Relating to curtailment of electrical or gas service during emergencies;
and prescribing an effective date.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. Sections 2 to 4 of this Act are added to and made a part of ORS chapter 757.

SECTION 2. Any person, as defined in ORS 758.400, engaged in the sale or resale of electricity or natural or manufactured gas in this state shall present for approval by the commissioner a plan for curtailment of electrical or gas load in the event of emergencies. Utility plans shall be submitted in such form and within such time limits as the commissioner shall specify.

SECTION 3. (1) Approval of utility plans for the curtailment of load shall be based on the following factors:

(a) The consistency of the plan with the public health, safety and welfare;

(b) The technical feasibility of implementation of the plan; and

(c) The effectiveness with which the plan minimizes the impact of any curtailment.

(2) In the event of an emergency threatening the health, safety and welfare of the general public, the commissioner may on his own motion and without hearing establish a plan for the curtailment of load by any person referred to in section 2 of this 1973 Act. Where an emergency is not present, the commissioner shall prior to approval hold public hearings with respect to any proposed plan and give reasonable notice of such hearings.

SECTION 4. A utility shall not be liable for damages to persons or property resulting from a curtailment of service in accordance with a plan approved by the commissioner.

SECTION 5. This Act takes effect January 1, 1974.





Electricity and gas utilities shall present for approval by the Public Utilities Commissioner a plan for curtailment during emergencies, in such form and within such time limits as the commissioner shall specify.

Approval shall be based on: the plan's consistency with public health, safety and welfare; technical feasibility of the plan's implementation; effectiveness with which the plan minimizes the impact of any curtailment.

In an emergency threatening the health, safety and welfare of the public, the commissioner may on his own motion and without a hearing establish a plan for load curtailment. When no emergency is present, the commissioner shall hold public hearings with respect to any proposed plan and give reasonable notice of such hearings prior to approval.

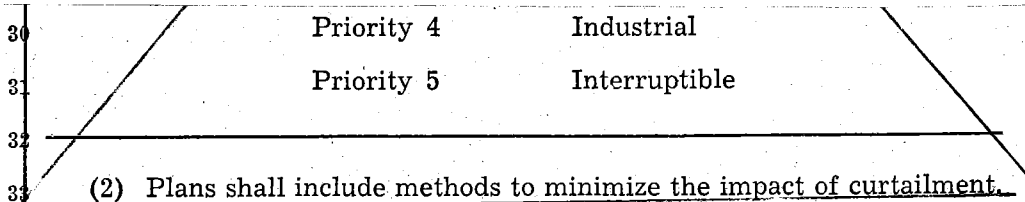

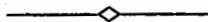



Section 3. ~~Definitions~~ As used in this ¹⁹⁷³ Act, except as specifically provided:

(1) "Residential" means dwellings of single or multiple family occupancy, including separate structures, flats and apartments.

(2) "Institutional" means those facilities required for the health, safety and welfare of the general public.

(3) "Commercial" means those facilities primarily used in the business of selling commodities or services to the public including minor production or processing activities connected therewith.

(4) "Industrial" means those facilities primarily used for production, manufacturing and processing operations.

(5) "Interruptible" means those facilities that are operated under contract or tariff schedule specifically providing for the interruption of service.

l Section 4. (1) The curtailment of load by general classification of customer type shall be based on the following priorities of service continuity insofar as it is practical;

baseline

Priority 1	Residential
Priority 2	Institutional
Priority 3	Commercial
Priority 4	Industrial
Priority 5	Interruptible

baseline

(2) Plans shall include methods to minimize the impact of curtailment.

(3) The commissioner may set any proposed plans for hearing and give such reasonable notice of the hearing thereon to all interested persons as in his judgment may be necessary.

Section 5. This Act takes effect January 1, 1974.
