072 SEN BRENNEMAN: Language on line 15, 16 speaking to regulatory expenses, seems open ended. On lines 19 and 20 it seems that a facility might have a person monitoring full time and have to pay the full price for that person without their consent.

085 HANSEN: We could give annual permits, or a larger permit fee. This does not change current waiver approaching dealing with sources, but to clarify an issue raised in litigation.

102 SEN BRENNEMAN: Why do suppose local governments view this with such alarm?

104 HANSEN: They are reading into it more than we have. This clarifies what is already existing in statute.

110 SEN BRENNEMAN: Dairy farmers are concerned with fees from non-point source violations.

122 HANSEN: If we don't do this the EPA will. Point source and non-point source activity are being looked at. In relation to their contribution to the problem ought to pay accordingly. Within our budgets, E board has needed a clear picture of fees before authorization.
