Chair talked about making it operational in the interim and that is not what I want to happen.

207 Chair Shoemaker: Clarifies his comment.

220 Sen. Cohen: That is why I don't think we ought to get into the technical side of one or two lists. I want to make sure the guidelines

don't go into effect until 1995.

221 Chair Shoemaker: Should the legislature have a chance to sign off?

224 Sen. Cohen: They will.

234 Coombs: Would it serve your purpose if in 1 (3) beginning on ln. 19 "the recommendation shall . . . "?

251 Sen. Cohen: We don't have that bill anymore.

256 Coombs: It is the same language.

257 Sen. Cohen: Where does the proposed amendment relate?

258 Coombs: What if on ln. 3 of the amendment it would read "shall include guidelines reviewed and recommended by the Commission . . " The

Commission wouldn't adopt anything; the guidelines would just be part and parcel of the recommendation.

264 Sen. Cohen: That is clear to me and acceptable.

270 Coombs: Then ln. 3 of the proposed amendment "adopted" would be deleted and "recommended" be substituted.

273 MOTION: SEN. COHEN MOVED THAT THE SB 757-1 AMENEMENT BE FURTHER AMENDED ON LINE 3 BY SUBSTITUTING "RECOMMENDED" FOR "ADOPTED".

273 Sen. Cohen: Gives an explanation of the motion.

275 Chair Shoemaker: Responds.

277 Sen. Hamby: I'm comfortable with that, but my concern is with a case being made pro and con for every single practice guideline.

284 Sen. Cohen: Concurs. I'm with Sen. Hamby on what the outcome ought to be and I don't want each guideline argued over.

294 Chair Shoemaker: In the 757-1 amendment, as originally proposed, that sentence would read "the recommendation shall include practice

guidelines reviewed and adopted by the Commission". It is still a

recommendation of the list to the Legislature.

305 Sen. Cohen: I have no problem with guidelines being adopted for their own purposes as long as they don't go into effect until they are

recommended and approved. Do we need to add "approved"?

309 Chair Shoemaker: I think it is complete.

318 Coombs: So do we go back with adopted?

335 General concurrence.
