AND FOR THE LIVES OF PEOPLE EVERYWHERE.

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IN THE PAST, THE CHURCH PROVIDED THE SUPPORTIVE COMMUNITY THAT EVERYBODY NEEDS — FOR MARRIAGE, BIRTHS, SICKNESS, DEATH, AND COMPANIONSHIP. TO FORGIVE EACH OTHER'S FRAILTIES, TO CELEBRATE THE HAPPY TIMES, AND WHEN THE SAD TIMES COME, TO WEEP TOGETHER AND COMFORT EACH OTHER. IN OTHER WORDS TO BE A FAMILY.

SOCIETY NEEDS THAT SENSE OF FAMILY NOW MORE THAN EVER. TOO MANY CHILDREN ARE DENIED THE VALUES LEARNED IN OUR CHURCHES AND SYNAGOGUES; FOR THEM, THE DREAM OF FAMILY IS JUST THAT -- A DREAM, NOT A REALITY.

WHEN I TALK ABOUT THE CHILDREN'S AGENDA, SOME

LEAP TO THE CONCLUSION THAT I'VE DREAMED UP SOME

CLEVER PLAN BY WHICH GOVERNMENT ALONE WILL SAVE OUR

CHILDREN. THAT DREAM COULD NEVER BE REALITY.

YOUR CHILDREN'S SERVICES DIVISION HAS HUNDREDS

OF CHILDREN WAITING FOR ADOPTION. AND THOUSANDS MORE

IN FOSTER HOMES. AND THESE NUMBERS ARE GOING UP, NOT

DOWN.

WE ARE SEEING A NEW HORROR -- DRUG-EXPOSED

BABIES, POISONED BEFORE BIRTH, BORN TO MOTHERS

INCAPABLE OF CARING FOR THEM. FACING A CHILDHOOD OF

PHYSICAL AND PERSONALITY PROBLEMS THAT COULD MAKE IT

IMPOSSIBLE FOR THEM TO LEARN AND ACHIEVE.

IT'S EASY TO LISTEN TO THESE HORROR STORIES AND AGREE THAT SOCIETY SHOULD DO MORE FOR CHILDREN. IT IS HARD TO STEP FORWARD AND SAY "THIS CHILD IS MINE. I WILL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR THIS CHILD."

IN THE END, THESE ARE NOT SOMEONE ELSE'S CHILDREN WE SPEAK OF -- THEY ARE OURS.

GOVERNMENT CANNOT PROVIDE WHAT EVERY CHILD NEEDS AND DESERVES: LOVE, AFFECTION, A HOME, A FAMILY.

(EXAMPLE: ONE CHURCH, ONE CHILD)

REFUSE TO SAY, "LET SOMEBODY ELSE TAKE CARE OF IT."

TO EXPECT GOD TO DO EVERYTHING WHILE WE DO AND WORK.

NOTHING IS NOT FAITH, IT IS MANY.

IT'S LIKE THE MAN WHO PRAYED EVERY NIGHT FOR

DIVINE INTERVENTION TO HELP HIM WIN THE LOTTERY.

NIGHT AFTER NIGHT HE SENT HIS PLEAS ON HIGH WITHOUT

RESULTS. FINALLY, IN DESPERATION, HE CRIED TO THE

HEAVENS, "LORD, PLEASE LET ME WIN THE LOTTERY. GIVE

ME A BREAK!"

THEN, THROUGH A ROLL OF THUNDER AND FLASHES OF LIGHTNING, CAME A BOOMING VOICE FROM ABOVE, "YOU GIVE ME A BREAK! BUY A TICKET!"

I THINK PEOPLE ARE TIRED OF BEING TAKEN FOR GRANTED; TIRED OF BEING ASKED TO DO TOO LITTLE -- TO CARE TOO LITTLE.

KENNEDY'S INAUGURAL ADDRESS, WE WOULD DO WELL TO
REMEMBER THE CLOSING WORDS: "...LET US GO FORTH TO

HELP, BUT KNOWING THAT HERE ON EARTH GOD'S WORK MUST
TRULY BE OUR OWN."

#### Governor Neil Goldschmidt, Prepared Remarks Summit on Exceptional People Rippling River, October 22, 1990

When I first heard that this would be a Summit on Exceptional People, I was reminded of H.L. Mencken's opinion of Oregonians: "Oregon is seldom heard of," he wrote. "It's people believe in the Bible, and hold that all radicals should be lynched. It has no poets and no statesmen."

This is the <u>SECOND</u> summit on exceptional people I've been to in the last week. The first was called Children's Day at the capitol. As you plan the future of Oregon, keep in mind these suggestions from our younger citizens about what should be a law:

- o Flies should be eliminated
- o All crosswalks should glow in the dark
- o Cars should not be allowed to park in front of basketball hoops
- o Nobody should talk about sports on Wednesdays
- o If you survive a plane crash, the airline should refund the price of your ticket

I'm very glad to be here with you on the week before Halloween. You know, Halloween is one of two late Autumn evenings on which people who have had their doorbells constantly rung by weird-looking creatures settle down to watch something scary on T.V.

The other is election night.

Actually, I'm going to miss politics. It was Will Rogers who said that once a man holds public office he is absolutely no good for honest work.

I have found that governors are sometimes treated like the body at an old-fashioned Irish wake. It's necessary to have you in order to have the party, but you are not expected to say a great deal.

But I do treasure this fan letter from a satisfied constituent: "When you visited Pendleton, there were a lot of sixth graders crowding around you. You elbowed me in the forehead. It was one of the most exciting events of my life."

If I wanted to make this country poorer and weaker, here's what I would do:

First, I would have children show up in school incapable of learning.

Second, I would make sure they got off to such a rotten start in life that turning to drugs and crime was almost inevitable.

Third, I would let the children know that the political leaders of this country don't give a damn about their future.

Which brings me to George Bush and the federal government. The White House is now insisting that money to expand Head Start be taken OUT of the federal budget. Head Start -- the most effective anti-drug, anti-crime, pro-education strategy I know of.

This is nothing less than a total abdication of responsibility for the future.

It's a message from hypocrites and free lunch hucksters who promise we can get what we want without paying for it. Who would choose to protect themselves at the expense of our children.

Ladies and gentlemen, the message the White House is sending to Oregon is loud and clear: you are on your own.

And the message they are sending our posterity? Dear Grandchildren: We leave you a country that is poorer and weaker than we found it; but what the hell, it was fun while it lasted, and now you get to pay for it.

If that message from Washington, D.C., doesn't infuse this conference with a sense of urgency, a sense of your own significance, then nothing else I can say will matter.

This is your moment in history.

This summit is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to define what it means to be exceptional people. It is your chance to take the future in your hands and shape it like an artist molding clay.

#### First, let's talk a moment about the global picture

National security is no longer defined by missles, but by markets. Gorbachev finally figured it out because the Japanese economy proved it to him.

At the same time, European nations are bringing down national trade barriers in order to raise competitiveness.

Economic security in the modern world consists of surplus capital for investment, a healthy environment, advanced communication and transportation systems, and people smart enough to INVEST that capital and USE those systems wisely and efficiently.

Meanwhile, thirteen percent of the U.S. workforce is functionally illiterate

Woefully unprepared to participate in the global economy

### Where does Oregon fit in?

Oregon will compete NOT by getting poorer but by getting smarter.

Oregonians have always thought that the PLACE of Oregon means the most. Stewards of the environment -- we cleaned up our rivers and protected our beaches.

But to compete in the global economy, we must also recognize the human face in the landscape. We must distinguish ourselves as a special people.

If we really want to cut ourselves apart from the pack, we have to improve the quality of our workforce.

The place with the best people wins: literate, motivated, globally aware, independent citizens.

#### Obstacles to success:

That great political philosopher, Woody Allen, once wrote: "Mankind faces a crossroads. One path leads to despair and utter hopelessness, the other to total extinction. Let us pray we have the wisdom to choose correctly."

Oregon has some choices to make:

Most governors would give anything to have Oregon's educational system. But we're not competing with other governors and other states -- we're competing with the world

If we had stable school finance tomorrow; limited property taxes permanently; replaced the property tax revenue that we gave up with some other source of revenue -- 90% of the kids still wouldn't graduate.

We have to get these children ready for school. It may come to year around schooling for some of these children who can't keep up.

We won't wait for George Bush. A fully-funded Head Start program will give thousands more children the skills they need to succeed in school

Oregon is on a roll right now. And the way you stay on a roll is to keep investing in ourselves.

Don't lose the momentum we have gained -- don't back up.

o If you live in the Portland region and you don't handle the air quality and congestion problems, eventually you will strangle the economy.

Light rail ballot measure is essential

o Throw ballot measures 5 and 11 in a barrel marked "Danger -- Toxic Waste."

They are poison to public education, public safety, public infrastruture.

They are poison to everything we are trying to accomplish at this conference.

#### Another obstacle to success: recession mentality, defeatism

The Oregon Comeback began with the simple notion that we are at our best when we raise our expectations of what can be achieved

We tackled head-on the enormous backlog of unmet needs in this state.

We have regained momentum. Our economy is stronger. We have rebuilt decaying facilities. Our families, communities, schools are meeting the challenges facing our young people with tremendous energy

We have earned the right to be optimistic; we have earned the right to lift our sights and look ahead to the future.

- o We see the future in our middle schools, with the first evidence of declining drug and alcohol use among students
- o We see the future in Lane County, where citizens opened a relief nursery that provides care for children while their mothers and fathers attend parenting classes. Reduces child abuse caseload
- We see the future in Harrisburg, where a principal and her staff have reduced the dropout rate to two percent by refusing to give up on kids in trouble.
- o We see the future in Portland, where a group of business, academic and government leaders joined in partnership to recruit Japan's prestigious Waseda University to Oregon. The group is building a bridge across the Pacific that will pay off for decades into the future.

By expecting more of ourselves than we did four years ago, we have raised our expectations for the future. We know we can do the tough things.

- o We will become the first state to actually have in place comprehensive goals for people, starting at birth.
- o But having goals is not enough. We must establish what needs to be done to reach those goals

We need to focus on these tough, critical issues over decades, not years. We need to have the guts to hold ourselves accountable to a vision for the future.

We need the guts to refuse to roll over in the face of a national recession

This is an investment issue. It is a spending limit issue.

Any future state budget that promises to keep the spending limit should begin with "Once upon a time" and end with "and they lived happily ever after."

If we don't take the resources that we have developed out of our own investments and put them where they are going to produce real change over the next 20 years, we can kiss our opportunity goodbye.

What we need in this state is NOT apathy and indifference.

What we need in this state is NOT fear of the future

What we need in Oregon is exactly what I see here today. A New Citizenship; one that takes pride in being the best educated people in the world; in having the healthiest children, and the cleanest environment.

That takes pride in bringing 100% of our citizens into full membership in the Oregon community.

Show the country and the world that fundamental American values -- education, hard work, inventiveness, and a sense of common purpose still exist

And by the next century, Oregon will be one of the few places blessed with a diversified economy, providing well-paying jobs amid a quality of life that nurtures and enriches us.

Remember the message from Washington: you are on your own.

If you don't believe in what you are doing -- if you don't fight for it nobody else will.

Try the different approach, the unexpected coalition, the unlikely partnership

Few people are granted the opportunity to shape the future; to change lives for the better.

Aim high. There is no reason to accept second best.

If children can't be nurtured and educated in Oregon, then where else will it get done?
