080 DIXON: There are 12 centers who are members of the association at the present time. There are other centers that are trying to develop.

085 DIXON: Being registered with the state means there are a set of standards which the programs must comply with to be classified as an adult day care program.

098 SEN. TROW: What would happen if they registered, but did not comply with the standards? What are the standards, and how difficult are they to meet?

099 DIXON: The standards are consistent with the national association standards. They include: Requirements for a certain number of activities during the day; a certain amount of oversight on the passing of medications; and a certain amount of personal care.

106 SEN. TROW: Would the Senior Services Division have to establish rules that are consistent with the standards of the Association of Oregon Day Care Services? Does your organization already hold the 12 day care centers to those standards?

112 DIXON: We are now in the process of self reviewing the program. We do a paper review, not site inspections.

118 SEN. TROW: How will this proposed review be done? How many people will need to do the review? How many inspections?

122 DIXON: The workload depends upon how many people are asking for registration. At this time there are 12 and possibly 13 pending. We are anticipating 5 additional centers developing during the next biennium.

155 SEN. FRANK ROBERTS, DISTRICT 9: Speaks in favor of bills. This would be an excellent addition to the services available to senior citizens who are less than capable of taking care of themselves. SB 624 defines the term adult day care and gives a comprehensive picture of a community based group program.

251 SEN. KENNEMER: This would not be an entitlement? It would be available on the basis of the funding available?

254 SEN. ROBERTS: It might be an alternative to some other programs that are entitlements.
