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# HB 3098 - Relating to sex change

- 018 REP. MAE YIH, District 36, Oregon Legislature, testified in favor of the bill and introduced her constituent, Janice Stevens who requested the bill (Exhibit A, HB 3098).
- 039 JANICE STEVENS testified in favor of the bill. She is employed by Applied Economics, Inc., Home Federal Savings and parttime faculty member of Linn-Benton Community College, Albany, Oregon. She stated she had received input from members of the medical profession in support of the bill.
- 068 In response to question, Ms. Stevens stated Mr. Carney has done a lot of work on the bill and could answer how the bill fits into the law.
- 091 In response to questions, Rep. Yih stated the bill would allow for a change in the legal sex of the person, and if applicable, a change of name; the bill was drafted under LC 2278, 2-8-81.
- 130 MS. STEVENS briefly covered the contents of the input she had received from Keith J. Rohrbough, attorney, Glen C. Bending, M.D., Louis H. McCraw, Jr., M.D. and Mercedes F. Altizer, M.D. She stated information from Jim Walton, attorney, would be forthcoming to the committee.
- 154 CAROL HERZOG, ACLU, testified in favor of the bill. She stated there is a need for avenue of changing legal status to indicate a sex change. Without this these people cannot get a passport, only one of the problems involved.
- 173 DON DUGAN, Home Federal Savings, Albany, Oregon, testified in favor of the bill and stated he was appearing on behalf of Janice Stevens, her personality and position in their community.
- 198 CHAIRPERSON COHEN stated the hearing on this bill would be closed temporarily and reopened when Mr. Carney arrived.

# HB 2963 - Relating to release on personal recognizance

206 REP. MARGIE HENDRIKSEN, District 40, Oregon Legislature, testified in favor of the bill (Exhibit A, HB 2963).

# HB 2586 - Relating to sexual offenses

272 REP. HENDRIKSEN testified in favor of the bill (Exhibit A, HB 2586).

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### HJR 37 - Proposes amendment to Oregon Constitution

327 REP. HENDRIKSEN testified in favor of the bill and explained that the provision adds to murder, treason, rape or sodomy committed by forsible complusion to the Constitution and would be submitted to the vote of the people.

- 344 REP. HENDRIKSEN concluded by pointing out that HB 2963, HB 2586 and HJR 37 all relate to the fact that the community needs protection in this respect and that these kinds of assaults that are taking place in Oregon need to be recognized by the Criminal Code.
- 367 In response to questions, she stated that HJR 37 is necessary because we are limited and we should not exceed constitutional authority; she did not know what other states have done on these offenses; forcible sexual penetration should be included in the bill.
- HB 3098 Relating to sex change
- 442 JOE CARNEY Oregon Registrar, testified in favor of the bill. He stated he had checked with registrars in the states of Utah, Washington and California and offered provisions provided by these states regarding sex change.

043 In response to questions, records are filed by place of occurrence rather than by residence; when the maiden name is requested, it is basically for identification; and he stated he saw no problem in his agency with the bill as drafted.

HB 2963 - Relating to release on personal recognizance

- 092 BILLY WASSON, Marion County Community Corrections, testified in opposition to the bill. He had the question, does the bill prohibit by any means a release or is pretrial release possible.
- 103 REP. HENDRIKSEN replied yes.
- 112 MR. WASSON expressed the danger of misinterpretation and has concern with selecting out a group of population and basically limiting their access to pretrial release on the basis that the person is only charged with a crime and not convicted.

# HB3098 Sex Change on Birth Record

This written testimony was given verbally on April 13, 1981.

HB3098 would require the Health Division to make changes on birth certificates, on request, when change of sex has occurred. Although the Health Division did not sponsor this bill, we support these changes.

I checked with the vital statistics registrars in three of our neighboring states concerning how each of those states handled this issue.

Mr. John Brockert, State Registrar of Vital Statistics in Utah, indicated that Utah has had legislation similar to that under consideration in this bill for a period of four years. During that four year period the state has had two requests to make the sex change on the birth certificate.

California also has legislation in this area. The legislation in that state goes into much more detail than HB3098 since it prescribes specific procedures for the court to follow and time limits for filing the change order. Mr. Merle Shields', State

Registrar for California, estimated a request rate of 8 to 10 certificate changes per year.

The state of Washington does not have legislation or administrative rules covering this type of amendment. Mr. Tom Steinburn, State Registrar for Washington, however, stated that this type of amendment is covered by an office policy which follows the same basic structure as HB3098. An estimate of five to six changes per year was given as the experience for the State of Washington.

Based on these estimates and the variance in Oregon's population relative to the other three states, I would estimate that we could expect between one and two requests per year. Such a low level of requests - although very important to the individuals involved - would have virtually no fiscal or organizational impact on the operation of vital statistics in Oregon's State Health Division.

I was happy to note that House Bill 3098 closely follows the section of the "Model State Vital Statistics Act" which pertains to the amendment of the birth certificate following a surgical change of sex. The "Model Act" has been endorsed by a number of national organizations including the Committee on Suggested State Legislation of the Council of State Governments.

In summary, then, the proposed legislation comes with the endorsement of the experience in other states and the review of the Committee on Suggested State Legislation. The Division estimates that it can implement the procedures required without hardship and without any fiscal or personnel adjustments.

# MEMORANDUM

FROM: Carol Herzog, Legislative Representative

RE: HB 3098

The ACLU of Oregon supports HB 3098, which would allow a person to obtain legal documentation of change of sex in a manner similar to that provided for legal change of name.

Transsexuals feel they have been trapped in the body of one sex while they have identified with the other. They presently have, or have had, a legitimate medical problem, which can be overcome by corrective surgery and counseling. These people deserve to be treated seriously and with dignity, not as social outcasts or sideshow freaks.

One of the major problems **m** transsexuals encounter after the surgery which changes their physical status, is the inability to change their legal status. Imagine the attendant difficulties of having the appearance and demeanor of one sex while carrying conflicting identification. One would be unable to cash a check, buy a drink, or rent a car. In addition, U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Services requires a citizen to present a legal order of sex change before it will issue a new passport. The inability to procure such a legal order thus interferes with many aspects of a person's life, including his/her right to travel.

Over a dozen states have passed laws allowing transsexuals to obtain a legal change of sex. Medical authorities today agree that the best treatment for the transsexual is surgery, and part of the therapy should be a legal recognition of the patient's new status, so that psychological problems do not persist. See 7 Conn. L. Rev. 288; 30 Hastings L.J. 1075.

It is time to recognize this problem and take steps to deal with it. We urge you to support HB 3098.
