A hugh expansion plan was announced today by Phil Wick, President of the Les Schwab Warehouse Center and of the 200 Les Schwab Tire Centers. "We are going to add 246,000 square feet to our warehousing in Prineville," Wick said. The new warehouses will cover five acres of new warehouse space.

"We have been working on these plans for the past two years," Wick reported. "We have considered building in Wilsonville, Portland, Vancouver, Longview, or Kent. We could save a lot of money with our trucking expenses, if we centered or built these additional warehouses in the Portland area. However, we decided on Prineville, as we want to, as long as possible, keep our main distribution and retreading center in one place. Besides, we think Prineville is a great place to live and raise our families." The Les Schwab companies have 360 employees in Prineville and 2,700 employees in total.

Wick said, "We have bought 20 acres across Crooked River. We are planning to bridge Crooked River. We plan to build one large warehouse of 210,000 square feet across the river. Construction will start just as fast as we can get our permits and as we can put every thing together. We plan to have a completion date of July 1, 1989, as our target date. We are very pleased that our final decision was to build this in Prineville."

Warehousing is needed for the planned growth for the future. Les Schwab is planning ten new stores for 1989, with three additional stores to be added to the California stores. Lots were recently purchased in Redding, Anderson, and Red Bluff. These stores will be built in 1989 Wick said. Further expansion is planned down to and including the Sacramento area.

Your recent letter asking about crime and livability in Oregon expressed a concern which is certainly at the top of my list as well as that of most other Oregonians.

Oregon, along with many other states, has had a growing crime rate during the past several years, particularly in property crimes and drug-related offenses. I must also point out that while our state's crime rate appears to be somewhat high when compared to other states, Oregonians are far more likely to report criminal offenses to law enforcement officials than citizens of other states.

We are now aggressively addressing our crime problems on several fronts:

- Adoption of legislation allowing confiscation of criminals' assets, expanding the ability of law enforcement officials to gather evidence in drug cases, and attacking juvenile crime.
- Developing a statewide "Children's Agenda" which promotes grass roots commitment by schools, parents, service providers and others to ensure that Oregon's children are educated and nurtured with the idea that crime is unacceptable in our communities.
- Construction of 2,500 new prison beds between 1987 and 1991.
- Development of a statewide program to identify and prosecute repeat offenders, based upon an award-winning program in Lane County, Oregon.
- Adoption of determinate sentencing guidelines based primarily upon the offenders' criminal history.
- Consolidation of responsibility for coordination of crime prevention efforts, information systems, and other criminal justice services in a new Criminal Justice Services Division.

> Acquisition of new automated fingerprint identification technology and modernization of other statewide criminal justice information programs.

As a result of these actions, we anticipate a significant reduction in the incidents of crime in our state.

A member of my staff recently read your letter to a conference of two hundred representatives from local, state and federal criminal justice agencies throughout Oregon. The most common response from members of this group was "...yes, we do have crime problems, but we also believe we have the most livable state. Please ask her to come and see for herself."

I would like to invite you and your family to come and visit us before making your decision. I am confident that wherever you go--to the beautiful Oregon Coast, to the exciting and growing Portland Metropolitan area, the forested mountains, the eastern desert or the rich Willamette Valley--you will not be disappointed and will be welcomed by all Oregonians.

I am writing to support the application of Floyd McKay for a position in journalism education, and to commend him to you.

Floyd joined my staff in December of 1986, shortly after I was elected governor, and was instrumental in putting together my staff, and preparing my first legislative package. He was one of two top aides reporting directly to me until his departure in December, 1988.

When I asked Floyd to leave one of Oregon's top news positions to enter my administration, I had already known him and his work for many years. He was Portland's premier television journalist and commentator during the time I served on the Portland city council and as mayor, from 1970 to 1979.

Floyd's reputation during that time was as a journalist who had the ability to look ahead and see emerging issues, and to analyze the work of public agencies in a way that was understandable to a large television audience. He had credibility both in the media and with Oregonians that is seldom rivalled. I sought his judgment and his ability to communicate with all types of people.


