SB 687: Deletes penalty that may be assessed against parent of child who steals merchandise.

016 CHAIR SPRINGER: The bill has been removed from consideration at the request of the sponsor.

SB 414: Allows judgment creditor to obtain order requiring judgment debtor to appear in any circuit or district court for county in which copy of judgment or lien record abstract has been recorded.

STEVE AZORR, CITIZEN

- 027 SEN. SHOEMAKER: Bill adds blood test to statute and amends every section of code concerning breath test. Why limitation to breath test?
- 038 GLAZER: Not technician on the bill, don't believe it is intended to read the way you describe.
- 043 CHAIR SPRINGER: May be to distinguish between administrative

consequences and license suspension and other criminal sanctions.

- 046 SEN. SHOEMAKER: Possibly, but we need to review it.
- 048 SEN. HAMBY: Requests witnesses speak to Emmanual Hospital Study.
- 051 BONNONO: Aware of the study.
- 052 SEN. HAMBY: Not part of study?

BONNONO: No.

053 SEN. HAMBY: Unaware of further medical recommendation for former felony

offenders who continued to have alcohol problems?

BONNONO: No.

- ${\tt O58}$  CHAIR SPRINGER: Notes presence of Doctor Long from Emmanuel Hospital.
- 065 DR. WILLIAM LONG: Testifies in support of the bill.
- 129 SEN. HAMBY: Any medical follow-up on treatment for addiction?

LONG: 30% that are convicted felons are offered counseling and therapy.

20% of convicted felons responded. >Those without felony record were more willing.

143 SEN. HAMBY: Are EMT's capable of drawing blood?

LONG: Yes.

151 MIKE MCCRACKEN: Submits  $% \left( 1,0\right) =0$  and reviews written testimony with concerns

about the bill (EXHIBIT H & I).

- 175 RICK GRAZER: Testifies in opposition to the bill.
- 207 SEN. SHOEMAKER: How does language of the bill impact voluntary  $\ensuremath{\text{SHOEMAKER}}$ :

situation?

GRAZER: Most patients are still aware, coherent. >May administer blood test for several medical reasons. If reporting is possible then doctors would have to tell patient.

228 SEN. SHOEMAKER: Statute doesn't require notification? >Doctor could work out reporting with patient?

GRAZER: Possibly but could raise liability for not reporting.

234 SEN. SHOEMAKER: If by providing that there would be no liability for not reporting as well.

GRAZER: True.

238 SEN. SHOEMAKER: Would that solve problem?

GRAZER: No.

247 SEN. HAMBY: How does Connecticut law work?

GRAZER: Not Connecticut, but Illinois law. Analogous to Connecticut

>Describes law and impact which allows blood alcohol to be admissible.

Problems have led to efforts to repeal that law. >Can't comment on Connecticut law specifically.

- 280 SEN. HAMBY: Testified earlier about need for drawing blood in many of these situations for medical purposes.
- 299 ROD MONROE: Testifies in support of the bill.
- FRED LENSZER: Testifies in support of the bill.
  >Responds to Sen. Shoemaker's earlier question regarding breath test.

- O29 SEN. SHOEMAKER: Troubled by informed consent issue.

  >Describes alternative process which would remove doctors from process
  and inquires if it would that be acceptable?
- 046 LENSZER: The objective is to get blood test into court, however that is accomplished is acceptable.
- O50 SEN. SHOEMAKER: Laboratory technician would be as good a witness?

  LENSZER: Yes. Officer in this situation would only serve as conveyor of the blood.
- 054 CHAIR SPRINGER: Do you see any parallel with mandatory reporting of felony matters, child abuse, etc.

LENSZER: Yes on child abuse issues. Not so much so on felony issues which require warrants. >Proposal is not a major deviation from law.

- 067 MONROE: Refers to mandatory reporting for AIDS and STD's.
- 075 ROSS SHEPARD: Testifies in opposition to the bill. >Bill is permissive in nature.
- 116 JULIA GIES: Submits and reviews written testimony generally in support of the bill (EXHIBIT J).

story about accident with drunk driver.
