Of course there was the satisfaction of working with the Legislature. Reminds me of the time a minister sold a mule to a neighboring farmer. Before handing over the reins, the minister told the farmer that the mule had a gentle soul and should be treated with kindness.

Some days later the minister was passing the farmer's field and saw the farmer standing in front of the immobile mule. The farmer told the minister that the mule wouldn't work.

"Let me show you how to get him going," said the minister. He seized a nearby two-by-four and whacked the mule between the eyes, whereupon he raised up and began to pull the plow.

"I thought you said to treat him kindly," said the farmer.

"Yes," said the minister. "But first you have to get his attention."

Being Governor is a great job, but I have to admit I won't miss some of the burdens of the office. I take solace from the story of President Coolidge, who once had a group of guests on the presidential yacht cruising the Potomac. As he stood alone at the rail, looking out at the expanse of water, someone exclaimed, "Look at that slight and slender figure! Look at that head bowed over the rail! What thoughts are in the mind of this man, burdened by the problems of the nation?"

Finally, Coolidge turned around and said, "See that sea gull over there? Been watching it for twenty minutes. Hasn't moved. I think he's dead!"

The test for all of us is not just how we manage our way through these inevitable human frailties, but how we set our goals, how seriously we are committed to achieving them, and whether we are fundamentally capable of taking the difficult things and getting them done.

This must be our challenge, our purpose, our goal. If we really want to cut ourselves apart from the pack; if we seriously want to do something about our rate of personal income growth, we have to improve the quality of our workforce.

The place with the best people wins.

Quality of our education system

The school finance issue is going to be treated as the definitive issue in education. It's not. It IS an issue on the tough problems list that Oregon has to take care of.

- o But if we had stable school finance tomorrow; limited property taxes permanently; replaced the property tax revenue that we gave up with some other source of revenue -- 90% of the kids still wouldn't graduate.
- o It starts with getting these children ready for school. It may come to year around schooling for some of these children who can't keep up.
- o We must expect children to leave 5th grade better equipped to make it through middle school and then graduate; if we can't say that about a proposed program, we should eliminate it.
- o We must not allow children to fail; we must not give them that option.
- The test that WE are ultimately failing is not how we pay for schools, but how we pay for the kind of standard of living we know we are entitled to expect in a state that can only generate a higher personal income through literate, motivated, functional -- independent -- citizens.
- o The definition of who is in the workforce and who's out has changed totally.

Why at a time when we need skilled workers more than ever, are we allowing our governmental bodies to provide incentives for skilled workforce to retire early?

Women and minorities are expected to account for two-thirds of the increase in Oregon's workers.

If the workforce is going to be more female, more Black, more Hispanic, more Native American, then let's come to grips with the fact that we have created an educational machinery that was prepared to treat them as discards.

It makes a real difference to you -- it makes a real difference to the success of your business -- whether a child starts school behind and eventually drops out...

It makes a real difference to you if a child grows up and can't write or spell on their job applications, and ends up on welfare or in jail -- because you will pay for it.

So, at the top of the list for us must be the ability to compete, the will to compete, the ability of our citizens to be independent.

If we will deal with this issue, the top tough issue on the list, the rest will take care of themselves.

How to get it done -- what to look for in political leadership

o Stop looking to see if they have a "D" or an "R" after their names. Instead, ask yourselves these questions:

Who wants to put Oregon on the map in the world marketplace?

Who has the energy to build the pieces needed to compete globally -- in education, workforce, cutting edge research facilities?

Here's a story that illustrates the importance of investing: A wealthy man was going away for a month and asked a neighboring farmer how much he would charge to board his horse. The farmer said it would cost fifty dollars a month and he would keep the manure. The rich man thought that was a bit steep, so he went to the next farm. There he was told that the fee would be forty dollars a month and "we keep the manure." Noting a downward trend, the rich man drove another mile to an old ramshackle house. There he was told that his monthly fee would be five dollars. After agreeing to the terms, the wealthy man said that all the other farmers were demanding to keep the manure. "Why didn't you insist on such a stipulation?" he asked.

"Well, mister, at five dollars a month, there ain't going to be much manure."

You only get out what you put in.

Oregon has seen 200,000 new jobs created in the last five years. The way to STOP that is to stop investing in infrastructure. Even though the resources are there without a tax increase.

Personal income in Oregon grew at the 10th fastest rate in the U.S. during the first three months of this year. The way to STOP that is to have children show up in school incapable of learning.

The way to KEEP OREGON ON A ROLL is to roll up Ballot Measures 5 and 11 and throw them in a barrel marked "Danger -- Toxic Waste."

They are poison to public education, public safety, and public infrastructure...

They are poison to our state's economic future.

One way or another, I believe we will vote on these measures in November, and our votes will count.

We will say "no" to those who think we would choose to protect ourselves at the expense of our children. Our parents and grandparents never did -- a group much less affluent than we are today managed to build highways, parks, an education system. They took the future seriously and today we thank them for it.

My hopes for our state's future: that Oregon's perception of itself will have changed dramatically -- to raise expectations, to seize economic opportunities, to invest in ourselves.

I'm very glad to be here with you this morning.

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Back in February, I announced that I would not be seeking re-election as Oregon's governor. So, I'm looking for work. It was Will Rogers who said that once a man holds a public office he is absolutely no good for honest work.

Lately, I've been reminded of Mark Twain who, one day, was reading the obituary pages and found that an old politician had passed on. A few days later he was asked if he attended the funeral, to which he replied, "No, but I did send a message of approval."

It's a tradition that Oregon governors don't get any respect. After Tom McCall, governors were treated like the body at an old-fashioned Irish wake. It's necessary to have you in order to have the party, but you are not expected to say a great deal.

I did receive this fan letter, however: "When you visited Pendleton, there were a lot of sixth graders crowding around you. You elbowed me in the forehead. It was one of the most exciting events in my life."

Actually, it's been interesting as governor learning how many misconceptions those who live outside the Pacific Northwest have of our part of the country.

Nic Bingham, a California second grader, asked me to clear up some issues that had been troubling him:

- First: How did your state get a name like Oregon?
- Second: Why does the Chinook Salmon die after it lays its eggs?

And then there was Maria Bravo of San Francisco. She wrote to ask for a map of Oregon, my picture, and tour guides of the state. But most of all she wanted some of the kind of money we use in Oregon.

So I sent her a beaver pelt and some shiny beads.

Last month I returned from a two week vacation in Israel, which included both personal R & R and discussions with policymakers.

As I reflected on those discussions in preparation for being with you this morning several thoughts occurred to me.

With the end of the Cold War era; I believe our greatest struggle in the United States is just beginning -- a struggle not against some foreign enemy, but a struggle against our own failure to act on the profound problems that face this nation.

And our failure to act here at home threatens the very future of the nation of Israel.

Let me take a moment to explain what I mean.

The course of history's change not only provides each American with an opportunity to look at the world through different eyes, but above all, to look at ourselves with our eyes wide open.

Lesson number one for the United States: National security is no longer defined by missiles, but by markets.

Lesson number two: The weapons in this new arms race consist of surplus capital for investment, a healthy environment, advanced communication and transportation systems, and people smart enough to invest that capital and use those systems wisely and efficiently.

Lesson number three: The United States is losing this economics arms race.

It strikes me that in Israel there is no significant understanding of what is happening in the United States to sap our country of its economic power.

If I had wanted to make America poorer and weaker, here's what I would do:

First, I would do everything I could to turn the United States government from a lender to a borrower; because history shows that power shifts from the debtor to the creditor nations.

I would use the lack of federal revenue as an excuse to:

slash aid to education

gut the Environmental Protection Agency

allow the steel, bricks and mortar that support our economy to crumble from neglect

Second, if I wanted to make America poorer, I would allow confidence men and racketeers to raid the national treasury. This would accomplish two things at once: a siphoning off of precious resources, while feeding the public's growing cynicism toward government's ability to act.

Savings and Loan scandal

Third, if I wanted to weaken America, I would divide Americans, one from another; I would sound the retreat on civil rights and women's rights and set the stage for renewed bigotry and anti-semitism.

And fourth, if I really wanted to bring this country to its knees -- if I wanted to guarantee a second-rate America -- I would do this one thing above all else: I would ignore the cries for help from America's children.

- Almost one-third of all American mothers receive no prenatal care to detect conditions that lead to premature births, low birth weights and other problems.
- Nearly half the children in cities are not immunized against preventable diseases like polio, diptheria and tetanus.
- o Meanwhile, deficit reduction package will cut the budget for many child health programs in the country.
- Too many children are destined for failure before they even reach the schoolhouse door.

Why should you care? When the quality of our workforce is impaired, when talent is squandered and wasted, the economy suffers.

(I don't think we can blame Japanese trade policies for that.)

Diminishing economic power is the biggest single threat to our national security.

It is a matter of national security when only 75% of our children graduate from high school.

It is a matter of national security when corporate America has to spend \$210 billion to teach workers what they should have learned in school. That figure equals half the total expenditure of America's elementary, secondary and higher educational institutions.

It is estimated that by the year 2000 the U.S. could have as many as 20 million young working-age adults with poor prospects of holding any job.

How different would our cities be if twenty years ago mayors had run Head Start to the top of the national flagpole?

How different would our cities be if they graduated 90 percent -- from an internationally competitive school system?

Each year of delay in meeting our responsibility to invest in our children means another million dropouts whose skills are inferior to those against whom they have to compete -- the children of Osaka and Frankfurt.

When our economic interests were threatened outside this nation's borders in the Middle East, we responded.

A threat no less dangerous is facing us here at home, but we are failing to provide a comperable response.

Or as the Chinese say, "There is a lot of noise on the stairs, but no one enters the room."

The message we get from the federal government is this: no problem is big enough to be considered a knife at our jugular; not education, drugs infrastructure, medical care, housing.

No problem is worth the kind of investment we put into the G.I. Bill, the Marshall Plan, the race to the moon.

Inaction breeds cynicism. Cynicism fed by economic hypocrites and free lunch hucksters who promise we can get what we want without paying for it.

Cynicism fed by leaders who base their beliefs on poll results.

Harry Truman said it best: "How far would Moses have gone if he had taken a poll in Egypt?"

It's no secret that Presidents take refuge in international activities. Bush is no exception; he uses foreign policy to camouflage his inability to bite the tough domestic bullet.

What is the message for Israel?

If twenty years from now we look back on a period of failed commitment around the world -- and that includes commitment to Israel -- it will be because presidential leadership was unwilling to generate commitment to others through investing and solving problems at home.

The future of a strong Israel depends on a strong United States -- not just militarily, but economically and socially strong as well.

I am more optimistic than that great Jewish philosopher, Woody Allen: "Mankind faces a crossroads," he wrote. "One path leads to despair and utter hopelessness, the other to total extinction. Let us pray we have the wisdom to choose correctly."

I believe we ARE at a crossroads in our national life, where we have the opportunity to recapture the vision of what our country can be -- IF we decide to nurture this human capital; IF we decide that for national security reasons we can't afford not to.
