#### Why are Sentencing Guidelines needed?

Prior to 1977, Oregon had an indeterminate sentencing system in which judges imposed a sentence but the Parole Board had complete discretion to release an offender at any time within the sentence imposed. In 1977, as a result of a 1975 Governor's Task Force on Corrections, the Oregon Legislature adopted sweeping criminal justice changes.

One of these changes was the creation of the Parole Board release matrix to provide uniform terms of confinement for offenders, based on severity of offense and history of criminal activity. Control of the length of prison terms for offenders remained in the hands of the Parole Board, but release decisions were more consistent. Following the creation of the matrix, prison terms for offenders convicted of serious crimes against persons increased nearly 53% over the next six years.

Since 1977, judges have continued to control the decision to sentence offenders to state institutions. The Parole Board and the use of early release have become the system's release valves to alleviate the increased number of inmates.

During 1977, Oregon's prisons averaged a daily population of 2,926 inmates. When the population reached 3,196 in 1982, U.S. District Court Judge James Burns termed the crowded conditions "lunacy". Early in 1988, institutional capacity was exceeding 4,400 and prisoners were routinely released seven months early to relieve crowding.

The Department of Corrections and the Parole Board have pried every correctional management tool possible, from adjustments in the matrix to increases in early release, to manage offenders sent to state institu-

tions. To accommodate even short lengths of prison stay for lesser offenders in our present crowded prison situation, more serious offenders must have their terms shortened. Until control is imposed at the "front end" of the sentencing system, standards for how offenders are to be dealt with cannot be set. Decisions about incarceration and release will continue to be made on a crisis basis.

Sentencing guidelines similar to those successfully operated in Minnesota and Washington offer Oregonians the best opportunity for effective control of correctional resources.

#### Legislative Purpose

In enacting law calling for development of the guidelines, the Oregon Legislature made the following formal findings:

- Within the present criminal justice system it is impossible to insure that the sentencing decisions of judges will result in reasonably uniform and proportional use of state and local correctional resources, and
- Decisions as to imprisonment and term of imprisonment must be made on a systematic basis that will
  maintain institutional populations within a level
  that the Legislative Assembly and the people are
  prepared to provide.

The Legislature declared the primary function of sentencing in Oregon to be:

- Appropriate punishment for each criminal offender, and
- Insuring security of the public in person and property.

In addition, the Legislature stated its intention to allow judges necessary discretion for appropriate sentencing in individual cases.

#### **Legislative Assignment**

The 1987 Oregon Legislature assigned the task of creating sentencing guidelines for commitment of felons to state institutions to the Oregon Criminal Justice Council. The Council was directed to design guidelines which control:

- commitment to state and local correctional facilities;
- · terms of confinement:
- · imposition and duration of parole and probation;
- standards for probation revocation.

Sentencing guidelines submitted to the 1989 Oregon Legislature will become law unless the Legislature acts to amend or repeal them. These guidelines become effective September 1, 1989 and apply to all offenses committed after that date.

#### Goals for the Guidelines

Based on Legislative directive, the sentencing guidelines are designed to accomplish the following goals:

- Assure that defendants with similar criminal histories convicted of similar offenses receive substantially similar penalties.
- Impose harsher sentences for serious personal and property offenders with lengthy criminal records.
- Reduce uneven use by counties of state incarceration space, so that counties are able to commit

**Sentencing Guidelines** 

As you know, the Criminal Justice Council is making great progress in its work on sentencing guidelines. The issues they will resolve include the length of sentence that should be imposed for each type of crime; which offenders should be sent to prison, which to county jail, and which should not be incarcerated at all; whether offenders should receive time off their sentences for good behavior, or for participation in a job or education program; how parole should work and whether the Parole Board should be retained; when probation or parole should be revoked; how the guidelines mechanism should be adjusted to keep pace with capacity; and whether additional prison capacity is needed.

These are issues that will have a very direct impact on the operations of Corrections in the future, and they will obviously draw a lot of attention from the legislature and the public. This being the case, you may well want a briefing on the Council's proposals before they become final. I suggest a small group (probably Hardy Meyers, Jack Beatty, Kathleen Bogan and one or two others) some time in the first part of August. Let me know if you're interested, and I'll set it up with Joan.

Naito and Scherzer, through their continued support, both financially and in shared professional expertise, have helped



In this meeting you might:

- Indicate an understanding that faculties across the country were one of the losers in the period of Great Inflation, losing real income, which has not been made up, and could not be made up in recession-bound Oregon (in spite of two legislative sessions):
- Note that successful recruiting and retention efforts over time will require improved compensation (a practical complement to the claims of equity);
- Observe that cries of "more pay for faculty" alone are not compelling to either the general public or to legislators: average income in Oregon, decline in blue collar jobs (forest products going like gangbusters with 17,000 fewer workers), "downsizing," give-backs, demands for greater productivity, "two economies" of Oregon, towns decimated, legislators' belief that higher ed "has had its turn";
- Make clear that the context requires some greater vision, some better case for higher ed be made than a cry for salaries in order to win public and legislative support;
- Outline the constraints imposed by revenue forecasts, budget and spending cap, noting desirability of dealing with corrections separately;
- Indicate that faculties' interest in helping to solve the other problems would be helpful and might open the door wider to the possibility of addressing faculties' concerns.

Roger will be present for this meeting. I will be meeting with OSU faculty and administrators in Newport.



Joe Willis and Rupert Bullivant (a life member) are serving as Commissioners from the State of Oregon, and participate in the affairs of the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws (NCCUSL). Your Commissioners would like to bring the Annual Meeting of the National Conference to Oregon Towards that end, we request that the Governor of Oregon invite the Bresident of the National Conference of Commissioners on Uniform State Laws towards the Oregon Commissioners at a mutually convenient time investigate.

We have done some advance work on this, and it is clear that the President of the National Conference (Mr. Michael Sullivan from Minneapolis, Minnesota) would attend the meeting. #### THE NATIONAL CONFERENCE OF COMMISSIONERS ON UNIFORM STATE LAWS

#### **PURPOSE**

It is the purpose of the National Conference of Commissioners Uniform State Laws to promote uniformity in state law on all subjudiere uniformity is desirable and practicable. To accomplish this, Commissioners participate in drafting acts on various subjects endeavor to secure consideration of the approved acts in the varistates.

#### **ORGANIZATION**

The National Conference is composed of Commissioners on Unifc State Laws from each state, the District of Columbia and Puerto Ri usually four in number. In addition, the principal officer of the st agency, such as the legislative reference bureau, charged with resp sibility of drafting legislation for the state is an associate member of Conference.

The governors of the states have appointed lawyers, judg legislators, and law school professors as Commissioners. While the us term is three years, it is common practice for governors to reappoi without regard to their political affiliation, Commissioners who has actively participated in the work of the Conference. If a Commission has served by official appointment for twenty or more years, he makes become a life member. All Commissioners are members of the Bar.

The organizational plan of the Conference makes its non-partis nature self-evident. While the state Commissioners are obligated endeavor to procure consideration of uniform acts, they represent special interest.

A small staff is maintained at the Conference headquarters in Chica to serve the organization's administrative needs.

#### **HISTORY**

The Conference, one of the oldest of state organizations designed encourage interstate cooperation, was organized in 1892 to prome uniformity by voluntary action of each state government. Since organization, the Conference has drafted over two hundred unifor

laws on numerous subjects and in various fields of law, many of which have been widely enacted.

With the development of rapid transportation and communication, the states have become increasingly interdependent socially and economically so that a single transaction may cross many state lines and involve citizens in many states. A confusion of laws among the several states may present, in some fields, a deterrent to the free flow of goods, credit, services, and persons between the states; restrain full economic and social development; and generate pressures for federal intervention to compel uniformity. The Conference seeks to alleviate these problems.

The Conference occasionally drafts model acts on subjects which do not directly affect relationships among the states, but which involve problems common to many if not all of the states. On other occasions, it drafts model legislation on subjects where state legislation could help implement international treaties of the United States or where world uniformity would be desirable.

#### FINANCIAL SUPPORT

The Conference is considered a state organization. The major portion of its financial support comes from state appropriations. The expenses are apportioned among the states based upon their population and financial abilities. Individual Commissioners receive no salary or compensation and in many cases they pay their own expenses to attend the annual conference.

The American Bar Association also makes a yearly contribution to the conduct of Conference business. Where a proposed uniform act requires extensive research, expert draftsmen working on a sustained basis, and numerous meetings of advisors, the Conference has sought financial help from foundations and other public spirited persons and groups. Because the Conference, composed of Commissioners designated by the states, prepares uniform acts for states and is supported by states, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized it as qualified to receive tax deductible contributions under the federal law as contributions to state government or organizations of state government for public purposes.

#### **PROCEDURES**

The Conference meets annually to consider drafts of proposed uniform legislation. Proposals that uniform acts be drafted, received from many sources, are referred to a Committee on Scope and Program which makes an investigation, sometimes hears interested parties, and reports

to the Conference whether the subject is one on which it is desirable and feasible to draft a uniform law.

If the Conference decides to accept a subject, a special committee of state Commissioners is appointed to prepare a draft of an act. Tentative drafts are not submitted to the Conference until they have received extensive committee consideration.

A draft act must be discussed and considered section by section by the entire Conference at no fewer than two annual meetings before the Conference may decide by a vote of states whether to promulgate the draft as a uniform act. Each state is entitled to one vote, and an act is not promulgated unless a majority of the states represented at an annual meeting and at least twenty jurisdictions have approved the draft.

In addition, each uniform act may be submitted for consideration to the American Bar Association. The drafting committees of the Conference establish liaison with the American Bar Association and other interested groups throughout the drafting process.

#### **PUBLICATIONS**

The text of each approved uniform and model act, with notes and comments, is published in pamphlet form by the Conference.
